Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

November 28, 2021
First Sunday of Advent
Jeremiah 33:14-16
Psalm 25:4-5, 8-9, 10, 14
1 Thessalonians 3: 12-4:2
Luke 21: 25-28 34-36

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke:

Jesus said to his disciples:

“There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on earth nations will be in dismay, perplexed by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will die of fright in anticipation of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken.

And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory.

But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand.

“Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life, and that day catch you by surprise like a trap. For that day will assault everyone who lives on the face of the earth.

Be vigilant at all times and pray that you have the strength to escape the tribulations that are imminent and to stand before the Son of Man.”

Focus Questions:

1. How do you celebrate Advent differently than the way you celebrate Christmas?
2. What religious practices - praying everyday, reading the Bible, lighting Advent candles on a wreath, helping the poor- do you do during Advent to prepare for the coming of the Lord?
3. How prepared are you for the second coming of Jesus?

Family and children’s question

How do you make the Advent season more about Jesus and less about the rush and busyness of the shopping, baking, partying of this time of year?

Dear Friends,

There is an old story of a farmer who explained that lightning struck his old shed and thus saved him the trouble of tearing it down. The rain washed his car and saved him that chore too. So his friend asked what if an earth quake happens. He said, "Earth quake? It will shake the potatoes out of the ground." It is not what happens to us. It is how we take it all and what we want to get out of it.

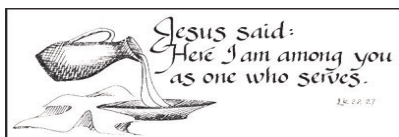
Today is the Solemn Feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. The First and Second readings depict the Son of Man, Jesus Christ as the Risen Lord and Ruler of all earthly kings, appearing in His Godly eternal glory and power. But the Gospel portrays the same Son of Man, standing before the Roman Governor to be condemned to a painful and shameful death on the Cross.



It is easy to recognize Jesus as the powerful King in all His miracles and His compelling life-giving messages; but how to acknowledge His kingship in his death on the cross as a condemned criminal? We should avoid imposing on Jesus our definition or expectation of who a king is. We have to understand Jesus's kingship from His words. Once, when two of His disciples wanted to have a royal position in Jesus's Kingdom, Jesus instructed them who the king is and how the king should rule. "Whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all".

Jesus lived this definition every moment of His life until dying on the Cross. He viewed His title of "Son of Man" as one of service, "The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." St. Paul, His apostle rightly expressed, Jesus "emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, he humbled himself....becoming obedient to death, even death on a cross." (Letter to the Philippians 2:7-8). Jesus the King is the servant of His people.

Might, power, strength or authority are not the criteria to define whether or not Jesus is King. Kingship is not a show that He was an invincible king. The kingship of Jesus is not about Himself but about His people served by their servant-king. The greatness of the king does not consist in his pomp and prestige, nor in his power and wisdom, but primarily in His readiness to serve His people with all that He is and has.



Dying on the Cross was the most powerful moment for Jesus, living His Kingship in serving His people. On this feast day of Christ the King, let us, the people of His Kingdom commit ourselves to His style of employing all that we are and have in serving each other.

This week our special collection will support the Catholic Campaign for Human Development. This collection would support programs to bring a permanent and positive change in more than thirty-eight million people living in poverty in the United States.

This year's Interfaith Thanksgiving Prayer Service will take place in our church on Wednesday, the eve of Thanksgiving November 24th, at 7:00 pm. All are welcome.

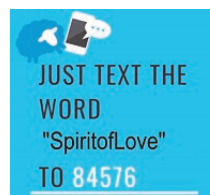

Pilgrims, Thanksgiving and a Failed Socialist Experiment

Each year, Americans celebrate the First Thanksgiving recalling the heroic Pilgrims who, seeking to escape religious persecution and longing to practice their religious beliefs in peace, sailed from England on Sept. 6, 1620, to the unknown New World. With the help of local Native Americans, the Pilgrims learned to plant crops and survived. At the harvest they gave thanks to God with a Thanksgiving feast.

While most Americans know this story of the First Thanksgiving, few know the tragic story of what happened at the harvest after two years of... "The Experiment."

The Experiment: The Pilgrims had decided that their new community would create a collectivist model of governance where all labor was communal, with men raising crops for all families, not just their own, and sharing the harvest equally. Women engaged in domestic chores of cooking, sewing, etc. for themselves as well as their neighbors. The result was that few did more than the minimum amount of work because the fruits of all labor were shared equally whether a person worked hard or a little. Incentive to excel was destroyed. Within two years, the result was shortages and starvation.

The Pilgrims' Governor, William Bradford, described the folly of collectivism: "For this community was found to breed much confusion and discontent and retard much employment that would have been to their benefit and comfort. For the young men, that were most able and fit for labor and

service, did repine (complain) that they should spend their time and strength to work for other men's wives and children without any recompense (payment)... And for men's wives to be commanded to do service for other men, as dressing their meat, washing their clothes, etc., they deemed it a kind of slavery, neither could many husbands brook (tolerate) it." ⁽¹⁾

The Pilgrims had unwittingly adopted a form of governance that, if made permanent, would soon deprive them of the religious freedom they had just fled England for. Two centuries later, describing the requirements for a socialist economic system, philosopher Karl Marx wrote, "Religion is the opium of the people. The abolition of religion as the illusory happiness of the people is required for their real happiness." ⁽²⁾
