Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

February 7, 2021 Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time Job 7:1-4, 6-7 Psalm: 147;1-2, 3-4, 5-6 1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23 Mark 1:29-39

A reading from the Gospel of Mark:

On leaving the synagogue Jesus entered the house of Simon and Andrew with James and John.


Simon's mother-in-law lay sick with a fever. They immediately told him about her. He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up. Then the fever left her and she waited on them.

When it was evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were ill or possessed by demons. The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons, not permitting them to speak because they knew him.

Rising very early before dawn, he left and went off to a deserted place, where he prayed. Simon and those who were with him pursued him and on finding him said, "Everyone is looking for you."

He told them, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For this purpose have I come."

So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the whole of Galilee.



FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

A gardener took great pride in caring for his lawn. But one time it grew full of dandelions. He tried every method and product to get rid of them, but nothing worked. Exasperated, he wrote to the Department of Agriculture explaining all that he had done. He wrote "What shall I try next?" After three days came the reply "Try getting used to them." It is easy and less risky to get used to things than to challenge ourselves and the situational forces. In order to be new, we should be ready to give up our own customized, habitual comfort zone.

Today's Gospel narrates the story of Jesus driving out the evil spirit from a possessed man and the astonishment of the people at Jesus' teaching and deeds. Like His healing, His teaching was very different from what they were used to hearing from the scribes in their synagogues. His healing liberated the possessed man from the evil spirit and empowered all the hearers to experience something new. It was new with authority.

In order to be new we need to be liberated from what we are used to. The authoritative words of Jesus can free us from what has frozen our life-forces in various entanglements, enslavements, habits, addictions and comfort zones. Once that which freezes us is removed, we become empowered to grow, blossom, be creative and new. Then we too, like the people of today's Gospel will experience the astonishment of creative and blossoming power liberating us to be new.

To be new is to be creative. To be empowered by God is not to live the routine but to allow God's creative power to actualize God's plan in one's everyday life. Unless our life shares in God's creative




spirit and power it will just be repetitions of what we are used to or convenient and comfortable with. The amazement of life happens only when God's authority and newness becomes our life. May God make our life after the model of Jesus preaching... with God's creative authority and power.

confession, receiving the Eucharist, and praying for the intentions of the pope

What is an indulgence? As St. John Paul II once said; an indulgence is not a quick ticket to heaven; rather, it is an aid for the real conversion that leads to eternal happiness. It frees a person from the punishment their sinfulness warrants as it is a remission of the temporal punishment due for sins that



- To those who meditate on the Our Father prayer for at least 30 minutes or take part in a spiritual retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on St. Joseph
- To those who perform a corporal or spiritual work of mercy.
- To families or engaged couples who recite the rosary together.
- To those who entrust their daily work to St. Joseph and those who ask St. Joseph to intercede for the unemployed.

To the elderly, sick, dying and those legitimately unable to leave the house, who recite an act of piety to St. Joseph under his title of Comfort of the Sick and Patron of a happy death, provided they offer their discomfort to God and fulfill the conditions for the indulgence as soon as possible.

The Decline - & Possible Fall — Religious Freedom in America

"Historically, religion and its adherents have often been oppressed by government. By contrast, America has been singular in its dedication to preserving the freedom of its people to expect and experience religious freedom. That is now rapidly changing," wrote Kelly Shackelford, president of First Liberty law firm. (1) In the past vear there have been a number of violent attacks on churches, church gatherings, statues of Jesus, Virgin Mary, saints and monuments. Churches, synagogues and other church services have been banned or severely restricted, while liquor stores & casinos are allowed to be open. "A nation truly committed to religious freedom would, in a time of national crisis, welcome the essentiality of religion's exercise - not ban it." (2)

Religious liberty court cases have increased at an alarming rate. From the Constitution's ratification until 1940, there were only 3 Supreme Court cases challenging religious freedom. But since then, more than 75 cases have come before the high Court. Religious freedom has been under increasing siege for eight decades now. (3)

"Our Constitution was made only for a moral and religious people.

It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other."

John Adams, Founding Father and second president.

Speaking at the Univ. of Notre Dame Law School on Oct. 11, 2019, A.G. William Barr said that attacks on religious liberty have contributed to a moral decline in this country. "Secularists and their allies have marshaled all the forces of mass communication, popular culture, the entertainment industry, and academia in an unremitting assault on religion and traditional

values." (4)

"The moral problems Barr mentioned in his speech - plus murder, mayhem, and other forms of anti-social behavior - will continue until we regain our moral footing," wrote Dr. Walter E. Williams, professor of economics at George Mason University. "I am all too afraid that a historian, writing a few hundred years from now, will note that the liberty America enjoyed was simply a historical curiosity. Then it all returned to mankind's normal state of affairs - arbitrary abuse and control by the powerful elite." (5)





Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Beginning Sunday, January 31, 2021 and continuing through February 6, 2021, the 35 Catholic elementary schools in the Diocese of Rockville Centre will participate in the annual national celebration of Catholic education: Catholic Schools Week.

The theme for National Catholic Schools Week 2021 is "Catholic Schools: Faith. Excellence. Service." Schools typically observe the week with Masses, open houses and other activities for students, families, parishioners, and community members. Through these events, schools focus on the value Catholic education provides young people and its contributions to our church, our communities, and our nation.

This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Catholic Schools Week will look a bit different. In lieu of the traditional open houses our schools have held in the past to meet with prospective families, the schools will be offering virtual open houses and one-to-one meetings with principals that will allow prospective families to 'visit' the Catholic school(s) of their choice from the safety and comfort of their homes.

This year, in spite of the pandemic, we have made significant progress transforming our schools through the Morning Star Initiative (MSI). Many elements of the Morning Star Initiative are already in place, like key academic improvements in mathematics, reading, and religious studies, which are helping students reach new potential. I am so grateful for the tireless dedication of the MSI team.

Working with the MSI team, Long Island's Catholic elementary school faculty and staff continue to put the needs of the 11,626 students (nursery-8th grade) and their families first. From maintaining the continuity of instruction during remote learning when the Covid-19 pandemic hit back in March, to taking all of the necessary precautions to welcome students back into a safe school environment this fall, I am extremely grateful for the grit and determination demonstrated by our school community to address the academic, spiritual and social needs of our students.

Earlier this month, on January 4, 2021, we celebrated the 200th anniversary of the death of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821), one of the great native-born American Evangelizers and champions of Catholic Education. Please join me in praying that Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton and Mary, Star of Evangelization continue to intercede for each of us, for our Morning Star and Department of Education teams, and for our principals, teachers, and staff.
