Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

December 27, 2020 The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Josephy Sirach 3:2-6, 2-14 Psalm: 128: 1-2, 3, 4-5 Colossians 3:12-21 Luke: 2:22-40

A reading from the Gospel of Luke:

When the days were completed for their purification according to the law of Moses, They took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, just as it is written in the law of the Lord.

Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord, and to offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons, in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord.

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, awaiting the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord.

He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, He took him into his arms and blessed God, saying:

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother,

"Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted —and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eightyfour. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

A famous writer once sent Christmas cards containing nothing but twenty five letters of the English alphabet. When some of his friends admitted that they had failed to understand his message, he pointed to the card and said, "Look! No L". Yes the powerful message of Christmas is NOEL. This French word means Christmas, the birth of Jesus and the news of God's coming to us.

The Fourth Sunday of Advent brings Christmas, NOEL, very close -- in four days the Eve of Christmas. Because of the Pandemic Virus we are disappointed being unable to celebrate Christmas in the usual way. 2020 Christmas will be strange and unusual. But Christmas in its very nature is the celebration of God who was born among us in an unusual way. The eternal God to be born in finite flesh is unusual. The Almighty God to be a helpless child in a poor maiden's arms is unusual. The creator of the universe to be born in a manger is unusual. The people who waited centuries for His arrival did not recognize or welcome Him is unusual. Christmas is the time of reminding us that life consists of more unusuals than usuals.

The traditional celebration of Christmas lost the original 'unusual' spiritual reality of the first Christmas. We added colorful decorations, sumptuous dinners, clean and beautiful crèches, Santa loaded with gifts etc. Amidst all these added traditional elements, the spiritual reality of Jesus's presence and the meaning of Christmas is lost. Especially at this pandemic time when we cannot have the regular (traditional) festive expressions, we can live through this festive time in one of the two following ways. 1) we can go depressed at the thought that it is going to be a strange Christmas without the traditional elements. 2) Or we can take this time to experience the Original Christmas which was nothing but unusual. It is still Christmas. Even now, at this difficult time, the Birth of Jesus, the main reason for the celebration of Christmas happens without fail. Though strange, even this

year's Christmas can have the same spiritual joy. This Strange situation may not have the usual way of expressing our Christmas Joy. But it does not mean that there can be any less joy in celebrating Christmas. This strange occasion can be spiritually handled to draw out from it a special spiritual joy which we lost by the traditional elements of expressing joy. Let us join the Original Christmas, the first Christmas which was the simplest and humblest one with all the spiritual joy, Godly presence and Divine meaning.



On this positive note: I wish you and your family a MERRY CHRISTMAS. May Jesus be born in your hearts and homes. May our celebration

empower us to go through our strange time with God's guidance and enthusiasm.

ADVENT – Time of PEACE

Now we are in the fourth week of Advent. The Fourth candle of the Advent wreath is lit. "Peace" is the right key to enter our inner spiritual resources. We are very close to the birth of Jesus when 'Peace on Earth' and Glory in Heaven' were promised. It may take a minute to read each day's reflection. Please reflect and pray as a first thing in the morning before the start of any work. Be

conscious of the words of scripture through the day. It will empower

you the whole day in God's way.

Dec. 20 Fourth Sunday of Advent: "It is not what you are that is holding you. It is what you think you are not." Our human worth is so precious to God that God Himself became human. In today's readings, King David expressed his inability (unworthiness) to build a house for God but God explained to him how God will make his family worthy of an enduring kingdom forever. The Blessed Virgin Mary was expressing her inability to conceive, since she had no



relations with a man. But God explained to her that the power of the Most High God would enable her to be worthy of giving birth to the Son of God "for nothing will be impossible for God." We are not a simple combination of our worth and unworthiness. We become worthy or unworthy of how much we allow God to do worthy things in and through us. Let us know our worth and never settle for less than what God wants to accomplish in us.

<u>Dec. 21 Monday:</u> "I want to know all God's thoughts; all the rest are just details." (Albert Einstein).



In today's Gospel two pregnant women, Mary and Elizabeth meet with each other. When Mary walked into Elizabeth's house, the infant leaped in her womb. Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, acknowledged Mary as the Blessed one who believed that what

was spoken to her by the Lord would be fulfilled. Mary and Elizabeth were affirmation to each other of God's revelation and His work in them. When

we come together as friends or families we can become God's revelation to each other. We can be God's message and God's work to each other.

<u>Dec. 22 Tuesday:</u> We say...'Show me and I'll trust you.' God says... 'Trust me and I'll show you.' We trust and plant the seed in order to see the Harvest' (Psalm 126:6). In today's Gospel, Mary, pregnant



with Jesus, joyfully and gratefully sings, "From this day all generations will call me blessed: the Almighty has done great things for me." Her pregnancy is like a seed in which Mary trustingly sees the future harvest of all generations praising her as God's mother. Trust is the basic virtue. Trust sees in a single seed a big tree hidden with lots of fruits.

