



# Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

December 13, 2020 Third Sunday of Advent Isaiah 61: 1-2A, 10-11 Psalm: Luke: 1:46-48, 49-50, 53-54 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24 John 1:6-8, 19-28

A reading from the Gospel of John:

A man named John was sent from God.

He came for testimony, to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He was not the light, but came to testify to the light. And this is the testimony of John.

When the Jews from Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to him to ask him,

"Who are you?"

He admitted and did not deny it, but admitted,

"I am not the Christ."

So they asked him,

"What are you then? Are you Elijah?"

And he said,

"I am not."

"Are you the Prophet?"

He answered,

"No."

So they said to him,

"Who are you, so we can give an answer to those who sent us? What do you have to say for yourself?"

He said:

"I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'make straight the way of the Lord,"

as Isaiah the prophet said."

Some Pharisees were also sent. They asked him, "Why then do you baptize if you are not the Christ or Elijah or the Prophet?"

John answered them,

"I baptize with water; but there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie."

This happened in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

#### FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

A young boy was helping his grandfather dig potatoes. After a while the child began to get tired. "Grandpa," he asked wearily, "what made you bury these things anyway?" If we are not aware that potatoes **grow under the earth, we wonder why they are buried under the earth.** 

The reading of the Second week of Advent states that precious reality is waiting in our hearts to be dug out. The Lord talks tenderly to our hearts in order to empower our hearts. If only we set time every day to listen (pray) to him, our ears will hear the encouraging news, "Here is your God! Here comes with power, the Lord GOD, who rules by his strong arm; here is his reward with him." Our hearts will begin to experience life without any discrimination and division, "Every mountain and hill shall be made low; the rugged land shall be made a plain, the rough country, a broad valley. Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together." (Isaiah 40:1-11)

In the Gospel John the Baptist explains how we have inner power to turn to Jesus who will awaken the Holy Spirit in us. It is our choice either to be unaware and bury this power of God, or be conscious and dig it out from within us. Those who dig out will begin to live their life with the power of God. Those who bury it or are not even aware of it, will just go through life in exhaustion and perspiration. The peaceful and powerful time of God, as explained in the first reading, is waiting for us to be unveiled by our inner power.

Advent is the time when we give ourselves some quality time to awaken ourselves to this inner power. In Baptism Jesus has given us the gift of the Holy Spirit. Let us allow God's Spirit to work in us. Let us not get buried in our ignorance or drowsiness. Let us be aware of the divine power we have within us.

**Tuesday, December 8<sup>th</sup> is the Solemn Feast of the Immaculate Conception** of our Blessed Mother Mary. On this day we praise God for the gift of Mary to be born and live sinless so that she becomes the worthy Mother of God. Also we declare our belief that in our Baptism, you and I are made worthy persons like Mary, to bear and live the presence of Jesus Christ. On Monday at 7:00 pm we will have a vigil Mass. On Tuesday we will have Masses at 9:00 am and at 7:00 pm. Evening mass will be followed by Eucharist Adoration for an hour.

Christmas-Tree Lighting will be on Saturday, December 12<sup>th</sup> after the 5:00pm Mass. As we are going through the time of the Pandemic, we are sorry there will not be social time with Santa.

#### **ADVENT – Time of Faith**

Now we are in the second week of Advent. The second candle of the Advent wreath is lit. "Faith" is the right key to enter our inner spiritual resources in order to welcome and experience the birth of Christ in our hearts and homes. I prepared this reflection on every day's Mass Readings as a Prayer Tool to empower us spiritually. It may take a minute to read each day's reflection. Please reflect and pray first thing in the morning before the start of any work. Be conscious of the scripture words through the day. It will empower you the whole day in God's way.

**Dec. 6 Second Sunday of Advent:** "One mightier than I, is coming after me.... I have baptized you with water; He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." (Mark 1: 7-8) These words of John the Baptist remind us how our Baptism can change our way of preparing for Christmas. Baptism is the moment that ignited God's fire in our hearts and breathed God's Spirit into us. Mary's conception was by the power of the Holy Spirit and gave birth to Jesus (Christmas). If the Holy Spirit of Baptism is alive in our heart, be sure that Christ will be born in your heart and home this Christmas.





**Dec. 7 Monday:** Some men brought a paralyzed man on a stretcher to Jesus . When Jesus saw their faith, He healed the paralytic. The paralytic benefitted from the faith of his friends. The faith of the friends made Jesus heal the paralytic. God is ready to act in favor of anyone on whose behalf we pray, with faith in God. Have faith and please pray especially for someone who is paralyzed or frozen in some state of mind or by some hurt. When Jesus sees your faith He will heal that person.

