Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

December 6, 2020 Second Sunday of Advent Isaiah 40: 1-5, 9-11 Psalm: 85: 9-10, 11-12, 13-14 2 Peter 3:8-14 Mark 1: 1-8

A reading from the Gospel of Mark:

The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ the Son of God.

As it is written in Isaiah the prophet:

Behold, I am sending my messenger ahead of you; he will prepare your way.

A voice of one crying out in the desert:

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths."

John the Baptist appeared in the desert proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

and were being baptized by him in the Jordan River as they acknowledged their sins.

John was clothed in camel's hair,

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

This Sunday we begin the Liturgical New Year. We get rid of the old lector workbooks of 2020 and begin the new lector workbooks of 2021. Today, when I threw out the old book in the garbage, a thought flashed through my mind like lightning-- "Dear God may all that we are going through 2020 go to the garbage and please turn for us a new leaf of freshness, health, peace, and prosperity in the new book of 2021."

As we begin the New Liturgical Year with the first week of Advent, a happy mood can spring in our mind at the thought of Christmas being just four weeks away. But as everything becomes so strange and uncertain these days, we may be skeptical and cynical of what this Christmas is going to be.

Today's Gospel begins with "Be watchful! Be alert! You do not know when the time will come." If we hear these words from the experience of anger and depression of this pandemic time, they will sound dreary, gloomy and cheerless in our ears making us wait for the worse yet to happen. But Jesus provides us a background which will interpret these words of "Be watchful! Be alert" in an encouraging mood of being hopeful for a prosperous and healthy tomorrow.

The Gospel portrays how the master has left his house in charge of his servants, each with his/her own task. The master gave his servants the power to keep the household safe and sound. Thus the words "Be watchful! Be alert!" are a call to invigorate our responsibility and our invested inner-power to accomplish it. More than any time in the past, NOW we are expected to employ more responsibly all our power to keep the household together so that nothing can harm or rob us.

Being a servant to each other, being co-operative with each other and being fraternal to each other are the needs of the hour. It is not the time to be gloomy and dreary, and consequently, mourn and loathe our "misfortune". It is the time to rise up to realize our stewardship for each other and for "LIFE" in general. It is the hour to be alert, awake and be aware that the master of the house has invested enough power and enthusiasm in us to run our family, community, nation and the world with mutual confidence in each other for a healthy and peaceful tomorrow.

During Advent as we light the Advent Candle, let us illuminate our hearts with the light of God's hope and grace. We will add a candle to the wreath every week for the next four weeks. Let the increase of light fill our heart and homes with more hope and faith. May God strengthen us every day. We encourage you to light the Advent Candles with your family at your homes at dinner time. Please pray when you light the First Candle during this first week.

ADVENT – Time of Hope

A moment to become God's active power

A Tool to make your day prayerful...



This year's Advent is 25 days. I prepared this reflection on every day's Mass Readings as a Prayer Tool. It may take a minute to read it but it will prepare you to expect something big in God's measure to happen in your heart at the end of the 25 days of Advent, on Dec. 24th the eve of Christmas. We are God's image and we await God's visit, something wonderful in our hearts and homes at the Birth of His Son Jesus Christ.

Nov. 29 Sunday: "Be watchful! Be Alert!" (Mark 13:33) During Advent these words carry a different connotation. They are not a warning to expect something negative, but a very positive reminder to not miss the happy event. Advent is the time leading us to CHRISTMAS, the birth of the Lord among us, as one of us, sharing with us in order to transform all that we suffer into Divine blessings. Let us pay attention to events and persons around us. Everything is God's channel of coming to us. Every person and event is worthy of bringing God's blessing to each of us.



Nov. 30 Monday: Feast of St. Andrew the Apostle. "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of



men." (Matthew 4:19) Andrew was a fisher man. Jesus saw in him a talent to fish people for Jesus. What we do as our work, Jesus elevates into a mission. Likewise, Jesus can turn our words into His powerful message, our labor into service, our wishes into His blessings, our strivings into moments of rising to new life, grace, mercy and forgiveness. All that we need is to follow Jesus as Andrew did.

Dec. 1 Tuesday: "Then the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and the young lion shall browse together, with a little child to guide them." (Isaiah 11:6). This image from Prophet Isaiah depicts the kind of world under God's reign. Jesus invites us in today's Gospel to experience and live this kind of world if we only have the heart and mind of a child. "(God has) hidden these things from the wise and the learned (but has revealed) them to the childlike." Luke 10:21).



Lord make me a child to experience and express your world.



Dec. 2 Wednesday: "They all ate and were satisfied." Matthew 15:37. Today's Gospel is the story of Jesus multiplying the food of His disciples (seven loaves and a few fish) to feed over 4000 hungry people. Satisfaction or contentment is not in how much we have but in how much we can share. The more we share the more satisfied we become. We have to sweat and suffer more to multiply. But those who share in the name of God will always have enough and more with which to be content. As today's story ends "They all ate and were satisfied. They picked up the

fragments left over—seven baskets full."

Dec. 3 Thursday: "The mind is not a vessel to be filled but a fire to be kindled" (Plutarch). Prayer is not expressing oneself to God in mere words, for then it would be like a castle built on sand which would not withstand wind or rain. Praying is allowing God to be the active power to become like a castle built on a rock to withstand any catastrophe. Let us pray to become God's power.





