FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Devotee: “Lord, where are you? I am searching for you everywhere and you don’t seem to be anywhere. Are you not hearing me? Where are you?”

God: “I am here, very near to you.”

Devotee: “Come on, tell me....where?”

God: “Deep within you. In your Heart.”

God like Love cannot be found unless you feel it for yourself within your heart.

On the Fifth Sunday of Lent, the Prophet Jeremiah, in the first reading explains how God can be experienced within each of us. “I will place my law within them and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer will they have need to teach their friends and relatives how to know the LORD.” All we need to do, as the Responsorial Psalm instructs, is to have a clean heart and steadfast spirit so that our search for God is not mired in the swamps of various other interests nor is our search is slackened by them.

In the Gospel Jesus realizes that his Hour has come to experience within Himself His divine Glory and express it to the world. This Hour is his moment of facing the passion and death on the Cross. But He calls his suffering and death as the Hour of Glory. It is the Hour when He, like a seed would fall on the ground in order to bear fruit. His Hour is the time when the world will begin to realize who He is and what kind of fruit the world would receive from Him. Jesus was always conscious of this Hour of Glory and He was never hesitant to live it and reveal it the World.

Today’s readings invite us to see that we can easily be conscious of God because God is in our heart. We are called to live like Jesus. As Jesus lived what God made Him conscious of, even unto death, so are we called to live what God makes us conscious of. Our Lenten observances and everyday prayers are nothing but an attempt to consciously live God’s presence within us and to have the courage to experience and express that God’s presence.

Next Sunday is Palm Sunday. Palms will be distributed at the beginning of masses on Palm Sunday, taking appropriate precautions. We will begin the mass blessing the Palms and reading from the Gospel the event of the First Palm Sunday when Jesus entered the city of Jerusalem for his last week on earth as a human being willingly undergoing the passion, death on the Cross, and the Resurrection on the third day.

Virtual Lenten Parish Mission is this week on March 22, 23 and 24 at 7:00 pm. The theme of the Mission, as we announced, is **Spiritual Vaccine**. A group of people has planned well with the following topics.

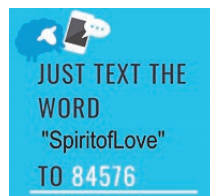

Praying Tool for Lent:

March 21, Fifth Sunday of Lent: I read a cool funny quote: “Whenever I clean my closet I take a GPS with me so I can find my way back.” In today’s first reading God says that HE is our inbuilt GPS. “I will place my law within them and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people.” (Jeremiah 31:33). If we are sure of ourselves we may refuse to follow the GPS or ask for directions. To accept that we don’t know enough to take the correct route is to deny (kill) ourselves and allow God to take the wheel. Yes, it is like the grain dying in the ground only to produce much fruit. God’s GPS will bring us to God himself: “Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself.”



March 22, Monday of the Fifth Week of Lent: Law is an instrument just like a knife. Either you can kill someone with it or cure someone using it in surgery. The Gospel today is the famous story of Jesus saving the woman caught in adultery from the killing clutches of the law. “Let the one among you who is without sin, be the first to throw a stone at her.” (John 8:7) These words of Jesus like the knife of surgery tore open the hearts of the accusers to see the saving grace of God. God’s grace is the goal of the Law. The Law condemns the best of us; but grace saves the worst of us. (Joseph Prince)



March 23, Tuesday of the Fifth Week of Lent: When people of God sin, God is ready to forgive and let the flow of life continue. The story of today’s first reading explains the Sacrament-ritual of confession. “Wrong is done individually and collectively, and there is a consequence of word and deed. Then there happens awareness and an articulation of sin: CONFESSION. The penance is to look, to see and to acknowledge the consequences together in order to recover with the strength of the hope and faith not to repeat this process too often. (Megan McKenna)



March 24, Wednesday of the Fifth Week of Lent: “Truth and facts are woven together. However, sometimes facts can blind you from seeing the truth of what is actually going on in someone’s life.” (Shannon L. Alder)
The fact about Jesus is that he was a Jewish carpenter, loved by the people as Rabbi, respected as a prophet and a man of God, who was crucified to death. But the believers did not stop the facts at His death but saw in Him a Risen Savior living with us forever in the word of God, the Sacraments and in the Church. Facts can easily freeze us in the past events about Jesus or free us to believe and experience the Truth of Jesus even now. Fact is a starting point to arrive at the power of Truth to experience Jesus as NOW-Reality. Jesus says, “If you remain in my word, you will truly be my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.” (John 8:31)

March 25, Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord: Nine months from today is Christmas. Today is the feast of Mary's consent to conceive Jesus at the requesting command of God, announced to her by the Angel Gabriel. God can request us to bear Him in our words and deeds as He did to Mary. But it is up to us like Mary to cooperate with God or refuse and walk away. Nothing is impossible with God but God never imposes anything against our willful cooperation. God comes to us to be with us. It is our choice either to accept Him as our Savior or to crucify Him to death. "The God who created us without our consent will not save us without our consent." (St. Augustine) The life of a person can be just mechanical, or merely human or purely divine depending on with whom or with what one wishes to cooperate.



