

Luke 24:13-35 (Third Sunday of Easter)

That very day, the first day of the week, two of Jesus' disciples were going to a village seven miles from Jerusalem called Emmaus, and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred. And it happened that while they were conversing and debating, Jesus himself drew near and walked with them, but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him. He asked them, "What are you discussing as you walk along?" They stopped, looking downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?" And he replied to them, "What sort of things?" They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over to a sentence of death and crucified him. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place. Some women from our group, however, have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive.

Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see." And he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all that the prophets spoke! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them what referred to him in all the Scriptures. As they approached the village to which they were going, he gave the impression that he was going on farther. But they urged him, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?" So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of bread.

Focus Questions for 4/23/23 Luke 24:13-35

- 1: Describe a time when, like the disciples, your heart burned when you heard or read Scriptures.
- 2: Relate a time when you strongly felt the presence of Jesus in the breaking of the bread.
- 3: Tell a time when you walked away from a community after being disappointed. Who tried to bring you back?

Family & Children's Question:

Open yourself to Jesus' presence in the people you meet, in prayer, in nature, in reading the Bible this week.

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

The city editor had just been informed that a wire had fallen across Main Street in a storm. He assigned two reporters to the story. One of the two called the editor and said, "We are here at the spot, but no one knows whether the wire is live or not," The editor replied, "so one of you is to touch it, and the other is to write the story." We know what will happen if one touches the live wire.

Today's Gospel is the story of Doubting Thomas. The Risen and Living Jesus appeared to the disciples, but Thomas was not there. When the disciples told him on his return what he missed, Thomas was not ready to believe their story; he wanted to touch the Risen Jesus to believe that He is alive. Later when Jesus actually appeared and invited Thomas to touch Him, Thomas did not attempt to touch him but surrendered to the live-presence of Jesus crying 'My Lord and my God'.

What is needed is not proof but faith to experience the presence of Jesus. Proofs can establish a fact; but only the faith can make one to feel, relate, communicate, love and enter into the living-presence of the person. Jesus appears primarily to relate with us not merely to prove his presence.

Life is more an experience of oneself and others in faith and love than a bare fact established by proof and evidence. Touching (physical proofs) can make us feel the persons but would not take to the level of believing in that person and entrusting oneself to that person. Love and relationship start from believing in the beloved.

Such a kind of believing does not depend on any physical touch to prove a person's love to the beloved.

Physical touch can be an expression of one's love for the beloved. Believing in a person is the starting point and it can certainly lead to bodily expressions through various senses. Love born out of believing will naturally lead to physical closeness, touch, and intimacy. Love of the heart is freely lived in the senses of the body. Jesus invites us through Thomas to start loving from believing and not merely through physical touch, or emotional sprint, or other bodily senses. Let us pray with Thomas believing in the Risen Lord, "My Lord and my God."

Today, the Sunday following Easter Sunday is called Divine Mercy Sunday. The Risen Jesus did not go vengefully after those who put him to death. As he pleaded God while hanging on the Cross, for the forgiveness of those who crucified Him, now after the Resurrection Jesus reached out to them in Mercy to offer them peace and forgiveness. He invariably greeted everyone with "Peace be with you" whenever He appeared to them. Resurrection means life, not judgement of what we did or didn't. The Risen Lord invites us to start life with Him in Mercy and Forgiveness.




