



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

October 20, 2019 Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time Exodus 17: 8-13 Psalm 121: 1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 7-8 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2 Luke: 18:1-8

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke:

Jesus told his disciples a parable about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary. He said, "There was a judge in a certain town who neither feared God nor respected any human being. And a widow in that town used to come to him and say,' Render a just decision for me against my adversary.' For a long time the judge was unwilling, but eventually he thought, 'While it is true that I neither fear God nor respect any human being, because this widow keeps bothering me I shall deliver a just decision for her lest she finally come and strike me.'"

The Lord said, "Pay attention to what the dishonest judge says. Will not God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night? Will he be slow to answer them? I tell you, he will see to it that justice is done for them speedily. But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

Focus Questions:

- 1. Relate a time when your prayer was answered when you needed it.
- 2. Describe a time when, like the widow, you were persistent. What was the outcome?
- 3. What are you doing to bring God's justice to the world?

Family and children's question:

Talk about the importance of prayer and how you can make sure to pray each day.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Patient: Doctor, I think everyone tries to take advantage of me.

Psychiatrist: That's silly. It's a perfectly normal feeling.

Patient: Is it really? Thanks for your help, doctor. How much do I owe you?

Psychiatrist: How much do you have?

Life would plainly be a business deal between persons taking advantage of each other, if life is not built upon the noble foundation of Gratitude and Thanksgiving. It is "Thanks" that lifts up the human life from the 'tit for tat'-mentality to the noble plain of loving relationship.

Today's Gospel narrates the healing of ten lepers on their way to report to the health officers (Priests) at Jesus' command. Only one of them, who <u>realized</u> that he had been healed, comes back to the healer to thank him. 'Thanking' is possible only when one <u>realizes</u> that everything that happens in a person is not merely because of one's own striving but because of bigger positive forces around that person. That particular healed person, a Samaritan <u>realized</u> the bigger positive source of healing as Jesus. The <u>realization</u> led him back to thank the source.

The healing felt by the other nine persons led them in hurry to the health officers to prove that they are no longer lepers but healed persons. Their own desire to be approved by others as healed ones, overpowered their inner realization that they were healed by the bigger positive power over them. 'Thanks' will never occur until one realizes that the truth is not one's private property, but that it is happening outside of one's own self-centered desires and ideological conveniences. 'Thanks' naturally blossoms from the heart which realizes that truth/healing is bigger and broader, deeper and richer than one's own endeavors. Let us pray that we are enriched by the inner realization of the healing influence around us and from above us.

Next Sunday, October 20th is World Mission Sunday when we are called to be part of the Church's missionary efforts, supporting mission priests, religious Sisters and Brothers, and lay catechists who provide loving service to those most in need. As Catholics around the world, here at home and in the missions, gather at the Eucharist around the table of the Lord, let us pray for the Church's worldwide missionary work and offer financial help through the Society for the Propagation of the Faith for vulnerable communities throughout Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands.

Our Religious Education has started the year with the grace of God, in forming 800 children registered between the First and Eighth grades. Eighty eight of them will receive First Communion and 125 will receive the Sacrament of Confirmation in May. While we thank all the teachers, volunteers and coordinators for their great service of forming the children, let us all pray that the Spirit of the Lord work for the best to blossom in our children's life.

Focus on Religious Freedom www.cffor.org Worldwide Religious Freedom Abuses - Part 1

Christians continue to be the most persecuted religious group in the world with significant increases in 2019. Watchdog groups, Release International and Open Doors, have particular concern for believers in China, India, & Nigeria.

China: In 2018, China was on track to contain the world's largest Christian population by 2030, thanks to a surge in underground house churches. The Council on Foreign Relations (CFR) estimated the number of Protestants at anywhere from 58-115 million, and Catholics range from 10-12 million. About 1/3 of Christians attend the government sanctioned church groups: The Protestant Three-Self Church and the Chinese Patriotic Catholic Church. Still, Christians face growing repression and China is ranked as a country where it's most difficult and dangerous to practice Christianity.

- Over 2,000 crosses have been burned and ripped down and many churches demolished.
- The Communist regime is now demanding churches replace postings of the Ten Commandments with sayings of Chinese President Xi Jinping.
- Some sanctioned churches require pastors to incorporate communist ideology in their sermons.
- Some congregations are threatened to be blacklisted, meaning travel restrictions, schooling and future employment of their children will be impeded.
- By 2020, 600 million surveillance cameras will monitor all citizens, believers, and religious activities such as who buys Bibles, etc.
- Chinese Christians will only be able to purchase the Communism-friendly version of the Bible.
- There is a nationwide effort to exalt President Xi who says that religion must be guided by the party to adapt to socialist society.

In light of this ongoing crackdown on religious freedom, house church leaders are going back to underground practices.

Today, Christianity is being labeled as a "Western Ideology" that must be resisted at all costs by the Chinese people.
