Matthew 22:1-14 (Ordinary 28)

Jesus again in reply spoke to the chief priests and elders of the people in parables, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be likened to a king who gave a wedding feast for his son. He dispatched his servants to summon the invited guests to the feast, but they refused to come. A second time he sent other servants, saying, 'Tell those invited: "Behold, I have prepared my banquet, my calves and fattened cattle are killed, and everything is ready; come to the feast." Some ignored the invitation and went away, one to his farm, another to his business. The rest laid hold of his servants, mistreated them, and killed them. The king was enraged and sent his troops, destroyed those murderers, and burned their city. Then he said to his servants, 'The feast is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy to come. Go out, therefore, into the main roads and invite to the feast whomever you find.' The servants went out into the streets and gathered all they found, bad and good alike, and the hall was filled with guests. But when the king came in to meet the guests, he saw a man there not dressed in a wedding garment. The king said to him, 'My friend, how is it that you came in here without a wedding garment?' But he was reduced to silence. Then the king said to his attendants, 'Bind his hands and feet, and cast him into the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.' Many are invited, but few are chosen."

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

After a serious operation a lady was still in a coma. Her worried husband stood at the foot of her bed. "Well," said the nurse reassuringly, "at least her age is on her side."

"Yes" said the husband. "She is forty-five." At this point the patient moved slightly and quietly but firmly murmured, "Forty-four."

Like age, we have many measures to identify/describe who we are. For example: bank account, popularity, talents, physical strength, body shape (beauty)... etc. are some of the measures by which we want to establish who we are. We would like to express who we are with what we possess. This is why we feel depressed and grumpy, or life becomes meaningless when we increase in age or decrease in what we possess.

Today's Gospel reading focuses on who we are and not on what we possess. We are the vineyard of God. Our way of living is not about how much of His vineyard we possess rather how ready we are to bear fruit. Jesus' story today reminds us that our life, like a vineyard is given to us by God. We don't own it. It is given to us on lease. We received it as a free gift through our parents. We can live it as long as our body cooperates with us.

As long as we live it the owner (God) expects us, to bear fruit for the years (time) until death. Death, which can happen to everyone at any time, reminds us that we cannot possess or own it. We have all the responsibility to take care of it and are expected to bear fruit. I lease my life and cannot possess it. Bearing good fruit is the lease God expects from us for the gift of life He has given to us on lease.

The whole story clearly warns us how one can easily identify 'what one has' to mean 'who one is'. We live in a world where 'what one possesses' becomes an identifying factor of 'who that person is'. Possessions can never fully express the person. Possessions can only measure and compare one with the other. Whenever one constructs their self-image with what they have, that person will never realize their real inner identity of who he/she is. Whenever people live their life as moments or opportunities of possessing things/objects, they will fail to savor life in its original taste of bearing fruit. Life is lived not in possessing but in blossoming. When people value themselves with 'who they are', they will begin to blossom in their unmeasurable inner identity – each in their unique worth as a person who is incomparable to anyone and unpurchasable by anything.

How to pray the Rosary? October is the month dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary. The Rosary is a praying tool. According to a Dominican tradition, in 1208 the rosary was given to Dominic in an apparition by the Blessed Virgin Mary in the church of Prouille, France "cradle of the Dominicans". It is a traditional way of praying with the Blessed Mother, meditating on the events of the Gospel called Mysteries. It has been in practice in the Church for a millennium, since 1208. Please find the tip, "How to pray the Rosary" found in this bulletin.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The Litugry of the Word VII

We now return to looking at the second section of the Mass, The Liturgy of the Word. After the homily is given, at every Sunday Mass, we profess our faith by reciting the Creed.

The Creed as we know it has been essentially unchanged (well, at least in Latin!) for over 1600 years. It is the product of two very important ecumenical councils, called to settle Church doctrine. The first council was called by Constantine in the year 325 to take place in Nicea (present-day Iznik, Turkey). There was a major disruption in Church teaching occurring at the time, due to a priest named Arius. He had been teaching that Jesus, though Son of God, was less than God, and is subordinate to God. "There was a time when the Son was not," is a famous quote attributed to Arius. The so-

called heresy of Arianism was threatening to divide the Church.

The Council of Nicea affirmed the belief that God the Father and God the Son were *homoousios* (ὁμοούσιος), meaning they were of the same substance ("consubstantial"). Father and Son are two distinct persons but

one God, who have existed forever. From this council came a "creed," a statement of belief. The Nicean Creed is almost identical to the creed we recite today. The difference is that it ends with a statement of belief in the Holy Spirit, with no details.

The Arians were not content with the outcome of the council. A sect known as the Macedonians began to deny the divinity of the Holy Spirit. So a second council was called in Constantinople in 381. It was at this council that the creed was expanded to include belief in the Holy Spirit: that he too is God, a third distinct person. Yet we still are monotheists, because we believe in the one true God: one God, three persons. And we profess our faith in the Trinity actively at Mass, in response to God's Word.

"The Church confesses one God and Father from whom all things are, one Lord Jesus Christ, through whom all things are, and one Holy Spirit, in whom all things are." - Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 258.



Our cupboards are low and we have had to purchase many items that are typically donated. Even 1 or 2 items are a help.





How to pray the Rosary

- 1: Make the Sign of the Cross
- 2: Holding the Crucifix, say The Apostles' Creed
- 3: On the first bead, say an Our Father
- 4: On the next three beads, say one Hail Mary for each
- 5: Say the Glory Be
- 6: For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery, then say an Our Father
- 7: For the next ten beads, say one Hail Mary for each, then finish with a Glory Be.
- 8: After finishing a decade, we say the prayer requested by the Blessed Virgin at Fatima:

Oh my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to Heaven, especially those who have most need of your mercy.

9: After the five decades, say the Hail, Holy Queen:

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of they womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

10: Make the Sign of the Cross

*It takes about 15 minutes to pray the whole Rosary. Since we repeat the same prayers (i.e. Hail Mary 53 times), the Church helps us meditate on the Gospel by using Mysteries. Each day has 5 Mysteries, to reflect on one during each decade.
