



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

December 20, 2020 Fourth Sunday of Advent 2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16 Psalm: 89:2-3, 4-5, 27, 29 Romans: 16:25-27 Luke: 1:26-38

A reading from the Gospel of John:

The angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary. And coming to her, he said,

"Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." But she was greatly troubled at what was said and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. Then the angel said to her,

"Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. "Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus.

He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end."

But Mary said to the angel,

"How can this be, since I have no relations with a man?"

And the angel said to her in reply,

"The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore the child to be born will be called holy, the Son of God. And behold, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing will be impossible for God."

Mary said,

"Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

When a business man watched a cuckoo clock maker carve out the case, he was astounded at the slow rate of his progress. The businessman finally said, "My good man you'll never make much money that way." "Sir," the clock maker replied, "I'm not making money, I'm making cuckoo clocks."

The joy of expressing one's creative self is the most fulfilling moment of life. Life that settles for anything less than this joy would never find satisfaction or fulfillment.

Today's Gospel narrates that John the Baptist was not ready to settle for anything but what God wanted to fulfill in him. The priests from Jerusalem wanted to know from him why he was baptizing if he was neither Christ, nor Elijah nor a prophet. John the Baptist answered that he baptized people because that was what God wanted to do in and through him. He said: "I am *the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'make straight the way of the Lord*". He neither wanted anything more of what he is called by God to do, nor desired anything less than what God expected him to do. His meaning and goal of life is to do God's mission and God's meaning for him i.e., to be the herald announcing the immediate arrival of Jesus, the Messiah.

Even today God calls each of us to live God's meaning and mission. Until and unless our life becomes the expression of God's meaning, we will never have fulfillment in our life. Unless and until our words and deeds bear fruits of God's mission, our life would be a burden and pain. St. Augustine bears personal testimony to this spiritual reality. "Thou hast made us for thyself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it finds its rest in thee". We will never be full unless God fills us. What Jeremiah reminded his people would become true if we have everything else but God. "They withdrew from me, went after emptiness, and became empty themselves....they have forsaken me, the source of living waters; they have dug themselves cisterns, broken cisterns that cannot hold water." (Jeremiah 2: 5,13).

The third week of Advent is known as 'Gaudete Sunday', 'Rejoicing Sunday'. God's arrival nears and it brings joy. The birth of God in Jesus can make our lives fulfilled and joyful. Le the birth of Jesus make this spiritual reality come true in our midst and in our homes. Let us experience the true joy of living and be empowered to live it by allowing God to be born in our hearts and homes.

ADVENT – Time of Joy

Now we are in the third week of Advent. The third rose candle of the Advent wreath is lit. "Joy" is the right key to enter our inner spiritual resources. The end result of anything we do should/would be joy as long as we live the God given meaning in our words and deeds. It may take a minute to read each day's reflection. Please reflect and pray as a first thing in the morning before start of any work. Be conscious of the scripture words through the day. It will empower you the whole day in God's way.

Dec. 13 Third Sunday of Advent: Things end. People change. And you know what? LIFE goes on. Today's readings invite us to engage ourselves enthusiastically with JOY in the flow of LIFE that God presents us every second of each day. If we only realize that the Spirit of the Lord GOD is upon us, we will be blessed to accept and experience that it is God's world. Every moment is announcing a time of favor from the LORD. "Joy is not simply a matter of temperament. It grows in our hearts. Joy is prayer. Joy is strength. Joy is


love." (Mother Teresa). That is why Paul in the second reading invites us, "Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus." To be joyful is God's plan for us. Whoever lives God's plan as their life, will never miss a moment to live in JOY.

Dec. 14 Monday: "Life is like riding a bicycle. To keep your balance you must keep moving."

(Albert Einstein). Today's first reading reminds us that our life is not to get stuck but to keep on moving. When we change the way we look at people, the people we look at change. People will relate with us in a Godly way if we try to know and understand them as God would. In today's Gospel, (Matthew 21:23-27) the religious authorities could not move towards understanding Jesus, which made Jesus unable to move towards them. Life is a constant travel. Blessed are those who are not stuck. They will never lack joy in moving.

Dec. 15 Tuesday: "Preach the Gospel always and when necessary use words" (Francis of Assisi). Because deeds speak louder than words, in today's Gospel story, neither of his two sons did what the Father asked them to do. The first son verbally pleased the father but not in deed, while the second son verbally displeased him but obeyed him in deed. What matters at the end with God or people is not just verbal consent but living the consent in actual deeds. Without deeds life is just a day dream. Without real consent life is a heavy burden.

