

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Life is not a static principle. It is a beautiful flow of events in which our choice matters every day. We become what we choose to be. We are our choices. Life flows without stopping for anyone. It does not wait for our choice. If we delay choosing the best, we will end up living something less than the best. Our choices make our life either joyfully livable or regrettably burdensome.

In today's Gospel, Jesus wants us to choose the best for our life and admonishes us to never settle for less. Life is a treasure that is hidden. Jesus instructs us to be like a merchant searching for fine pearls. When he finds a pearl of great price, he goes and sells all that he has and buys it. Every moment of our living is an ongoing act of searching for the best. Every breath of ours engages us in life to go from good to better, and from better to best. Let us invest all of that in the present moment to delve and dive into the best for the next moment. Jesus advises us not to get stuck in one place or to settle for anything so as not to be able to move on. Let us not get stuck or sunk or then we will end up staying the same and sticking with our past.

When we settle for something, we stop growing. We become frozen in that something. We will obstruct ourselves. We will never grow into our God-given lively selves. Thus, settling for something is to live less than what we are created for. Let us be the merchant from today's Gospel who invests everything of the present to strive and buy the best.

Life is like the net which brings to shore both the good and bad. The fisherman picks the good and discards the bad, moving on to throw the net for the next catch. Likewise, life becomes alive every second in the act of choosing the good alone and discarding the bad always. Life is non-stop hauling. Each moment is like an act of hauling the net which would bring both good and bad. We choose the good and discard the bad then we move forward to the next moment of throwing the net. Let us be the fisherman who throws the net which brings fish of every kind but chooses the good alone and moves on for the next catch.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

Let The Children Come To Me

We have become accustomed to seeing children around the age of seven receive First Holy Communion. But did you know this is a relatively recent practice in the Catholic Church? In the first couple of centuries of the Church, Christians were under persecution. All three sacraments of initiation (baptism, confirmation, Eucharist) were administered at the same time, to persons of all ages, by a bishop. Once Constantine declared Christianity to be legal in 313 in the Edict of Milan, the Church began to freely spread.

This created an unusual problem: there were too many who wished to enter the Church than the bishops could handle. The faculty to confer baptism was granted to priests. But the sacraments of confirmation and Eucharist remained together and were celebrated around the age of 12 or so when the bishop of the diocese could make the travel to the various parishes.

It was Pope Pius X who, in 1910, reasoned that children who were as young as seven (the age of reason) had the capacity to appreciate the Eucharist, and should be able to receive. And so he promulgated this in his decree *Quam Singulari*, noting how Jesus called the children to

himself when the disciples were rebuking them ("Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for of such is the kingdom of God," *Mark 10:14)*. Thus, the practice of First Holy Communion was separated from Confirmation and celebrated at a much younger age.

It's important for us to foster what Pope Pius began. Young children and their families need regular reception of the Eucharist, and we should pray for them and welcome them warmly to every Mass.

We need to remember we are children as well – children of God. Jesus calls us to himself. Let's all commit to regular reception of the Eucharist, starting in this second year of the National Eucharistic Revival.

"Those who have charge of the children should zealously see to it that after their First Communion these children frequently approach the Holy Table, even daily if possible, as Jesus Christ and Mother Church desire, and let this be done with a devotion becoming their age." - *Quam Singulari, No. 6.*


DID YOU KNOW...

According to the latest estimates, as many as 9 million children in the United States live in "food insecure" homes. That phrase may sound mild, but it means that those households don't have enough food for every family member to lead a healthy life.

The number of children living with hunger had fallen steadily over the past decade, but the coronavirus pandemic dealt a terrible blow to our progress as a nation - one that No Kid Hungry and other organizations will work to reverse during the long recovery ahead.

In 2021, the federal poverty level was \$26,500 for a family of four. Of course, this number is a minimum. Families making twice that much are still considered low-income by most experts, and many struggle to make ends meet.
