Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

A parrot was up for sale at an auction. The bidding proceeded briskly, and soon a winner was announced. When paying, the high bidder asked the auctioneer if the parrot could speak. "Sure can," replied the auctioneer, "it was the parrot that was bidding against you." Wow, now he has in the same parrot both a speaking pet to be loved and a competitive bidder to be hated.

In today's Gospel something like this pet story happens. Peter who revealed Jesus as the Messiah in last week's Gospel is hindering Jesus going to the Cross this week. Peter who was praised by Jesus last week, is reprimanded as 'Satan' this week.

Last week Jesus indicated to Peter that his declaration of Jesus as Messiah was his adherence to what God has revealed to him. This week when Peter hinders Jesus' declaration of his death on the Cross, Jesus says that Peter's hindering is not from God - not God's thinking but from human thinking.

Like Peter we can choose to live either God's revelation or human reduction. We can raise up to live up to the standard that God sets for us. Or we can reduce ourselves to the bare minimum with an excuse that we are weak human beings and unable to do all that God expects us to do. We can either choose to expand our humanity to express the divine expectation in us, or treat humanity as an excuse to reduce our capacities to the level of human flesh. Jesus is asking us to follow him...to live the divine expectations in our human capacities.

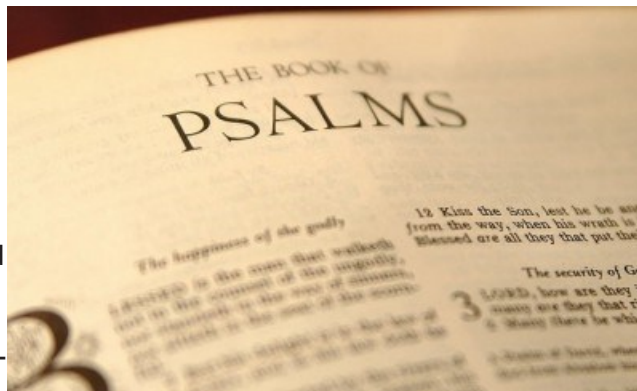
His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The Mass: Liturgy of the Word Part III

We are still exploring the second section of the Mass, The Liturgy of the Word. After the First Reading, we then enter into the Responsorial Psalm. Liturgically, the Psalms are usually chosen for each Mass based on a connection to and a continuation of the theme of the First Reading.

The Psalms, part of the Old Testament, have much relevance in our lives today. They reflect the gamut of human emotion, ranging from joy to sorrow. They ultimately form our response to God as we live our daily lives. They always were intended to be sung, and in most Masses, the cantor will sing the strophes and the assembly sings back a reply, which is repeated after each strophe. If they are not sung, then at least they are recited, and the assembly always participates.

Something we might forget about the Psalms is that they have been part of the Jewish tradition for thousands of years. Jesus himself would have prayed these very same Psalms. By the time we complete the three year Lectionary cycle, we will have participated in nearly every Psalm in the Bible at Mass.



It's therefore fitting that the Church desires a Responsorial Psalm to be celebrated at every Mass. In the Psalms, we have a connection to the Eucharist, because they give us a connection to Jesus. This connection is historical as well as actual. The more we enter into the Psalms at each Mass, the more we are immersing ourselves into Sacred Scripture, when God speaks directly to each of us. And therefore, we also are preparing ourselves to encounter Jesus, truly and completely, in the Eucharist.

May each of us focus our hearts and minds on the words of the Psalm at every Mass, both in those that are proclaimed and in the responses we offer, so that we may more completely receive Jesus.

"The Responsorial Psalm (...) is an integral part of the Liturgy of the Word and which has great liturgical and pastoral importance, since it fosters meditation on the Word of God." - *General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 61*