#### Dec. 8 Tuesday, Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary:

"Immaculate Conception" means that God gave Mary the grace of being sinless all her life from her Conception, in order for her to be the Mother of God. St. Paul reminds us the plan of God to bless us in Christ. Yes this plan of God has chosen us in Christ, before the foundation of the world, that we may be holy and without blemish before him. (Letter to Ephesians 1:3-6). This promise of God inspires us that we can be the present day pure vessel of God like Mary, both to fill ourselves with God's presence and to generously share it with the world.





**Dec. 9 Wednesday:** "They that hope in the LORD will renew their strength; they will soar as with eagles' wings. They will run and not grow weary, walk and not grow faint." These words from today's first reading (Isaiah 40:30) promise that if God is our life's source we will never run out of energy and enthusiasm of living. We know that the older we grow, the harder life becomes with increasing responsibilities and with increasing weakness within us. In todays' Gospel Jesus knows our human life that it doesn't get easier, but He can make us stronger. Jesus

promises, "I will give you rest....you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." (Matthew 11:28-30) When life gives you lemons, Jesus empowers you to make lemonade.

**Dec. 10 Thursday:** "I see my body as an instrument, rather than an ornament." (Alanis Morissette). As an ornament, the body may enhance our personality. As an instrument our body can empower our action and express its meaning. Today's first reading invites us to become God's instruments. As God's instrument we can realize that all that we do and all that happens in our life is the work of God. As God's work we become God's continuing act of creation (Isaiah 41:13-20) If only we allow God to touch the right key at the right time, we, the instrument, will play His heavenly music.





<u>Dec. 11 Friday:</u> The person who delights in the Lord, "is like a tree planted near running water, that yields its fruit in due season and whose leaves never fade. Whatever he does, prospers." (Psalm 1:2-6) There is a stream of running water in the underground water pipes, like in the river. But the tree planted near the water pipe cannot benefit from the water in any way. Where are we planted? Anything, but God, is like the water pipe. They can supply life only on their terms. God alone is the life giving water running by our side. He voluntarily waters us to be alive with

unfading leaves and fruits in due season. Christmas is the celebration of God coming to us voluntarily. Let us neither insulate ourselves from the running stream nor plant ourselves near insulated water pipes.

<u>Dec. 12 Saturday: Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe.</u> Today we commemorate the five apparitions of Blessed Mother Mary in December 1531 to a Mexican peasant named Juan Diego at a place called the Hill of Tepeyac, near Villa de Guadalupe, in a suburb of Mexico City. Mother Mary compelled the archbishop of Mexico City to build a basilica church by requesting it through the simple peasant Juan Diego. This how God works among us – through simple people and simple means. The birth of the almighty God was in a simple manger through the simple girl Mary the virgin mother from an insignificant village, Nazareth. Life is not what we do but How we cooperate with God, "for nothing will be impossible for God" (Luke 1:26-38).

### Supreme Court Rules for "free exercise" of Religious Freedom

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled on Nov. 25, 2020, that NY Gov. Andrew Cuomo's executive order to enforce strict attendance limits on places of worship designated as coronavirus hot spots, violated the First Amendment's "free exercise" clause and actively discriminated against religious institutions. The majority decision ruled in favor of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Brooklyn and the Jewish congregations of Agudath Israel of America, because the regulations treated the houses of worship more harshly than comparable secular facilities. "The restrictions at issue here, by effectively barring many from attending religious services, strike at the very heart of the First Amendment's guarantee of religious liberty," wrote the majority decision. (1)

New York's rules, which the justices found to be "severe" and "inflexible," don't apply to retail stores in the same neighborhoods and in some places there are no attendance caps at all. "Not only is there no evidence that the applicants have contributed to the spread of COVID-19 but there are many other less restrictive rules that could be adopted to minimize the risk to those attending religious services," the Court held (2)

"This is an historic victory," said Rabbi Chaim Zwiebel. "This landmark decision will ensure that religious practices and religious institutions will be protected from government edicts that do not treat religion with the respect demanded by the Constitution." (3)

In August, the pastors of two Colorado churches filed a "Lawsuit (that) calls both the federal government and Colorado leaders into account for their violations of the right to free exercise of religion among other abuses of power, primarily resulting from Gov. Jared Polis' COVID-19 related Executive Orders," said Thomas More Society attorneys. (4)

U.S. District Court Judge Daniel Domenico ruled, "The Constitution does not allow the State to tell a congregation how large it can be when comparable secular gatherings are not so limited, or to tell a congregation that its reason for wishing to remove facial coverings is less important than a restaurant's or spa's." (5)


