



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

February 28, 2021 Second Sunday of Lent Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18 Psalm: 116:10, 15, 16-17, 18-19 Romans 8:31b-34 Mark 9:2-10

A reading from the Gospel of Mark:

Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them.

Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus.

Then Peter said to Jesus in reply, "Rabbi, it is good that we are here! Let us make three tents: one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah."

He hardly knew what to say, they were so terrified. Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone but Jesus alone with them.

As they were coming down from the mountain, he charged them not to relate what they had seen to anyone, except when the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what rising from the dead meant.



FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Two salesmen went to Timbuktu to open new sales territories. At their arrival the first salesman sent a message, "I will be returning on next plane. I can't sell shoes here. Everyone goes barefoot all the time." The second salesman sent an airmail envelope to the home office after two weeks, "Prospects unlimited. Nobody here has shoes. Fifty orders enclosed."

Life is filled with lots of opportunities to reap the best or the worst out of them. It depends on our choice of how we want to live it.

On the first Sunday of Lent the Gospel speaks about the temptation of Christ. Jesus the Son of God was no exemption to temptation. Like us, He too was tempted by the devil when He lived as a human being. What is Temptation? In the Bible, temptation primarily denotes a trial in which a person has a free choice of being faithful or unfaithful to God; and to him or herself. The main temptation for Jesus was whether He would exploit his human nature at the cost His divine nature or vice versa.

The Gospels report many occasions of Jesus's temptation. When He multiplied the bread and fish to feed over 5000 people they wanted to make Him a king (John 6:14-15). Jesus could easily have got the benefit of using divine power to become their King. But he did not do so. Likewise when he was hanging on the cross, his persecutors tempted Him to use his divine power to come down from the cross. He did not yield to the temptation. He lived the divine power in the weakness of the human body and at the same time expressed the divine message mercy and forgiveness in his human person. He was true to Himself as God-man. He lived 100% of his human and divine nature without reducing any of them, without one exploiting the other.



Our temptation is also of the same nature. We are humans but bear

God's image in each of us. We are called to live the divine image in our human activities and approach God in our human weakness to depend on the divine strength. In the weakness we can be unjust to ourselves forgetting to live our divine image. Likewise we can fail our human duties in the name of our false piety or forgetting the poor in the name of serving God.

Let us imitate Jesus and in His wisdom pray for His strength to be true to ourselves and overcome the temptation. Let us be true to our human nature bearing the divine image.

Website (stmli.org) everyday through Lent. It is a spiritual tool to fill your Lenten 40 days with spiritual experience. It is a seven to eight lines of reflection based on every day's Gospel. It will just take 2 minutes of your time to read through but the spiritual impact from it will lead you through the whole day with new spiritual wisdom and power. Please treat yourself with this spiritual tool. Your Lenten days will be filled with new meaning and spiritual power.

Stations of the Cross: It is the church tradition to pray the Stations of the Cross during Lenten Fridays. During this Pandemic time we will pray the Stations inside the Church on Fridays at 7:00 pm. At the same time we will broadcast the Stations of the Cross prayed by different Groups through our Parish website. This week, Friday February.19, 2021 at 7:00 pm, the 9:00 am the daily Mass attenders would lead the Stations.

Praying Tool for Lent:

February 21, First Sunday of Lent: Life is full of 'challenge-solving' opportunities. The challenges we face will either defeat us or develop us depending on how we respond to them. Jesus, the Son of God who incarnated 100% as a human was no exception to challenges. During His 40- day fast, the Devil challenged Him three times (Matthew 4:1-11) to reduce His divine personality at the cost of the three human faculties respectively. 1) Bodily need (to turn the stones into bread with His divine power to appease his hunger) 2) Intellectual curiosity (to jump



from the parapet of the Temple to see if God would save Him) 3) Spiritual surrender to the Devil (to worship the Devil in order to possess the Kingdoms of the earth)

Jesus tries to argue or reason with the Devil that He cannot give up divine-human integrity at the cost of any single human faculty's need. Temptation to sin would first appear as a timely and justified human need. Challenges of life always appear as a problem to one of three human faculties. Holiness or victory over temptation consists in not disintegrating oneself. Bodily need must not undermine the Intellectual and spiritual definition of who we are. Neither must the mere intellectual justification overlook the Bodily need or Spiritual meaning of life. Nor must the Spiritual Surrender to God blind the human bodily suffering and dry rationality around us. Lent is the time to live our Godgiven-integrated originality.

Monday, February 22,. Feast of the Chair of Saint Peter, Apostle: Today, let us see how God

Upon This ROCK ter, "Who do you say that I am?" When Jesus learnt from Peter's reply that he rightly understood Him, Jesus empowered him as the Rock on which the church of Jesus would be built. Our faith in Jesus is not simply a spiritual wish or dream. Our Faith in God is power allowing God to handle our life with God's plan and power. We become the rock of God on which God will I Will Build My Church build and bless all who are under our care. Each of us is called by God to profess our faith in God, and in turn be empowered by God to be His rock.

February 23, Tuesday of the First Week of Lent: Jesus teaches to pray 'Our Father'. The prayer consists of two parts. In the first part we pray that our earth be like Heaven by allowing God's kingdom and His will to happen among us. In the second part we pray God to empower us physically by daily bread. But in our weakness we can make a mess of God's will. and work against each other. So the prayer continues to seek God's forgiveness for our shortcomings and readiness to

forgive each other's mess. We are weak and plead to God to prevent us from falling into the mess and save us from any evil influence. The gist of the whole prayer is the simple wish of Jesus. God's heaven can be on earth if we allow God to work in us and to rise above each other's weakness.

