Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

February 27, 2022
Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Sirach 27:4-7
Psalm 92:2-3. 13-14. 15-16
1 Corinthians 15:54-58
Luke 6:37-45

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke:

Jesus told his disciples a parable,

"Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit?

No disciple is superior to the teacher; but when fully trained, every disciple will be like his teacher. Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? How can you say to your brother, 'Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye? You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye.

"A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. For every tree is known by its own fruit. For people do not pick figs from thorn-bushes, nor do they gather grapes from brambles. A good person out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good, but an evil person out of a store of evil produces evil; for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."

- 1. How easy or hard is it for you to see yourself completely?
- 2. Describe a time when your impulse was to hit someone but you resisted.
- 3. Relate a time when God helped you overcome obstacles in your life.

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

There is an interesting quote about how to have a clear conscience. "All it takes to have a clear conscience is a fuzzy memory." The problem with this saying is that we want to have a clear conscience, but don't want to live with fuzzy memory. Life without clear memory would be a vegetable-life. Except during sleep we want to keep our memory as alive and as conscious as possible.

Today's readings instruct us on how to keep both our memory and our consciousness pure and clear. Our memory is capable of remembering everything both good and bad, blessings and pains, hurts and help. Of all the memories that are stored in our mind the most difficult one to get rid of is the memory of a hurt. That is why we often say "I can forgive but not forget." Today's readings invite us to cure and treat the memory in order to live our good and gracious self.

In the first reading David had all the chance to kill King Saul who had tried to kill him several times. But David refused to kill him even though his companions brought back to him all the hurtful memory of living through the pain and sufferings from Saul. Rather David uplifted his memory from taking vengeance to leaving Saul alive and safe. How could David change his vengeful memory to a forgiving mentality? David refused to see Saul as his enemy. He saw in him an anointed king by God. Like David, it all depends on what we see in the other that will either ignite our own vengeful memory to kill the other or inspire our forgiving mentality to let the other live.

In the second reading Paul explains how we can look at human beings. We can look at a human as an offspring of the first Adam who was earthly and a weak person capable of transgressing God's law, and thus everyone is a sinner. Or we can acknowledge in every human person an offspring of the last Adam, Jesus, who is heavenly, capable of redeeming us from sins and thus everyone is God's redeemed persons. The way we accept the other either as sinners or God's redeemed persons will define our relations and actions towards them.

From the backgrounds of these two readings we try to understand the Gospel's invitation to live the <u>"impossible"</u>. "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you." How can we love the enemy and do good to the hater? It is possible only when we stop living as people reacting to what they have done to us and begin living as God's people having the power to "Be merciful, just as our Father is merciful."

If we accept that we are positively charged with Godly qualities we will see in every one, even in our enemies and haters, the same qualities of God dwelling in them. But if we see that we are equally as bad as our enemies and haters, we will have no choice but to react in the same measure. What we prefer to see in ourselves and in others will define our action or reaction towards us and others. Let us pray that God help us recognize ourselves and others as God's children empowered with Godly qualities of love and mercy.

Advocating for Religious Freedom for All

The National Committee for Religious Freedom was launched on January 18, 2022, by Sam Brownback, former U.S. ambassador for international religious freedom from 2018-2020, who said that any weakening of the fundamental right to religious liberty in the U.S. will have detrimental effects overseas. A number of religious leaders joined the committee that plans to organize nationally in each of the 50 states to "conduct educational campaigns about the beauty of this sacred human right." (1)

This new group compliments the work of Catholics for Freedom of Religion (CFFR), founded in 2012, with its mission as a grassroots, lay ministry, to teach the facts of the First Amendment and religious freedom. "If we do not understand what freedom of religion correctly means, it can be eased away from us one word and one regulation at a time. We would forfeit what God has provided and the Constitution has protected," wrote Barbara Samuells, president of CFFR. 