Dec. 16 Wednesday: Being in prison, John the Baptist sent his disciples to know personally from Jesus if he

lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised...." (Luke 7:18-23). Doubt can only be removed by action (J. Wolfgang von Goethe). Our faith can move mountains and our doubt can create them. Doubt makes us weak. Believing in ourselves and God makes us strong.

Dec. 17 Thursday: Just seven more days to Christmas. Starting from today we will hear Gospel stories directly connected to the birth of Jesus. Today's Gospel (Matthew 1:1-17) is the Family tree starting from Abraham through King David and ending with Jesus. Jesus, the Son of God, was born of Mary, and also called the Son of David belonging to the lineage of David through Joseph. Like Jesus, each of us has three identify-references for ourselves. Biologically, each of us is a child of our parents, genealogically, belonging to a family tree, race, nation etc., and spiritually, bearing the image of God. Let us be proud of who we are and pray that God help us live our personal, social and spiritual identity to the best.





Dec. 18 Friday: "If you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem." (African Proverb). In today's Gospel (Matthew 1:18-25), the pregnant Mary becomes the problem for her betrothed husband Joseph. While Joseph tries to get out of the problem by thinking of quietly divorcing Mary, God elevates him to solve it by making him the foster father of the child born of Mary. While Joseph was focusing on the problem, God turned his focus on the solution. The easier way to solve a problem is to stop participating in the

problem. Our faith in God will never make us perspire by blaming the problems; it will inspire and empower us by living the solutions.

Dec. 19 Saturday: In today's Gospel Story (Luke 1:5-25), on the one hand Zachariah is happy that he and his wife would have a male child in their advanced age; on the other hand he wanted to know "How shall I know this? For I am an old man, and my wife is advanced in years."

So the angel replied to him, "Because you did not believe my words you will be unable to talk until the day your son will be born." God often invites us to trust in wonders which are

humanly or logically impossible to explain, accept, or believe. Those times it is better to withdraw ourselves into silence and meditative prayer than to live our every moment in anxiety and empty talks. The fruit of silence is prayer. The fruit of prayer is faith. The fruit of faith is love. The fruit of love is service. The fruit of service is peace. MOTHER TERESA

Silence in the presence of God is a powerful means to understand and experience the wonders of life. When our heart knows, it knows. There is no explaining it. We can only trust it.

CIRCLE OF WOMEN


It is the mission of the Circle of Women Book Group to focus on the spiritual influence of contemporary writing that facilitates our own reflections of God's action in our daily lives.

Warning! Religious Freedom: What's at Stake If We Lose It

"Religious freedom is more than the 'freedom to worship' at a synagogue, church, or mosque. It means people shouldn't have to go against their core values and beliefs in order to conform to culture or government," wrote the Heritage Foundation, a public policy foundation. "Religious freedom protects a person's right to live, speak, and act according to their beliefs peacefully and publicly." ⁽¹⁾

Supreme Court Justice Samuel Alito recently spoke about his concern that religious liberty is under threat in the United States and warned that the ongoing coronavirus pandemic was acting as a "stress test" for Constitutional liberties. He fears that religious liberty is emerging as a "disfavored" and "second tier" right. "The pandemic has obviously taken a heavy human toll...But what has it meant for the rule of law?" said Justice Alito. "The pandemic has resulted in previously unimaginable restrictions on individual liberty ... We have never before seen restrictions as severe, extensive, and prolonged as those experienced for most of 2020." ⁽²⁾

Justice Alito raised concerns about the closure of churches on Easter Sunday and the closure of synagogues during the Jewish holidays of Passover and Yom Kipper. "The covid crisis has served ... to highlight disturbing trends that were already present before the virus struck." ⁽³⁾ He said that cases the court hears today follow a trend of eroding religious liberty.

Justice Alito was critical of states restricting worship services and especially cited the Nevada case. "Take a quick look at the Constitution. You will see the Free Exercise Clause of the First Amendment, which protects religious liberty. You will not find a craps clause or a blackjack clause or a slot machine clause. Nevada was unable to provide any plausible justification for treating casinos more favorably than houses of worship." ⁽⁴⁾

What's at stake? Heritage wrote, "Religious freedom prevents the cultural majority from using the power of the state to impose their beliefs on others. This protects everyone - religious and nonreligious alike - from the government becoming so powerful that it can tell people what to think and how to act. ... A government that intrudes on conscience will not hesitate to intrude on our other freedoms." ⁽⁵⁾