February 24, Wednesday of the First Week of Lent: Today we read the story



of Jonah not willing to do God's mission. Jonah took a cruise to be away from God. God made a huge fish swallow him and vomit Jonah upon the shore of Nineveh where he ended up doing God's mission. Sometimes it is very difficult to understand why things happen in our life. Resenting the situation only would aggravate us more and drain all our positive energy. Jesus turned even His death on the Cross as the path to Resurrection. We too have in each of us the grace we received in Baptism to turn negative situations into positive ones.


February 25, Thursday of the First Week of Lent: "Ask and it will be given to you... For everyone who asks, receives..." While we believe in these words of Jesus, often our experience is that we don't receive all things we ask for. So it is good at times to check how and what we ask. Jesus instructs us to pray like a child with unfailing faith in the father who will never disappoint his child because no father "would hand his son a stone when he asked for a loaf of bread, or a snake when he asked for a fish." It is not what we have or do not have that will promise life. Rather it is the right relationship that God would provide all that we need. As mother Teresa says "only God knows our true needs."




February 26, Friday of the First Week of Lent: "You need knives and guns to kill me? No need, it is

At the end of the day, I'm at peace because my intentions are good and my heart is pure. your words which killed me first." (Prakash Chengati). Action is the end result of what started with intention, brewed in thoughts and often expressed in words. Jesus says that the person who curses the other is liable to judgement equally like the person who kills the other. Likewise our offerings to God would be useless if we have caused the other to be against us. Loving relationships make the simplest object as a precious gift. On the other hand even the costliest gift would be worthless if the heart is not right.

February 27, Saturday of the First Week of Lent: "I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you." It would seem impractical and impossible to live these words of Jesus. Yes, it is impossible if we accept ourselves to be merely weak human beings, who would basically react to whatever happens to us. These words of Jesus invite us to see in ourselves that we are the children of our heavenly Father who "makes his sun rise on the bad and the good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust." We may be weak but we bear the traits of God to act from our goodness and thus not to react to what others do to us. As God's children we all have the will and power to act as God our Father. Jesus encourages us not only to love our



enemies but also to "be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect." Yes we can do it. It all depends on how we treat ourselves-- weak reactive humans or pure active children of God?

The Decline of Teaching Factual American History in Public Schools - Part 2

At the beginning of the 20th century, social engineers embraced John Dewey's *Pedagogic Creed* of 1897 that said, "Every teacher should realize he is a social servant set apart for the maintenance of the proper social order and the securing of the right social growth. In this way the teacher is always the prophet of the true God and the usher in of the true kingdom of heaven." (1)

Dewey, a philosopher, psychologist, and considered the "Father of American Education," became an agnostic/atheist and "replaced Christianity with a religion of his own, secular humanism," (2) that embraces human reason and secular ethics, while specifically rejecting religious dogma. Dewey was co-author of the *Humanist Manifesto (1933)*, that believed the time has passed for belief in God, and that prayer and worship are to be replaced by efforts to promote social well-being. "His work provided a foundation and a foot in the door for the secular humanist movement...the dominant religion in America today," wrote Brad Harrub, author and researcher. (3)

Thus, knowing John Dewey's philosophy, parents can understand why history has been made almost irrelevant in most American schools. America's actual founding on escape from religious persecution, individual liberty, Religious Freedom, the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the best

place for freedom, hope, and opportunity, has been replaced by efforts to undermine, ignore and diminish the country's founding principles.

"We cannot give up. America is too important ... and so is the future of our children. ... Let us in 2021 remain together as a community and keep proclaiming the authentic American ideals and principles - our historic values," said Rabbi Aryeh Spero, Conference of Jewish Affairs.



Instructions for New York State-Operated Vaccination Sites:

Step 1: Determine eligibility and schedule an appointment. The Am I Eligible app is the quickest way to see if you're eligible and make an appointment. You can also call the New York State COVID-19 Vaccination Hotline at 1-833-NYS-4-VAX (1-833-697-4829). Once you have successfully scheduled an appointment, you will receive a confirmation email that contains a barcode. You will need to bring this to your appointment.

Step 2: Complete the Vaccine Form. Once you have a confirmed appointment, you must complete the New York State COVID-19 Vaccine Form. This form should be filled out online and you will receive a submission ID indicating completion. You will need to bring the submission ID to your appointment. If you cannot submit the form online, it will be available at the vaccination sites.

Step 3: Bring proof of eligibility to your appointment. Depending on your eligibility category, proof can include an employee ID card, a letter from an employer or affiliated organization, a pay stub, a driver's license, passport, or any legal proof of your date of birth and residency. At the time of your appointment, you'll be asked a series of clinical questions to ensure readiness for a vaccine. You will be asked for insurance information BUT the vaccine is free and there will never be a charge to you. This information is for administrative use only.

Step 4: Your second dose appointment will be scheduled automatically when you receive your first vaccine dose. Your second appointment will be scheduled for the same time and at the same location, three weeks following your first dose. You will receive a card onsite with the date and time indicated and a confirmation email will follow a few days later. Please keep in mind when scheduling your first appointment that your second appointment will occur at the same time of day.
