

Jesus proposed another parable to the crowds, saying: "The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a man who sowed good seed in his field. While everyone was asleep his enemy came and sowed weeds all through the wheat, and then went off. When the crop grew and bore fruit, the weeds appeared as well. The slaves of the householder came to him and said, 'Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where have the weeds come from?' He answered, 'An enemy has done this.' His slaves said to him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?' He replied, 'No, if you pull up the weeds you might uproot the wheat along with them. Let them grow together until harvest; then at harvest time I will say to the harvesters, "First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles for burning; but gather the wheat into my barn.""

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

Jim went to see a psychiatrist and said that every night he was visited by a twelve-foot dragon with three heads. He was a nervous wreck, could not sleep at all, and was on the verge of total collapse. He had even thought of suicide.

"I think I can help you," said the psychiatrist, "but I warn you that it will take a year or two and will cost three thousand dollars."

"Three thousand dollars!" the man exclaimed. "Forget it! I'll just go home and make friends with it."

Truth is everywhere. We may choose to accept or reject it but cannot get rid of it. To run away from it is like running away from our feet. To accept it is like kissing our lips. The best we need to do is to see, understand, and be at rest to grow in and with it.

Today's first two readings open our eyes and senses to learn from how nature is faithful in living its truth. Nature never fails to be fertile and fruitful. It never disappoints us. The rain and snow come down and do not return till they have watered the earth, making it fertile and fruitful. So also, the seeds are faithful to the one who sows them, giving them bread to eat. The whole creation is true to its purpose for which it is created.

In today's Gospel Jesus compares the divine truth/reality to a growing seed in each one of us. We have the built-in capacity to grow and bear fruits of truth. Jesus' story explains that divine truth is not an abstract fact that we accept or reject. Rather it is like the seed that can grow in us and make our life bear the fruits of truth. Jesus invites us to make the right choice. He makes us aware of our inner capacity to grow in it.

The growth of truth in us is proportionate to the extent of our willingness to grow in it. We can receive or become aware of the divine truth in one of the following four ways: 1) like a rock with no soil to grow, or 2) like a land covered with bushes to choke the growth, or 3) like a wayside allowing the birds to pick up the seeds, or 4) like a perfect soil allowing the divine truth to grow and bear fruit. Jesus is the seed of truth. It is up to us how rich the seed Jesus must grow in us. Today's parable encourages us not simply to search for truth, but to grow in and become the truth. We are the fertile soil of God and let us be ourselves, pure and organic, allowing the Word and truth of God to grow fully as well.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The Mass: Introductory Rites I

The Mass and the Eucharist are forever bound together. Thus it's entirely appropriate that we try to come to a better understanding and appreciation of the Mass during this bulletin series. We will do this in small parts, returning to this topic from time to time.

The Mass is divided up into four main sections: the Introductory Rites, the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the Liturgy of the Word, and the Concluding Rites. Today, let's take a look at the first half of the Introductory Rites.

The very first thing we notice is that the Mass starts with a procession. The altar servers, lector(s), deacon(s), and priest (and bishop if there is one present) walk down the center aisle to the altar. Why? Any kind of a liturgical or devotional procession is a representation of us, the People of God, as we journey together towards Jesus. In the entrance procession, the ministers represent all of us. We all turn our focus on the altar, the place where the Sacrifice of the Mass will take place. The ministers, in fact, bow to the altar, and then the priest and deacons kiss it as well.

The priest then greets the assembly and we all make the Sign of the Cross. This is public worship, done together as the Body of Christ, in union with the Trinity. While individual

worship away from church is important for developing our relationship with God, liturgy reminds us that we are meant to be in communion with each other, and with God.

We then perform the Penitential Act, reciting "Lord/Christ have mercy". In order to worthily receive Jesus, we recognize that we are sinners. We ask his mercy upon us that no matter what we might have done since the last time we encountered him, that our hearts, souls and minds now be directed toward him, and that he in turn may fill us with his grace.

"The Church [...] earnestly desires that Christ's faithful, when present at [Mass], should not be there as strangers or silent spectators; on the contrary, through a good understanding of the rites and prayers they should take part in the sacred action conscious of what they are doing, with devotion and full collaboration." - Sacrosanctum Concilium. No. 48.



It is the mission of the Circle of Women Book Group to focus on the spiritual influence of contemporary writing that facilitates our own reflections of God's action in our daily lives.


