

Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

July 18, 2021 Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Jeremiah 23:1-6 Psalm 23:1-3, 3-4, 5, 6 Ephesiana 2: 13-18 Mark 6: 30-34

The apostles gathered together with Jesus and reported all they had done and taught. He said to them,

"Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while."


People were coming and going in great numbers, and they had no opportunity even to eat.

So they went off in the boat by themselves to a deserted place.

People saw them leaving and many came to know about it.

They hastened there on foot from all the towns and arrived at the place before them.

When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things.



FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

The music minister rushed into the new pastor's office and began to complain about the director of Religious Education. After hearing the string of complaints the new pastor summoned the director of Religious education. Once both were in the office, the new pastor bade the Music Minister to continue his diatribe. He refused. "All right," said the pastor, "you two step into the hallway and thrash this out. If you can't reach an agreement in fifteen minutes, I will have to let one of you go." In five minutes they were back. Both were smiling. This story asks each of two questions about our inner drive. In the first place what drove the music minister to make a string of complaints? Then at the end what drove both of them to reach a peaceful agreement quickly?

Today's readings address the inner drive that motivates and empowers our word and deeds. In the first reading Amaziah, the Royal prophet appointed by the king, disputes with Amos, a Charismatic Prophet that he must not prophesy in Bethel, the king's sanctuary and a royal temple, because he is not a prophet appointed by the King.

But Amos defends that his prophetic ministry is inspired and empowered by God, not by the king. His prophesies are not inspired by the power given to him by the King but by the inspired inner drive that is infused into him by God.

In the Gospel Jesus send his disciples in His Name, with His Power. Jesus instructs them not to take



nothing more than what they need for a day's journey, because the driving force of their mission should be nothing but the power and message of Christ, their master. Their mission is not what they plan and do but what Christ inspires and empowers. Their mission is not what they can achieve for God but what God can achieve in them for God's people.

In the light of the first reading and the Gospel, Paul, in the second reading explains the power and meaning of our life as Jesus' disciples. God has created each of us as the expression of His Blessings. Even if we had messed our God-Blessed life by sinning, no worry, God has forgiven all our sins through the death and resurrection of His Son Jesus Christ. God in all wisdom and insight

wants to continue His original plan for each of us. He has infused each of us with His Holy Spirit as a driving force in order that we may live our life in fullness, as God intended, as God's blessing.


We become what drives us from within. If God's Spirit is the driving force we become Godly. If anything else but God becomes the driving force we will be less than our full potential to be God's image. Let us pray that God's Spirit becomes our driving force. Let us pray that the Holy Spirit may fill each of us with the power to live our potential to its fullness.

"With countless other people of goodwill, (American Catholics) are concerned that efforts to build a just and wisely ordered society respect their deepest concerns and their right to religious liberty ... one of America's most precious possessions." - Pope Francis

America's First Freedom: Freedom of Religion

The 4th of July, Independence Day, is the United States' celebration of the love of liberty that is at the heart of our nation's founding principles. "Religious freedom is one of the most cherished of these liberties, and it is anchored in the right of an individual to act upon his or her conscience and deeply held beliefs, both privately and publicly... (it) is America's First Freedom, enshrined in the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution and (has affected) the lives of successive generations of Americans for nearly 250 years," wrote Michael Warsaw, *National Catholic Register.* (1)

Over the years, this God-given freedom of conscience & religion, protected by the Constitution, has been challenged through regulations and lawsuits brought by individuals and groups misunderstanding or opposed to this freedom. These challenges to religious freedom have accelerated in the past decade. Fortunately, advocacy groups and law firms have emerged to develop a strong understanding of the importance of religious freedom, particularly in serving the vulnerable and working to establish justice in society.

"Barbara Samuells, president of *Catholics For Freedom of* Religion (CFFR), a NY based grassroots advocacy group that educates Catholic parishes about the importance of religious freedom, said that religious freedom both 'allows us to teach the truth about our Catholic faith' and carry on the work of the Gospel 'without being pushed out of the public square,' " wrote Peter Smith, National Catholic Register.⁽²⁾ Samuells said, "(CFFR) has helped educate families about their children's constitutional right to prav and wear religious identification in public schools and that the wall of separation of church and state was meant to keep government out of the churches, not to keep the church out of the public square."... "(The Founders) knew that when the government steps in and tells people what they can and cannot believe, or what conscience they can and cannot follow, there is always tyranny. In order for our country to flourish, they wanted a moral and religious people." (3)

Happening Now: Religious Freedom Wins in Supreme Court

In an unanimous ruling, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in favor of a Catholic Social Services adoption agency in Philadelphia that had lost its contract with the city in 2018 because it would not certify same-sex couples as foster parents on religious grounds. The high court ruled the city violated the Free-Exercise Clause of the First Amendment.


