



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

July 11, 2021
Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Amos 7: 12-15
Psalm 85:9-10, 11-12, 13-14
Ephesiana 1: 3-14
Mark 6:7-13

A reading from the Gospel according to Mark:

Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out two by two and gave them authority over unclean spirits.

He instructed them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick—no food, no sack, no money in their belts.

They were, however, to wear sandals but not a second tunic.

He said to them.

"Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave. Whatever place does not welcome you or listen to you, leave there and shake the dust off your feet in testimony against them."

So they went off and preached repentance. The Twelve drove out many demons, and they anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.



FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

"Officer", the guy yelled, "My mother-in-law knocked me down with her car!"

"Are you sure that it was your mother-in-law?" asked the officer.

"Absolutely," the man said, "I would recognize that laugh anywhere."

How do we recognize a person as friend or foe? What makes us recognize anything for what it is? This week's readings invite us to recognize Jesus God-with-us (Emmanuel), "Now and Here". The first reading narrates how Prophet Ezekiel prepared his people in exile, not to be in revolting spirit or resisting heart ignoring the message of God, but in open mind and willing spirit to hear God's voice. In the second reading Paul shows through his own personal example how God is present with him/us even in the most troubled times, providing His sufficient grace.

Both these readings set a background to understand today's Gospel story. Jesus' contemporaries failed to recognize God's presence in Jesus and willfully ignored Him even though He was near them as one of them, speaking to them in their own language and living their own life-style. Familiarity can bring contempt and need not always bring better understanding and a living relationship.

His natives were not ready to see in Him more than what they had known him to be. They knew Him

GOD IS SIMPLE, EVERYTHING ELSE IS COMPLEX too well, his mother Mary, his brothers and his sisters, his profession as a Carpenter. Their mind was not open to see beyond what they knew of Him. Their heart was so hardened that they could not perceive beyond what their physical eyes could see. What they knew of him did not allow them to see who He really was. Their focus was so narrowed that their vision became bridled. Jesus must have been so frustrated that today's Gospel story ends with exasperation, "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house."

We know well that the best things in life are free but, at the same time "things that come to us free are not valued much." God is free, simple and easy. All we need to do is to just recognize, accept and allow Him to relate with us. Those who accept God in God's terms will experience and grow in relationship with God. All those who approach God with their preconceived image of God will be disappointed and take offense at God. Let us not harden our heart (1st reading). Let us be open and sensitive to the presence of God at all times, especially at our most troubled times with His sufficient Grace to help us (2nd Reading).

Let us pray today for people of various culture and language to grow in patience and tolerance with each other. Let us pray especially for our leaders and rulers that they may serve

the people in wisdom and spirit of sacrifice with the vision of freedom and justice and not with vengeance of grabbing power one from the other.

Spotlighting Religious Freedom on Independence Day - July 4th

The American Founders gathered in Philadelphia in 1776 to draft the Declaration of Independence, which dissolved the political ties that had bound the American people to Great Britain.

A new nation was born, free and independent.

Religion played a major role in the American Revolution since freedom, and especially religious freedom, was encouraged by the "blackrobed regiment" of preachers during the religious revival of the first Great Awakening and by offering a moral sanction for opposition to the British. These ministers supported the idea that civil and religious liberty was ordained by God.(1)

History tells us that the Pilgrims came to America aboard the *Mayflower* to escape religious persecution in 1620, followed by the Puritans in 1630 for the same reason. However, while these early settlers wanted religious freedom for themselves to practice their own faith, achieving religious freedom for all was an ideal that would take many years leading up to the Declaration of Independence in 1776.(2)

The 56 Signers of the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776, were men of remarkable courage since they knew they were committing treason against the British Crowne and that, if caught, they risked torture and death. Ultimately, 5 were captured and brutally tortured as traitors, 9 others died from wounds, many had their homes and property pillaged and burned, while others lost their fortunes in helping to fund the Continental Army.






