Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Sirach 27: 4-7

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Luke:

Jesus told his disciples a parable,

"Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? No disciple is superior to the teacher; but when fully trained, every disciple will be like his teacher. Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? How can you say to your brother, 'Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye? You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye.

"A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. For every tree is known by its own fruit. For people do not pick figs from thornbushes, nor do they gather grapes from brambles. A good person out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good, but an evil person out of a store of evil produces evil; for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."

- 1. Relate a time when you felt judged by someone. How did that make you feel?
- 2. How easy or hard is it to see yourself objectively?
- 3. Describe a time when you failed to see the goodness in someone else.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Picasso once asked his friend Rodin if he liked his latest painting that was yet unsigned. Rodin studied the painting from all directions and, only after careful deliberation, answered Picasso, "Whatever else you do... sign it. If you do that... we will know which way to hold it." The signature helps us to understand the abstract in its specific categories

The Gospel today invites us to see that Love is the signature of life. Often we hear people questioning God, "Why don't you punish the evil? Why do the good suffer?" Today Jesus answers these questions from God's angle. In order to understand the answer, we have to be like God, "to be the Children of the Most High," "to be merciful just as your Father is Merciful." The answer is in "stop judging," and start loving; in loving even our enemies, in loving without restrictions, like God who is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked, who "makes His sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust." God's personal signature on us is LOVE.

Unless we see with God's eye of mercy and understand with God's heart of love, our questions will be abstract and will get no specific answers. Until we sign our life with Godly Love we will be struggling with unanswered questions. Our life will be controlled by others in the sense that we can be good only if the other is good to us. We can easily be lead into being evil if the other does evil to us. That is why Jesus taught us to pray, "Lead us not into temptation." Jesus explains to us that the personal signature of our life is LOVE, love without restriction, empowered by God and not instigated by others.

Lent is at our door steps, March 6th: Through Flock notes you can have access to Lenten Spiritual help. You will find in this bulletin a Flyer on how to connect to Flock Note and get access to Spiritual thoughts to enlighten and empower yourself. It is easy. You can access it through your email and a few clicks. You will be invited to "Word on Fire" for an inspiring spiritual exercise for Lent. Please give it a try.

Spiritually quality time is Lent: Unless we give, no one will give quality-time to us. Lent is a time when we try to work on the inner strength. We start with ashes on our forehead reminding us that our bodies would end in ash but the spirit inside us has the power to outlive our body and mind. In order to revive and live the power of the Spirit, we in St. Thomas More invite you to Spiritual Exercises during Lent.

March 6th Ash Wednesday begins the Holy Season of Lent.

St. Thomas More, our Patron invites us to pray during Lent



St. Thomas More was so conscientiously pure in his belief and its practice that his whole life was (even in jail and at the moment of execution) not a reaction to what the King or others said or did to him. The following quote explains how he was praying and he asked others to pray for the King

moments before his execution. "Afterward he exhorted them, and besought them very earnestly to pray to God for the King, that He (God) should give him (king) good counsel, protesting that he died his good servant, and God's first."

Thus St. Thomas More shows what prayer can/should do. When we pray, Prayer opens our life for all that God wants to do in us. Likewise prayer does the same to the life of those for whom we pray ...to do all that God wants to achieve in them.

Lent is the time we pray in order that we may become more open to God's work in ourselves and others.

Only in that sense every Monday during Lent from 7:00 to 8:00 pm, you are invited to pray before the Eucharist. As Jesus said, "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly." (John 10:10). We will pray that you and I, everyone become God's work of having and promoting life and its abundance everywhere and in all stages. This is praying time for God to work, not promoting or supporting any division based on philosophy or opinion. Please commit yourself to praying before the Eucharist that God's work be accomplished among us.

Let us imitate our Patron St. Thomas More. First, let us pray for ourselves to be God's lively creative work without hate or vengeance against anyone. Like St. Thomas More, if you feel that those in power have done injustice and sinned against life, follow our Patron's example of praying that God give them good counsel that life may be upheld and appreciated. Let us believe like our Patron that ultimately God will prevail and our prayer will open our hearts as well as those for whom we pray, for God's gift of life in abundance. Please come and pray every Lenten Monday before the Eucharist for God's gift life to flourish among us in all stages from conception to natural death.

What is "Stations of the Cross?"

It is a form of prayer, of journeying with Jesus in his path of carrying the cross from Pilate's palace to Mount Calvary. In every Catholic Church one can find fourteen depictions of Jesus' journey of carrying the cross, seven on each side of the inner wall. The practice of praying the "Stations" goes as far back as the 15th century. Some churches have the stations along the approach to a church just as we have in our Church grounds between the road and the parking lot.

Why do we pray the "Stations" every Lenten Friday?

Because the forty days of Lent focuses on Jesus' Passion, Death and Resurrection. We pray it on the Fridays of Lent because Jesus carried the Cross to die on Calvary on Good Friday. Nobody wants to suffer but everyone has inevitably some kind of suffering caused by self or others.

Praying Stations helps us understand and offer our sufferings as Christ did. Like Jesus we can turn the negative suffering into a positive expression of Love. We can transform pain into redemptive grace as Jesus did on the cross. It is worth quoting the words of our Patron, St. Thomas More here. "Every tribulation which ever comes our way either is sent to be medicinal, if we will take it as such, or may become medicinal, if we will make it such, or is better than medicinal, unless we forsake it."

Abortion as a "Fundamental Right" Threatens Religious Freedom

Declaring abortion a "fundamental right" under the recent, extreme New York State late-term abortion law may cause the beliefs and values of pro-life supporters to be questioned and the "consequences for the pro-life movement could be dire," said Bishop Scharfenberger of Albany, NY. He asked, "Will being pro-life one day be a hate crime in NY?" He further wondered if the state would permit pro-life doctors and nurses to be licensed under such a law. He questioned if health facilities which do not offer abortions would be certified and allowed to continue and if the law "will allow that even \$1 be given to maternity services without offering women the 'choice' of abortion?" "These are unanswered questions but I shudder to think of the consequences this law will wreak."

Still No Protections for Aborted Babies Born Alive:

After Sen. Patty Murray (WA) blocked the "Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act" from passing in a fast-track unanimous consent vote, Sen. Ben Sasse (NE), sponsor of the bill, promised to "continue pushing for the protection of the infant survivors of abortion" and hopes that "ours is a country that values and loves and protects every single member of our community - no matter how small "

The bill would have ensured that babies who survive abortion receive medical care. Sen. Sasse introduced the bill in response to the proposed VA abortion bill that would have allowed, according to VA Gov. Northam, "The infant would be delivered ... be resuscitated, if that's what the mother and family desired, and then a discussion would ensue between the physicians and mother." (discussion about what? denying the baby medical care? infanticide?)

A 2013 study found over 1,200 babies a year survive abortions. Most are left alone to die.


