



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

December 26, 2021
The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph
1 Samuel 1:20-212, 24-28
Psalm 84:2-3, 5-6, 9-10\
1 John 3:1-2, 21-24
Luke 2:41-52

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke:

Each year Jesus' parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, and when he was twelve years old, they went up according to festival custom.

After they had completed its days, as they were returning, the boy Jesus remained behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it.

Thinking that he was in the caravan, they journeyed for a day and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances, but not finding him, they returned to Jerusalem to look for him.

After three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions, and all who heard him were astounded at his understanding and his answers.

When his parents says him, they were estapished, and

When his parents saw him, they were astonished, and his mother said to him,

"Son, why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety."

And he said to them,

"Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?"

But they did not understand what he said to them. He went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them; and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

One night a lady came home from her weekly prayer meeting and found she was being robbed. She shouted out a quote from New Testament, "Acts 2:38: 'Repent & be baptized and your sins will be forgiven.'" The robber quickly gave up and the lady rang the police. While handcuffing the criminal, a policeman asked, "Gee mate, you gave up pretty easily. How come you gave up so quickly?" The robber said, "She screamed she had an axe and two 38's! (Acts 2:38)" It is all about how one grasps what one hears that makes one take a decision to act or react. The robber heard the scripture quote as names of the guns. That made him abandon his robbery and to freeze.

The Gospel on the fourth Sunday of Advent narrates the meeting of the two ladies—Mary and

Elizabeth). Mary, the mother of Jesus, and Elizabeth, the mother of John the Baptist, the precursor of Jesus, both believed God's message which they heard and thus conceived their children. **Today's Gospel explains** how they became to each other the sign of God working in them. Mary went to visit Elizabeth with the awareness that the Angel Gabriel had given Elizabeth's pregnancy as a sign to her to believe that her pregnancy with Jesus, the Son of God is from God, by the Holy Spirit of God. (Luke 1:34-37)



When the two pregnant women met the children from their womb recognized each other and both women feel their children's recognition in their hearts and wombs. The Gospel reports, "Mary entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the infant leaped in her womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit cried out in a loud voice and said, "Most blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. (Luke 1: 40-42)

Mary got God's message through the Angel Gabriel and got confirmation of it through Elizabeth. Likewise, an angel of God revealed to Elizabeth's husband Zachariah, that his wife would conceived in her late age and she got confirmation of it by the leap of the child in her womb at the arrival of Mary. They became signs of confirmation to each other of what God did individually to them

How does God work with humans? God works with us in the same way even today as He did with



Mary and Elizabeth. God begins to reveal to us individually in our privacy and always confirms His message through human persons and events. Once we allow God to work with us, He will put us to work together with others who also allowed God to work with them. God starts with individuals and continues with all of us that we may all together become the work of God. What we become would be what God intends for the good of all. Let us pray and find what God reveals to us and cooperate with each other to achieve God's will with God's power.



Christmas 2021

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

On December 1, 2019, Our Holy Father Pope Francis issued *Admirabile Signum*, an Apostolic Letter *On the Meaning and Importance of the Nativity Scene*. It is a beautiful reflection that I draw on every Christmas season and one which I urge you to read and pray.¹

In it, the Holy Father reminds us that the simple act of arranging our Nativity set links us to the past, opens questions for the present, and orients the future. It is an act that has an existential impact.

Pope Francis says: "Setting up the Christmas creche in our homes helps us to relive the history of what took place in Bethlehem. Naturally, the Gospels remain our source for understanding and reflecting on the event. At the same time, its portrayal in the creche helps us to imagine the scene. It touches our hearts and makes us enter into salvation history as contemporaries of an event that is living and real in a broad gamut of historical and cultural contexts."

The beautiful scene of parents and grandparents setting up creches together with children and grandchildren is a powerful multi-dimensional experience of catechesis – the teaching and passing on of our Catholic faith and our belief in the Incarnation of Jesus Christ to the next generation.

Parents and grandparents have that wisdom of teaching children and grandchildren how to assemble and situate the creche, but at the same time, they also have the catechetical and relational sensitivity to let children and grandchildren make choices about where the shepherds, the sheep, the three kings are to be placed.

Children are encouraged to place the Holy Family – Mary, Joseph and the Prince of Peace – with their own hands into the center of the creche. How often children then enjoy, sometimes on their own and sometimes with brothers and sisters and family members, moving and interacting with the figurines. How often their biblical imaginations and souls are set on fire with God's love as they play with their family Nativity sets.

The Holy Father continues: "I would like now to reflect on the various elements of the nativity scene in order to appreciate their deeper meaning. First, there is the background of a starry sky wrapped in the darkness and silence of night. We represent this not only out of fidelity to the Gospel accounts, but also for its symbolic value. We can think of all those times in our lives when we have experienced the darkness of night. Yet even then, God does not abandon us, but is there to answer our crucial questions about the

meaning of life. Who am I? Where do I come from? Why was I born at this time in history? Why do I love? Why do I suffer? Why will I die? It was to answer these questions that God became man. His closeness brings light where there is darkness and shows the way to those dwelling in the shadow of suffering (cf. Luke 1:79)."

We can drift through life dodging and repressing these critical existential questions of life. We can live blindly and superficially.

Our Catholic belief in the unity of the Nativity and the Crucifixion, the Creche and the Cross, Bethlehem and Golgotha keeps our lives centered and focused on the things that really count in our short time on earth – the Last Things (Death, Judgment, Heaven and Hell) and a belief in the Eternal Joy of Heaven, our true home.

The Holy Father continues to press the existential questions: "The presence of the poor and the lowly in the nativity scene remind us that God became man for the sake of those who feel most in need of his love and who ask him to draw near to them. Jesus, 'gentle and humble in heart' (Matthew 11:29), was born in poverty and led a simple life in order to teach us to recognize what is essential and to act accordingly. The nativity scene clearly teaches that we cannot let ourselves be fooled by wealth and fleeting promises of happiness. We see Herod's palace in the background, closed and deaf to the tidings of joy. By being born in a manger, God himself launches the only true revolution that can give hope and dignity to the disinherited and the outcast: the revolution of love, the revolution of tenderness. From the manger, Jesus proclaims, in a meek yet powerful way, the need for sharing with the poor as the path to a more human and fraternal world in which no one is excluded or marginalized."

May our prayer, silent contemplation and creative family catechesis of the Nativity scene help us to be instruments of a Gospel revolution of humility, charity, mercy, tenderness, and solidarity with the sick, the poor and the suffering.

May our commitment to "holiness and mission" bless our contemplative Synodal listening and our Eucharistic Revival and Evangelization.