Dec. 4 Friday: In Today's Gospel Jesus asks the blind person, "Do you believe that I can do this?" (Matthew 9:28). His question reveals that God needs our consent and cooperation (our faith in Him) to heal our blindness. When we wish to be blind, no one, not even God can open our eyes. Seeing is our wish and will, our choice and option. When we say like the blind men 'Yes, Lord," Jesus would not only open our eyes but also give His power to see in the way Jesus would see.

Dec. 5 Saturday: "The harvest is abundant

but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest." (Matthew 9:37-38). These words of Jesus express how He looks at us, others and everything in the world. According to Him, humans and their world are the abundant harvest, ripened and ready. If only we train ourselves to have the mind of Jesus, we would see the harvest of love, mercy, kindness etc. that can be harvested in us and around us. The world need not be the harvest of division, hatred, war and killing. What kind of harvest-workers are we?



Jesus asks us to pray for the master of the harvest to send out laborers for HIS HARVEST. We are God's Harvest and its laborers.

From the Pilgrims to the Founders: Building a Nation for Religious Freedom, Life and Liberty

"Of the many influences that shaped the American concept of liberty, the first and most formative was faith," wrote author Matthew Spalding (1)

"Indeed, America was the first country in all of history that was deliberately formed to protect and promote religious freedom. Our founders rightly noted that people don't give people freedom - God does," wrote columnist Rebecca Hagelin⁽²⁾

The freedoms we enjoy in America today originated in Judeo-Christian ideals that date back to the Pilgrims in 1620, the Puritans who followed them in 1630, and were the foundation for the Declaration of Independence written by Thomas Jefferson in 1776 and signed by the Founding Fathers.

Two years after the first Thanksgiving, Gov. William Bradford made an official proclamation for a second day of Thanksgiving in 1623, to thank God for their abundant harvest and for "freedom to worship God according to the dictates of our own conscience." (3)

Aboard the *Arabella* in 1630, in route to Massachusetts Bay, Puritan leader and lawyer John Winthrop wrote the lengthy document, *A Model of Christian Charity*, that became a model for future constitutional documents in the colonies and beyond. It read: "We are a Company, professing ourselves members of Christ, ... we shall find that the God of Israel is among us, when ten of us shall be able to resist a thousand of our enemies, when He shall make us a praise and glory ..." ⁽⁴⁾



Summation:

As we all know 2020 has presented us with unique challenges not the least of which has been the economic impact imposed on us by the COVID-19 Pandemic. The above statement indicates an erosion of economic posture of over \$400,000. This is attributed, in part, to the payoff of our recent Capital Campaign thanks to your collective generosity. However, please note the decrease in collections, parish sponsored fund raising, & other revenue we have earned in past years and the negative impact that COVID-19 caused.

The Covid-19 pandemic and the restrictions caused by its impact on people resulted in the elimination of several revenue streams. Specifically, the Parish Feast weekend and our annual Golf Outing which in the past provided upwards of \$30,000 to our Parish. The other major loss was a significant reduction of regular income from collections at Mass. Again, due to the virus we suspended "in Person" attendance for nearly three months. When we resumed Mass, the number of Masses were reduced and attendance was restricted by State imposed mandates.

This is a good time to re-evaluate the manner in which you provide support to our Parish. The FAITH DIRECT program provides an automatic method for your donation to STM. Unfortunately, only 10% of the Parish give in this manner. The monthly donations managed by FAITH DIRECT insure that your donation gets to our Parish regardless of weather, pandemics, vacations, etc. Please consider giving through FAITH DIRECT.......PLEASE CALL THE RECTORY OFFICE TO ENROLL OR TO HAVE YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED. Background Screening Update The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People:

The Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People (The Charter) promulgated by the Bishops of the United States in 2002 outlines specific practices and guidelines providing standards of safety in parishes and dioceses throughout the United States. As directed in The Charter, the Diocese of Rockville Centre requires all employees, clergy, and volunteers to complete three requirements within thirty days of employment or volunteering:

- 1. Attend Protecting God's Children Program (Virtus)
- 2. Sign the Codes of Conduct;
- 3. Complete a background screen application. The Diocese requires all those who remain in active ministry be rescreened at 5 yr. intervals. volunteers/employees.

A Word on Background Screening of Volunteers:

The Office for the Protection of Children and Young People (OFPCYP) has streamlined the volunteer application process enabling volunteers to complete the three safe environment requirements in one step. Individuals wishing to volunteer in a parish or school:

- 1. Register to attend a Protecting God's Children class and create a Virtus account on the Virtus website: www.Virtus.org
- 2. Electronically acknowledge the Diocesan Code of Conduct- provided during the Virtus registration process.
- 3. Follow the instructions to complete the Sterling Volunteers background screening application background offered during the Virtus registration process.

Active Volunteers:

If you are active in a parish ministry, have already attended Virtus and have been background screened you may be at – or beyond- the *5yr. rescreening requirement*. If this is the case, you will receive an email from *Sterling Volunteers* asking you to complete the background screening application on-line. You may access the background screening application by following the prompt in the email or logging into your Virtus account. *Please be aware-this is not a scam nor has your e-mail been hacked.* The OFPCYP has been working with your parish to update the Safe Environment records and noted it is time for you to be rescreened. You may also be prompted to electronically resign the Code of Conduct when you log into your Virtus account.

On the left side of your screen in the green column click "Update My Account" You will be able to make the necessary changes-please remember to hit the SAVE button at the bottom of the screen.