<u>Dec. 23 Wednesday:</u> When Elizabeth conceived a child, the Angel Gabriel made Zachariah, her husband unable to speak because he did not believe God's words (Luke 1:20). Today's Gospel narrates the birth of their child. (Luke 1:57-66). He did not name the child after his name Zachariah but 'John' meaning "God has been gracious" because now he is to able to know that

supply all your

purely by God's grace he and his wife became parents of a child in their advanced age. It is God's gracious great plan for this child to become John the Baptist and to herald and baptize God's son Jesus. We are filled with God's grace in our Baptism. "God's work done in God's way will never lack God's supply." (Hudson Taylor)


<u>Dec. 24 Thursday</u>: At the Angel's Command when he became speechless from his child's conception to birth, he must have reflected very much on how God

works. Today's Gospel narrates that Zachariah got his speech back and

sang a song. His whole song describes that his child, John would announce the coming of God's gracious time upon his people, "In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us." What John announced actually came true in Jesus. Today we celebrate the Eve of Christmas, the Birth of Jesus, as one

of us, to be with us Emmanuel God. Let us prepare our hearts and homes in faith to experience the tender compassion of our God. "No one has ever seen God. Yet, if we love one another, God remains in us, and his love is brought to perfection in us." (First letter of John 4:12)

Dec. 25 Christmas 2020 is the unique occasion to allow the birth of Jesus in our hearts and homes to

inspire the inner power and vision to still live through difficult times in joy and peace. Christmas 2020

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

When he was elected as a Successor of St. Peter on March 13, 2013, our Holy Father chose the name *Francis*. It was a weighty decision with a prophetic message. Especially now, seven years later and with the publication of his latest encyclical *Fratelli Tutti* from the tomb of St. Francis of Assisi on October 3, 2020, the significance of the choice is clear: Pope Francis connects his papacy to St. Francis.

Through the ministry of our Holy Father, St. Francis of Assisi is close to the Church in these times. Therefore, as we draw near to Bethlehem at the end of this difficult year, I wish to recall two points Pope Francis highlights from the life of St. Francis. One will help us celebrate the Nativity of Our Lord; the other indicates a grace for which to pray during the holy season.

First, in his 2019 Apostolic Letter Admirabile Signum: On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene, Pope Francis emphasizes St. Francis of Assisi's foundational role in our celebration of Christmas. The Holy Father recalls the origins of the crèche and the first nativity scene inspired by the holy friar in 1223, by which the saint sought "to bring to life the memory of that babe born in Bethlehem." Importantly, the remembrance of Christ's birth that St. Francis desired to convey was brought alive in Greccio, a small village in Italy, not by statues but by people from the surrounding towns and countryside. Together with St. Francis, his friars, an ox and a donkey, they gathered at a cave to behold a manger full of hay over which the Eucharist was celebrated. That Christmas night, almost 800 years ago, Pope Francis reminds us, "the nativity scene was enacted and experienced by all who were present." That night, there was "no distance between the original event and those sharing in its mystery." (2) Encountering Christ, there was simply joy and hope.

This Christmas, in our world laden with the Crosses of COVID-19, political and economic turmoil, racism, financial hardship, and so many other societal ills and challenges – challenges that impact us on Long Island – let us remember this lesson from Greccio: Christmas is an event to be lived. It demands our participation. Like the women and men who embodied that first crèche, we must be present to Christ who is born for us. We must behold and receive Him.

Second, in *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis shows St. Francis as an icon of Christocentric-listening. With great humility and charity, the saint reverently listened to others. He was present to the various voices in his life – the voice of God, the voice of his neighbor, the voice of the poor, the voice of the sick, the voice of nature – and by truly hearing them, he was an instrument of peace, healing, and understanding. How different it can be for us! The Holy Father says well what we know: "Today's world is largely a deaf world...At times, the frantic pace of the modern world prevents us from listening attentively to what another person is saying." Aware of this fact, the Pope encourages us, in the midst of our hectic and polarized world, to be like St. Francis and "not lose our ability to listen." (48)

This Christmas, when we approach the crib, let us ask for the grace to be attentive listeners. Let us ask for the grace to be like St. Francis, so that we may hear the voice of God and the voice of our neighbor and respond with the radical charity he exhibited.¹

Like Pope Francis, may we be moved by the example of St. Francis, and may St. Francis of Assisi's love for the Mystery of the Nativity, his ecstatic mysticism, his love for the poor, and his spirit of universal fraternity animate our celebration of Christmas this year.

May God bless you and your families this Christmas.
