Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

A hunting party was hopelessly lost. "I thought you said you were the best guide in Maine!" One of the hunters angrily said to their confused leader. "I am." replied the guide. "But I think we are in Canada now." The hunters planned to have a good hunt, only to find themselves lost in the woods, despite being led by a leader.

In Today's Gospel, the farmer sowed only wheat, but to his surprise he found weeds amidst the wheat. We too would have had the same experience as the farmer. We might have had good intentions and sowed good seeds, but surprisingly found ourselves surrounded by evil deeds, lots of weeds. What do we do? Sometimes we get into the action of removing all the weeds, getting rid of all that is evil. Or at times we close our eyes and ears, to ignore and not to be bothered by them.

Jesus advises us to turn our focus more on wheat than weeds, more on the good than the evil. According to Jesus, the best way to kill the evil is to enforce the growth of the good. When good becomes strong, evil will be weakened. When more people opt for the good, the evil will eventually lose its force and its sale value.

Jesus also explains with other parables how our good deeds can change the evil deeds. Our good deeds may be few in number and small in size like a mustard seed, but they have something which evil deeds don't have. The evil would seem like it is growing and multiplying in number. But its nature is death and destruction, not creativity and growth. It is self-destructive. Good, on the other hand is creative in its nature. Good may appear to be weak but it will never die. Because Good is Godly. Good grows like a mustard seed, small in size to start, but growing into a big bush.

It would be apt to remind ourselves what Jesus said, when his disciple defended Him with the sword against those who came to arrest Him, ""Put your sword back into its sheath, for all who take the sword will perish by the sword." (Matthew 26:52). Evil is not the proper way to handle evil. "An eye for an eye makes the whole world blind." (Gandhi) Evil can increase, not grow. Evil can magnify and bulge, not create and construct. Evil can separate and slay, not gather, and heal.

Jesus invites us to focus on Good. As we are created in God's image, our nature is to be good and creative. With the help of God's grace, trying our best to promote and to be good is the only way of overcoming evil. We have the same power of a little yeast which leavens a big measure of wheat flour. Like yeast, our good deeds will influence and change the scrounging evil.

The message is simple. Let us not be discouraged in doing good even though we see the evil around us. The best way to eradicate evil is to do/be good; to be good yeast to transform the flour. Good has the power to change evil. It is easy to be afraid of and avoid evil. But Jesus wants us to meet the evil boldly. We can turn evil to good as the yeast leavens the flour. "Don't let evil conquer you but conquer evil by doing good." (Paul's letter to Romans 12:21)

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The Mass: Introductory Rites II

Let's continue with our look at the Introductory Rites of the Mass that we began last week. You'll recall we examined the Entrance Procession, the Greeting, and then the Penitential Act.

On the Sundays during Ordinary Time, we then sing or recite the Gloria. We praise and glorify God in the highest, not only in high heaven, but because he is the most important focus we can have in our lives. He should be placed above all other people and things. We begin the prayer by praising the Father, then we address Jesus for the rest of it. Our focus in

the Mass is Jesus himself, from his Word in sacred Scripture, to his very Body and Blood in the Eucharist.

During Easter Season we frequently will be sprinkled with holy water. This helps remind us of our baptism, when we became a new creation and were joined to Jesus' death and resurrection. This relationship is nourished each time we partake in the Eucharist.

Finally, the Introductory Rites conclude with a prayer called the Collect. But first,

the priest says, "Let us pray." This gives us a moment of sacred silence: to quiet our minds and our hearts for what is to come. The Collect always has five parts. First, God is addressed in the *invocation*, then he is *acknowledged* in some way, then there is a *petition* or request, followed by an *aspiration* (desired result), and finally, a *doxology* in which the Trinity is generally invoked. See if you can pick out these five parts the next time you hear the Collect prayed.

We don't want to miss the Introductory Rites, because they are an important preparation for us in mind, body and soul. We are about to participate in the source and summit of our faith, the Eucharist.

"[The] purpose [of the Introductory Rites] is to ensure that the faithful, who come together as one, establish communion and dispose themselves properly to listen to the Word of God and to celebrate the Eucharist worthily." - General Instruction of the Roman Missal, No. 46.
