# Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

December 5, 2021 Second Sunday of Advent Baruch 5:1-9 Psalm 126: 1-2, 2-3, 4-5, 6 Philippians 1:4-6, 8-11 Luke 3:1-6

#### A reading from the Gospel according to Luke:

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was tetrarch of Galilee, and his brother Philip tetrarch of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias was tetrarch of Abilene, during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John the son of Zechariah in the desert.

John went throughout the whole region of the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah:

A voice of one crying out in the desert:

"Prepare the way of the Lord,
make straight his paths.

Every valley shall be filled
and every mountain and hill shall be made low.

The winding roads shall be made straight,
and the rough ways made smooth,
and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

#### FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

**A man advanced in age would sit motionless** in church for hours on end. One day a priest asked him what God talked to him about.

"God doesn't talk. He listens" was his reply.

"Well, then what do you talk to God about?" asked the priest.

"I don't talk. I just listen" was his answer.

The beautiful experience of one recognizing the presence of the other happens when "neither talks, but both listen." Yes" "Neither talks and neither listens" is a powerful communication between them, happening in SILENCE."

This Sunday we begin the Time of Advent. From today until Christmas, we devote quality time in silence to reflect and realize that God is not an abstract and incommunicable reality but is one of us, coming to live with us in human conditions from birth to death. The readings of this First Sunday of Advent invite us to open our hearts for God's abundance in each of us, in all people and in every situation of life.

The first reading is Prophet Jeremiah's proclamation to his people who were driven out of their native land as exiles to Babylon. He announced that God is certainly coming to re-establish them in their kingdom with safety and security. The second reading is the instruction of St. Paul to his church at Thessalonica that God is the God who is capable of fulfilling their love for each other. It is up to them to avail themselves of God's gift and live in the power of love.

At the background of these two readings we are invited to grasp the living power of today's Gospel. Many disturbing and threatening events happen around us every day. Either we are easily carried away by these events and live in anxiety and fear. Or we willfully ignore these events, simply indulge in our own selfish world, and become drowsy people of carousing and drunkenness. But as believers in Christ's lively presence among us, we can emerge in spiritual power to 'stand erect and raise our heads' and begin to live every moment of our life with faith-filled hope, realizing the redemptive presence of Jesus in our midst.

Thus the first week of Advent brings the message to 'be aware', 'to be conscious' of God's saving power, coming to us as He promised. Our words and deeds are nothing but the outer expression of our inner realization. We are what we realize or are aware of. Advent is the time of making a soul-search of what we are conscious of



or are ware of, if we want to escape the tribulations, troubles, fears and false truths. Let us take the time of Advent to focus on what God has promised us and wants to fulfill in us. **Advent Wreath: During the four Sundays of Advent**, we would find Advent wreaths of evergreens, shaped in a perfect circle to symbolize God's unfading presence. The four candles are for the four Sundays preceding Christmas. We start lighting the first candle today, the first week of Advent. As the weeks progress we

light the second, third and fourth candles representing the week of Advent we celebrate. The candles on the Advent wreath symbolize hope, love, joy and peace. In the midst of the four candles, some wreaths add a fifth candle, called the Christ candle, which is lit on Christmas to remind Christians of the light Jesus brings to the world.



#### Yes, the time of sports on Sundays is/was a great hindrance for parents

with kids to attend Sunday Mass.. Now that the Fall outdoor sports are winding down and will soon come to an end. we strongly recommend young parents to come to Sunday Mass. Just as sports developed children's bodily strength and social skill, participation in Sunday Mass will inspire in them the spiritual power to decide and live the good values of life. Please give Sunday Mass a try.

## Why Do We Celebrate Thanksgiving Day Every Year?

Ever since 1789 when Pres. George Washington proclaimed that a day of Thanksgiving be held to thank God for giving the American people the opportunity to create a Constitution to preserve their hard-won freedoms, most presidents have also proclaimed a national day of thanksgiving and praise to God. However, the dates and months of the celebration varied. It wasn't until Pres. Abraham Lincoln's 1863 Proclamation that Thanksgiving was regularly commemorated each year on the last Thursday in November. Then, in 1941, Congress passed a joint resolution and officially set the fourth Thursday in November as a fixed-date for the holiday.

Since Washington's proclamation was the first of its kind, it is the legitimate standard for all future proclamations. Pres. Washington focused on God and our relationship to him. He said we should "acknowledge His providence," "obey His will," "be grateful for His benefits," "humbly implore His protection and favor." Thanksgiving should be "devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be."