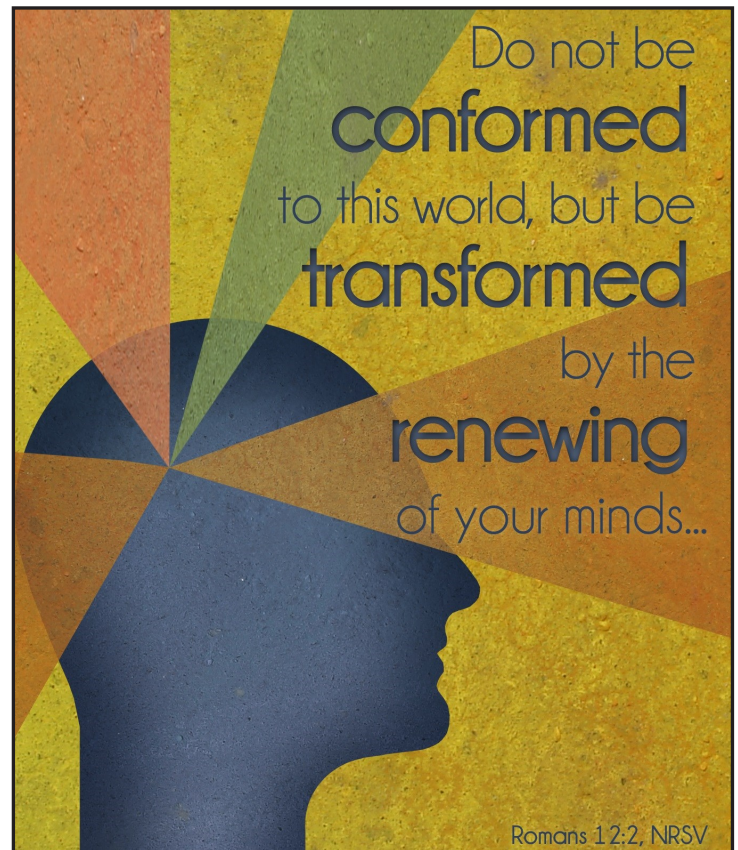

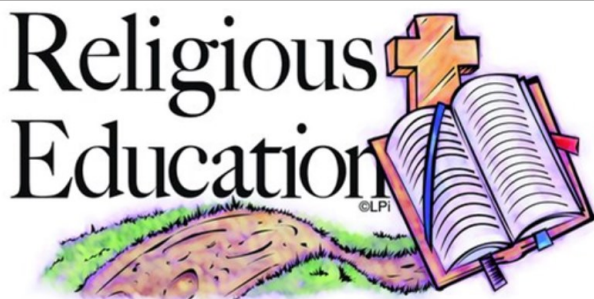

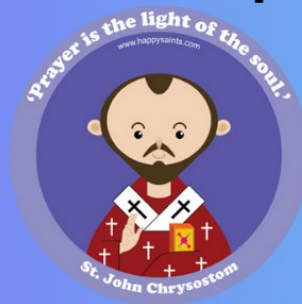
Saints of September



Feast Day: September 9th
Priest, SJ

Patron: Slaves, Race Relations,
Seafarers, Colombia

Spanish Jesuit who served in (present day) Colombia. Estimated that he baptized over 300k, and heard the confessions of 5k slaves each year.



Feast Day: September 13th
Bishop & Doctor of the Church
Archbishop of Constantinople
Patron: Preachers

Early Church Father and prolific author in the early Church. Known for his preaching and denunciation of abuse of authority.



Feast Day: September 20th
Priest & Martyr
First Korean Catholic Priest
Patron: Korean Clergy

Born in Korea 1821 to secret Christians, his father was martyred. Studied in China, then returned to Korea to preach. Martyred at 25.



Feast Day: September 21st
Apostle & Martyr

"Matthew the Evangelist"

Patron: Accountants, Tax Collectors

Tax collector from Capernaum who followed Jesus. Brought the Gospel to the Jews of Judea, before going to Ethiopia where he was martyred.



Feast Day: September 23rd
Priest

"Padre Pio"

Patron: Adolescents, Stress Relief

Capuchin friar marked by stigmata in 1918. Strong proponent of weekly confession and daily communion. Encouraged daily meditation.



Feast Day: September 27th
Priest

Founder: Vincentians (Lazarists)
Patron: Charities

French Priest with a devotion to the poor. His order took vows of poverty and devoted themselves entirely to the people of small villages.



Feast Day: September 29th
Archangels

Michael: "Who is like God?"
Leader of angels, invoked for protection
Gabriel: "God's strength"
Biblical messenger (Jesus's Incarnation)
Raphael: "God has healed"
Healed Tobias' blindness



Feast Day: September 30th
Doctor of the Church
Priest & Confessor

Patron: Archaeologists, Bible Scholars

Translated Bible into Latin (Vulgate) from Hebrew instead of Greek. Known for teachings on Christian moral life, and moving to Jerusalem to learn Hebrew.