March 26, Friday of the Fifth Week of Lent: It is easier to be frozen than to flow like a river. In being frozen we can choose our own place and shape. All that is required is a selfish closure, not to be exposed to any outer challenge. Thus to be frozen is to be dead within oneself. But flowing is freedom and being new always. It requires flowing through lots of turns and twists, deep and shallow situations. To flow is to be alive and growing. In today's Gospel, while His hearers tried to arrest (freeze) Him, Jesus shows how He is life's flow from God and wants us to join the flow. Jesus invites us to flow from where we are frozen. Lent is a time of checking our life whether it is frozen or flowing..

March 27, Saturday of the Fifth Week of Lent: Today is the 39th day of Lent. Tomorrow at the 40th day we begin Holy week, the last week of Jesus' human life on earth. Today's Gospel is about how the humans by killing Jesus were

planning to put an end to God's plan for his people. Holy week will proclaim how God goes along with the human plan in order to bring the best out of the evil plan of humans. We may have devices to defy God but God uses our devices to direct us in divine paths. We use our brain to plan and achieve but God

employs His Heart to love and save us. The whole creation, including us as creatures are providentially guided by God's willful love. "The Lord will guard us, as a shepherd guards his flock. He will turn their mourning into joy. He will console and gladden them after their sorrows."

(Today's Responsorial Psalm Jeremiah 31:13)

Free Text-to-Give

With the Faith Direct's Free Text-to-Give platform, parishioners can text a dollar amount to our parish's assigned number and make a quick gift to our essential collections; or they can text the word "ENROLL" to receive a direct link to the enrollment page where they can create an eGiving account and set up recurring gifts--all from their mobile phones!

If you have Text-to-Give you can add it to different appeals throughout the year. To do so, go to appeals, click on the appeal ID number and then towards the bottom change 'Display Appeal on Give Now' to 'yes' and then change 'Allow Text-to-Give' to 'yes'. This allows parishioners to make one-time gifts using the text to give number. It's a great way to collect donations from parishioners who haven't already enrolled in Faith Direct, it shows them how easy it can be! Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

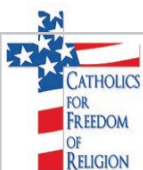
The RCIA is a faith journey which leads those seekers to meet Jesus in the Easter Sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist, and Confirmation.

Focus on Religious Freedom

"Both Religious Leaders and Feminists Alarmed About Threats to Religious Freedom"

The Equality Act has garnered criticism from both feminists and faith leaders who called it "flawed, hateful, and unthinking extremism." (1) "The act is essentially an all-out assault on religious freedom..."said Paul Jonna, counsel for the Thomas More Society. (2)

"(This) Act has been advertised as a fight against bigotry. In truth, it's a fight against freedoms guaranteed in the Constitution - (a fear) shared by both radical feminism and traditional religion," wrote Rabbi Yaakov Menken, director of Coalition for Jewish Values and Natasha Chart, chair of Women's Liberation Front. (3) "We agree entirely that the Equality Act is a fatally flawed and even hateful piece of legislation... Congress is prepared to declare anyone who follows the Bible's definition of marriage or who believes women's sports, prisons and shelters should be reserved for biological women, to be in violation of civil rights law." (4)

The Coalition for Jewish Values (CJV), representing over 1500 traditional, Orthodox rabbis in matters of public policy, calls the Equality Act "a direct attack on Jewish religious values and practices." (5)

In a letter to the House of Representatives, the CJV wrote:

"The Equality Act expressly declares that the Book of Genesis 2:24, and all Jewish laws pertaining to marriage as a sanctified union between a man & woman, are nothing more than engaged in discriminatory stereotypes. This is a disgraceful attack upon Jewish Biblical beliefs, rendered no more excusable by the fact that other traditional religious groups have similar tenets"(6)

"Simply put, the Equality Act as written insults our nation's foundational commitment to the rights of

religious believers.... (It) would aid those who seek to deny America's religious heritage and who seek to portray religious Americans as bigots and haters. Such hostility toward religion should not be promoted, even unwittingly, by federal law," wrote Rabbi Avi Shafran. (7)
