



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

February 23, 2020 Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18 Psalm 103:1-2, 3-4, 8, 10, 12-13 1 Corinthians 3:16-23 Matthew 5:38-48

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew:

Jesus said to his disciples:

"You have heard that it was said,

An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.

But I say to you, offer no resistance to one who is evil. When someone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other one as well. If anyone wants to go to law with you over your tunic, hand over your cloak as well. Should anyone press you into service for one mile, go for two miles. Give to the one who asks of you, and do not turn your back on one who wants to borrow.

"You have heard that it was said,

You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy. But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your heavenly Father, for he makes his sun rise on the bad and the good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust. For if you love those who love you, what recompense will you have? Do not the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet your brothers only, what is unusual about that? Do not the pagans do the same? So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect."

Focus Questions:

- 1. When did you have (or not have) the courage to go the extra mile?
- 2. Describe an experience when you felt injured by someone and struggled to love that person anyway.
- 3. Relate a time when you freely gave yourself to others.

Family and children's question:

Relate a time when you did a good deed for someone not expecting to be thanked or noticed for what you did.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Husband: Where is yesterday's newspaper?

Wife: I wrapped the garbage in it? Husband: Oh, I wanted to see it.

Wife: There was not much to see ...just some orange peels and coffee grounds.

"To see the newspaper" according to the husband meant to read it, but the wife took "seeing" literally.

Today's reading explains how the letter of the law reduces our potential but the spirit of the law empowers us to live our potential fully well. The letter of the law kills the potential by defining every action, setting a limit and boundaries to what, when and how we should or should not do anything. The letter would not touch the area of "why", the reason, meaning and the life experience of our action.

Jesus in today's Gospel explains how to empower oneself by the spirit of the law. He starts with the letter of the law, how and what it demands; then he passes on to the meaning and power of living the spirit of the law. Of course, at the outset, his reinterpretation of each law seems to demand more than what the letter of the law stipulates. Observing the spirit of the law looks harder than that that of the letter of the law. That is because the letter orders a person what to do and what not to do; whereas the Spirit empowers the observer to live the meaning and the goal of the law.

The letter forbids the act of killing but the spirit empowers to stop the act of killing at its root. Jesus explains how the final act of killing starts at the angry word and wicked thoughts in one's heart. Thus the letter of the law aims to forbid the final act of killing, whereas the spirit of the law eradicates the thought of killing at its start, by replacing the negative thought with a positive one of loving and healing. Today's reading deals with such explanations of various laws. Let us pray for the strength to live the spirit of the law.

In 10 days we will begin the Holy Season of Lent. February 26th is Ash Wednesday. During Lent spiritual help will come to the palm of your hand through flock notes. Two to three lines of spiritual inspiration will be texted to you every day of Lent. All you need to do is to fill the flock note coupon found in the bulletin. Or please join one of the social media of our Parish found at the bottom of the front page of the Bulletin.

They Fought for Freedom

In February, Americans remember the birthdays of two champions of freedom:

George Washington, the "Father of our Country," on Feb. 22, and Abraham Lincoln, the "Great Emancipator," on Feb. 12. Washington liberated Americans from British tyranny and Lincoln liberated slaves from bondage.

Although some scholars today choose to question the motives of these great men as to whether they truly believed in freedom for colonists and slaves, it cannot be disputed that their actions did indeed bring liberty. Since reading minds to discover motive is impossible, we can only judge facts, and the actions of both Washington and Lincoln qualify them as champions of freedom. Historians have called George Washington the "Indispensable Man" for his role in the fight for freedom and creation of the United States of America. One congressman's eulogy supports this title with these memorable words:

"First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen, ... Pious, just, humane, temperate, and sincere; uniform, dignified, and commanding ..."
The U.S. Senate official message read:

"Let his countrymen consecrate the memory of the heroic general, the patriotic statesman and the virtuous sage. His example is now complete, and it will teach wisdom and virtue ... not only in the present age, but in future generations, as long as our history shall be read." (1)

Abraham Lincoln issued an executive order, the **Emancipation Proclamation**, Jan. 1, 1863, which changed the legal status under federal law of more than 3.5 million African Americans in the Confederate states from slave to free. The Proclamation broadened the goals of the Civil War, making the freedom of slaves an explicit goal of the Union war effort and one of the two primary war goals. To ensure the abolition of slavery in all of the U.S., Lincoln pushed for passage of the Thirteenth Amendment and insisted that Reconstruction plans for the Southern states require abolition in new state constitutions.

Lincoln is also revered for his many wise and pithy sayings:

"Four score and seven years ago, our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal."

"Freedom is the last, best hope of earth."

"America will never be destroyed from the outside. If we falter and lose our freedoms, it will be because we destroyed ourselves."
