Jesus told his disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out at

dawn to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with them for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. Going out about nine o'clock, the landowner saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and he said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard, and I will give you what is just.' So they went off. And he went out again around noon, and around three o'clock, and did likewise. Going out about five o'clock, the landowner found others standing around, and said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' They answered, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You too go into my vineyard.' When it was evening the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Summon the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and ending with the first.' When those who had started about five o'clock came, each received the usual daily wage. So when the first came, they thought that they would receive more, but each of them also got the usual wage. And on receiving it they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last ones worked only one

of them in reply, 'My friend, I am not cheating you.

Did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what is yours and go. What if I wish to give this last one the same as you? Or am I not free to do as I wish with my own money? Are you envious because I am generous?' Thus, the last will be first, and the first will be last."

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

One day, Mullah Naseeruddin heard a knock on his door. He opened the door and found his daughter standing there crying with a bruise on her eye.

"What happened?" Naseeruddin asked. She said that she got into a fight with her husband, and he beat her. To this, Naseeruddin responded by slapping his daughter in the face.

He closed the door and quickly called her husband and told him, "I heard about what you did, but I've had my vengeance - because you hit my daughter, I slapped your wife."

This is an oriental story to reiterate that vengeance begets vengeance even among the closest relations, and vengeance is irrational.

Today's Gospel is Jesus's story about the cruel face of vengeance, which is the unwillingness to forgive. The story begins with Jesus saying that forgiveness knows no limit. We humans are a limited, finite, and insufficient people who can be measured; but our inner spiritual being is measureless and generous beyond all measures in mercy, kindness, love, forgiveness, and selfless giving. Jesus's story invites us to live this measureless aspect.

The story deals with the person who was forgiven a huge amount by his king, but refused to forgive a much smaller amount to the one below him. The story ends with the king revoking his forgiveness and torturing him to pay back the debt. 1) Positively, the story invites us to live the Lord's prayer, "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." Forgiveness must and can beget forgiveness. 2) Negatively, it explains how the refusal to forgive will ultimately lead to condemnation and torture.

This story is not merely an instruction to us from Jesus about how to be merciful. Rather, it is Jesus's claim on us how we can exercise our mercy measurelessly, without any restriction. Jesus narrated this story as a way of answering to the people who limited our capacity to forgive, "how often must I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus answered them, "I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times.", which is to mean that one can forgive numberless times. If we have a heart like God, we can exercise forgiveness like God. Jesus encourages us to "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful." (Luke 6:36).

The servant who did not forgive his fellow servant had all the rights and power over his subordinate who owed him money. But, he failed to realize in his heart how the king's mercy, not power, gave him his life back. Many times violence becomes a cruel reality, not because we don't have mercy, but we prefer to exercise power rather than to live with mercy. Life is not what one can exercise in power but what one can serve both to oneself and to others in mercy (forgiveness).

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The Mass: Liturgy of the Word Part V

We continue our look at the second section of the Mass, The Liturgy of the Word, by briefly considering the Gospel. This is the final and most important proclamation of Sacred Scripture at Mass.

As was mentioned previously, the Church structures the harmony between the readings at Mass around the Gospel passage. Each of the three Lectionary cycles pivots on

a specific Gospel book (Cycle A, where we are now, is Matthew, Cycle B is Mark, and Cycle C is Luke). We hear from John's Gospel at particular times of the Church year, especially during Easter.

It is the role of the deacon, if he is present, to proclaim the Gospel at Mass, even a Mass being celebrated by a bishop or the pope. This is reflected even in a deacon's ordination. There is a point in his ordination Mass where he kneels before the bishop and is presented with the Book of Gospels. The bishop says "Receive the Gospel of Christ, whose


herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach."

The proclamation of the Gospel is so important at Mass, and it is highlighted in many ways: by our posture (we stand), by a procession with the Book of Gospels, by the introduction (the deacon says "The Lord be with you"), by tracing the Sign of the Cross with our thumb on our head, lips and heart, and by the conclusion (the assembly replies "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ").

Our mission as baptized Christians is to live out the Gospel, the "Good News," in our daily lives. We become Christ's eyes, arms and heart. Let's be fortified to do so by listening to and praying over the Gospel passage at Mass, and then partaking of the Eucharist, the Real Presence of Jesus.

"Through the words of the Gospel may our sins be wiped away." - Roman Missal (prayed silently by the deacon or priest when kissing the Book of Gospels after reading from it)
