



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

January 24, 2021 Third Sunday in Ordinary Time Jonah 3:1-5, 10 Psalm: 25:4-5, 6-7, 8-9 1 Corinthians 7:29-31 Mark 1:14-20

A reading from the Gospel of Mark:

After John had been arrested, Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the Gospel of God: "This is the time of fulfillment.

The Kingdom of God is at hand.

Repent, and believe in the Gospel."

As he passed by the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting their nets into the sea; they were fishermen. Jesus said to them.

"Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men."

Then they left their nets and followed him. He walked along a little farther and saw James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John. They too were in a boat mending their nets. Then he called them.

So they left their father Zebedee in the boat along with the hired men and followed him.



FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

Doctor tells a man that he will die by the next morning. The man goes home and tells his wife about this and asks her to stay awake the whole night so they can talk about all the good memories they share. The wife starts to fall asleep after some time. The man asks "Why are you falling asleep?" The wife replies "You don't have to wake up tomorrow morning, but I do!"

In today's first reading God wakes up the boy Samuel three times. Samuel woke up all the times but could not recognize who woke him up until Eli, his spiritual mentor instructed Him at the third time that it is God who wakes him up to give him a special mission.

In the Gospel John and his disciples watched Jesus walk by. But his disciples needed their master John to introduce them to Jesus, as the Lamb of God. This introduction is needed for them to follow Jesus. When they actually followed Jesus, Jesus did not allow them to follow him blindly, but invited them to the next level of following that is to "come and see."

In both readings we learn that in order to experience God in our life we have to be awake first. God

calls or God walks by our life's path but if we are not awake like the boy Samuel or unable to

the boy Samuel or unab recognize Him like John

recognize Him like John the Baptizer, we would miss Him. We need the readiness like Samuel and the discipleship of John to hear and willingness to follow the instructions.

Once we are awake and follow the Lord we will be invited by Jesus to the next level to "Come and See." Our spiritual experience of God, is not a method or program that we apply to ourselves. It is an invitation of "Come and See" which means it is an everyday

living experience with Jesus. It is a

personal relationship of living with God in all that we think, feel, say or do. The message of God being born as Jesus is to live with us and develop a personal living relationship with us. Let us open our hearts like the boy Samuel and the first disciples of Jesus to recognize Jesus walking by us and ready to live with Him who is willing to be with us.

Year of St. Joseph: On Dec. 8, 1870 Pope Pius IX declared St. Joseph, as the patron of the Universal Church. This year marks the 150th anniversary of this proclamation. Pope Francis dedicated this year to St. Joseph beginning from Dec. 8, 2020, and concluding on Dec. 8, 2021.

Pope Francis said that the coronavirus pandemic has

heightened his desire to reflect on St. Joseph, because so many

people during the pandemic have made hidden sacrifices to protect others, just as St. Joseph quietly protected and cared for Mary and Jesus. "Each of us can discover in Joseph -- the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence -- an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble,"

"Go to Joseph" (*Ite Ad Joseph*). These were the words of Pharaoh to the people of Egypt during the years of famine (Gen. 41:55). The same phrase is now addressed in catholic tradition to St. Joseph in all moments of trials and troubles. Let us pray especially through the intercession of St. Joseph to stay safe and healthy.

Focus on Religious Freedom

America As a Religious Refuge in the 17th Century - Part 1

Refusing to compromise passionately held religious convictions, in 1620, 102 Pilgrims, followed by thousands of Puritans from 1630 -1640s, fled European persecution for the British North American colonies. The New England colonies of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Maryland were established as "plantations of religion." (1) Some settlers came for secular motives but the great majority left Europe to worship God in the way they believed to be correct. They enthusiastically supported the efforts of their leaders to create "a city on a hill" or a "holy experiment," whose success would prove that God's plan for his churches could be successfully realized in the American wilderness. Even colonies like Virginia that were planned as commercial ventures, were led by selfproclaimed "militant Protestants."

The Puritans settled in Massachusetts with a goal to make the church more holy. By 1690 they were the largest religious group with 50,000 living in MA. Since they believed theirs was the only true religion, they expelled those who disagreed. Puritan minister, Roger Williams, disagreed with compelling others to agree with him and was forced to leave the colony in 1636. He went on to establish the colony of Rhode Island founded on the principle of religious freedom.

America is Still an Asylum for those Seeking Religious Freedom

A U.S. core value is the right to be a member of any religion you choose and to worship openly. This is why America grants religious asylum to those who have been persecuted for their beliefs.

The Commission on International Religious Freedom was formed in 1998 to study the impact and violations of religious freedom around the world. (3)

Happening Now: Religious Freedom Day, January 16

On Jan. 16, 1787, the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom was signed into state law and is one of the most important documents in early U.S. religious history. It was the model for the religious clauses of the First Amendment of the Constitution, ratified in 1791.

Each year, the President of the United States issues a Proclamation on Religious Freedom Day. In 2020, Pres. Trump wrote:

"On Religious Freedom Day, we honor the foundational link between freedom and faith in our country and reaffirm our commitment to safeguarding the religious liberty of all Americans."
