



Matthew 21:1-11 Gospel Reading at the Procession with Palms

When Jesus and the disciples drew near Jerusalem and came to Bethphage on the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village opposite you, and immediately you will find an ass tethered, and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them here to me. And if anyone should say anything to you, reply, 'The master has need of them.' Then he will send them at once." This happened so that what had been spoken through the prophet might be fulfilled: Say to daughter Zion, "Behold, your king comes to you, meek and riding on an ass, and on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden. The disciples went and did as Jesus had ordered them. They brought the ass and the colt and laid their cloaks over them, and he sat upon them. The very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, while others cut branches from the trees and strewed them on the road. The crowds preceding him and those following kept crying out and saying: "Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest." And when he entered Jerusalem the whole city was shaken and asked, "Who is this?" And the crowds replied, "This is Jesus the prophet, from Nazareth in Galilee."

Talk about how Jesus died for us because he loves us, and wants us to be saved. Talk about a sacrifice you made for someone you love.

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Judge: what crime has this man committed?

Lawyer: He has not done anything wrong. He was merely an innocent bystander when the killer shot a clerk on a hold-up. We are holding him as a witness. Judge: And where is the killer? Lawyer: He is out on bail. The killer is out in the world while the witness is held up. This what the death does to the living. Death releases the dead person to eternal life while it keeps the living persons here in life witnessing death every day.

In today's Gospel, Jesus raises Lazarus from death; and through this miracle Jesus reveals how His believers are invited to the deathless or everlasting life. He declares, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." For those who believe in Jesus the Risen Lord, death would never be an end of life but only a release to eternal life. Death is the moment of change in life from its temporal phase in the world with humans to its eternal phase in Heaven with God.

All through today's Gospel, Jesus never addresses the death of Lazarus as an end in itself but as an event that begins a never-ending life. When Jesus was on His way to visit the sick Lazarus in Bethany (a village less than 2 miles away from Jerusalem) His disciples forbade Him saying, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there?" In His reply Jesus explained to them what death meant for Him. Death is not a stumbling block of life.

The person who walks in darkness will not be able to see what lies on the path of life; that person will stumble and fall. But Jesus who is the light, walks in light. Death cannot make Him stumble and fall. As a human being like all of us, Jesus too walked the path of life in all its conditions (including death), but he did not stumble and fall down, but passed over death. He rose on the third day to the deathless-everlasting life.

In the eyes of Jesus, the death of Lazarus is a 'sleep'. "Our friend Lazarus is asleep, but I am going to awaken him." As we wake up from sleep and become active for the next day, the believers who die will rise from death and begin their eternal life. The miracle of the dead Lazarus becoming alive again is a sign. Sign is Jesus's way of teaching that His believers, like Lazarus will come out their tombs. They will rise from death as Jesus rose to deathless life on the third day.

Jesus taught the same truth to Martha when she complained to Him about His delayed coming after Lazarus's death. When Jesus comforted her that Lazarus will rise, Martha, though she was consoled by his future resurrection, did not hesitate to express her present inconsolable loss of her brother. So, Jesus consoled her then and there by bringing Lazarus back to life from his tomb. But before he would bring Lazarus alive out of his tomb, he explained to Martha that "I (Jesus) am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live." His very self-declaration of who He is, explains that life's nature and goal is Resurrection.

In the worldly concept, Resurrection happens after the life. Life begins at birth, marches through moments of living, ends in death, and gets fulfilled in the resurrection. But Jesus changes this sequence. He said, "I am the Resurrection and Life." According to Jesus, Life is oriented towards resurrection, (not death), from its start in all its phases. Life passes through various phases, from childhood to adolescent to adult to bachelor to parent to grandparent to old age, and at last to death. In the sequence of life, each phase is resurrecting to a new phase at the death of its previous phase. Life is a continuous Resurrection. Life is a flow from one phase to the other. Its final flow is from death to eternal life. Without Resurrection life would be stuck and would begin to stink and decay. If Resurrection does not happen, life doe does not happen. Yes, Jesus is Resurrection and life and whoever believes in Him, even if he dies, will live. Yes, the believer will pass over from death to eternal life. Let us believe in Jesus and live our life of Resurrection.




