



Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

July 10,, 2022 Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Deuteronomy 30:10-14 Psalm 69: 14, 17,30-31, 33-34, 36,37 Colossians 1:15-20 Luke 10:25-37

A reading from the Gospel according to Luke:

There was a scholar of the law who stood up to test Jesus and said, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?"

He said in reply, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." He replied to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live."

But because he wished to justify himself, he said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

Jesus replied, "A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho. They stripped and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead. A priest happened to be going down that road, but when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. Likewise a Levite came to the place, and when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. But a Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight. He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn, and cared for him. The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper with the instruction, 'Take care of him. If you spend more than what I have given you, I shall repay you on my way back.' Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

- 1) Describe a time when doing busy work distracted you from listening to Jesus.
- 2) How do you extend hospitality to others?
- 3) How does friendship with Jesus influence your faith life?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

Life is going on for millions of years despite all its imperfections. If we are looking for a perfect situation to love or laugh, we will never find one. Likewise, If we wait for a perfect person to live or relate with, we will be alone all the time.

On the fourteenth Sunday, the readings encourage us to see the perfectness around us and commission us to live the perfectness everywhere and in all persons. The first reading is the prophetic encouragement from the Lord to the exiles coming back from Babylon to Jerusalem . Their spirits were low and the place, Jerusalem they returned to, was not too much a promising situation. But the Lord enthused them that prosperity and peace can happen when the people allow them to happen in Jerusalem.

In the second reading Paul concludes his message to the believers of the Church in Galatia, that unless they willfully choose to live the division in the name of race, religion, culture etc. nothing would bar them from the empowerment of living a New Creation in them. With the power of Christ's Death and Resurrection, they can free themselves from their old enslaving forces and allow the Peace and Mercy of God, the forces of NEW CREATION to live in them.

In the Gospel, Jesus shows that God's reign is not a pipedream but a possible reality. He sent his chosen disciples with His message and power to make the people realize that the Kingdom (the reign) of God has come; and all they had to do is to recognize its presence and to allow it to happen in and around them. When the disciples reported to Jesus how their mission was successful in driving out the evil spirits, Jesus taught them to focus, not on subjugating or suppressing the evil spirits but on the realization of spreading and cherishing of God's Kingdom in them and among peoples personally. "Do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you but rejoice because your names are written in heaven."

God has sufficiently equipped each of us with understanding, good will and strength that we can together build and live in peace and prosperity. Jesus came to enlighten this reality and empower us to live this reality. We have all that we need, to stop all violence and enmity and to start living in peace and share the prosperity. because the world is God's reign. As once He invited the Pharisees, Jesus invites us to see the Kingdom in our midst; "When asked by the Pharisees when the kingdom of God would come, Jesus replied, "The kingdom of God will not come with observable signs. Nor will people say, 'Look, here it is,' or 'There it is.' For you see, the kingdom of God is in your midst." (Luke 17:20-21)

"If you judge people, you have no time to love them." (Mother Teresa). If all our energy is spent in proving the other is wrong, we will have no time to look for good in any person. None of us is perfect. Each of us has lots of imperfections. But the mystery of the perfectness is that it can become a living reality only when every one of us willfully realizes its lively presence in and around all of us and allows it to happen in cherishing it.

On Monday, July 4, 2022, we will celebrate the 246th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence. We are together as a Nation, in the journey of arriving at peace, prosperity, and freedom. We are not there yet. Today's readings invite us that we can arrive at these perfect ideals by allowing them to happen among us. We need only to be conscious that God's world has enough and more peace and prosperity, wealth and freedom and we should make them available to every one of us.

We aspire for them not because they are not there but because we have not yet been conscious of their presence while willfully nurturing the negative situations of war and violence, disputes, and discriminations. The positive realities happen, flow easily like a river when we can break down the barriers which block the flow. May God who has guided our country for the last 246 years open our hearts and minds and make us all free and independent persons to remove all blocks for the lively flow of peace, prosperity, and freedom. Wish you all Happy Independence Day.


