# Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

**Wife: Again, you forgot my birthday. What is your excuse this time?**

Husband: How do you expect me to remember your birthday when you never look any older?

Excuses are self-justifications to hide one's own negligence. Excuses may help momentarily to escape from trouble but in the long run the person will find out that excuses hindered living his/her potentials.

**Today's Gospel story shows how the excuses** diminish one's opportunity and capacity to live one's life in full. Life is like a wedding dinner. God invites us to savor it free of cost. But like those in the Gospel story we may look at life in our own narrow concerns tied to our business, family, or private/personal interests. Focusing on life in a selfishly narrowed way will justify our choice for a particular moment. But unless we face life's invitation to live in its abundance, we never experience the joy of living. Until we engage our total self in everyday demands without any excuses, we will never get the satisfaction fully lived in our life.

**Life has something bigger to offer than** what we can make of it in the name of personal excuses. Life is not formed by outer forces like wealth, popularity, pleasant situations etc. It blossoms from the fermentation of inner forces of love, mercy, forgiveness etc. Jesus invites us to come out of our own self-centered excuses and justifications. Life is the experience of a truth deeper than our personally convenient and selfish convictions.

**If we can open our heart and mind in praying the scripture-readings,** we will be empowered and equipped to see and experience life as a wedding dinner served by God in love, mercy, forgiveness etc. Let us pray that God makes us look at life not as built by our own sweat and toil but as God's invitation to enjoy His free dinner. Let us celebrate life.

**NEXT WEEKEND we will celebrate World Mission Sunday.** Pope Francis invites the entire Church to support mission dioceses in Africa, Asia, the Pacific Islands, and parts of Latin America and Europe, where priests, religious and lay leaders serve the world's most vulnerable communities. Please keep the Pope's missions in your prayers and be generous in next week's collection for the Society for the Propagation of the Faith

# His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

## The Liturgy of the Word VIII

At last we reach the conclusion of our exploration of the second section of the Mass, The Liturgy of the Word. At every Mass, the final part of this section is the Prayer of the Faithful, also known as the "Universal Prayer."

The presider of the Mass opens and closes this prayer. The prayer takes in a particular format. Usually prayers are offered for the needs of the Church, public authorities, those who are struggling, and the local community. In our parish, we mention those who are sick and have recently died, our departed service men and women, as well as indicate for whom the Mass is offered. It is called the Universal Prayer because we really are praying for the whole world.

If a deacon is present, typically he will offer the prayers. This is in line with a principle of his role in the Mass, that being a liaison between the assembly and the presider. The deacon, being a person working and living in secular society, is often in touch with the needs of the



community, and becomes their voice to God, who always hears our prayers.

The Prayer of the Faithful is our last response to the Word of God before we enter into the Liturgy of the Eucharist. It truly helps us enter into the proper frame of mind so that we may receive Jesus' True Presence fully in the Eucharist.

Our participation in this prayer helps to fulfill our calling as Christians that we received at baptism. The intentions we present are an opportunity for us to participate in a real and meaningful way in addressing the needs of our brothers and sisters. May we lift our prayers together at every Mass with love.

"In the Universal Prayer or Prayer of the Faithful, the people respond in some sense to the Word of God which they have just received in faith and, exercising the office of their baptismal priesthood, offer prayers to God for the salvation of all." - *General Instruction of the Roman Missal Church, no. 69.*

# How to pray the Rosary



1: Make the Sign of the Cross

2: Holding the Crucifix, say The Apostles' Creed

3: On the first bead, say an Our Father

4: On the next three beads, say one Hail Mary for each

5: Say the Glory Be

6: For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery, then say an Our Father

7: For the next ten beads, say one Hail Mary for each, then finish with a Glory Be.

8: After finishing a decade, we say the prayer requested by the Blessed Virgin at Fatima:

*Oh my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to Heaven, especially those who have most need of your mercy.*

9: After the five decades, say the Hail, Holy Queen:

*Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of they womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.*

10: Make the Sign of the Cross

\*It takes about 15 minutes to pray the whole Rosary. Since we repeat the same prayers (i.e. Hail Mary 53 times), the Church helps us meditate on the Gospel by using Mysteries. Each day has 5 Mysteries, to reflect on one during each decade.

## Mysteries of the Rosary

Joyful Mysteries (Mon, Sat)

1. The Annunciation to Mary
2. The Visitation of Mary
3. The Birth of our Lord Jesus
4. The Presentation of the Child Jesus in the Temple
5. The Finding of Our Lord in the Temple

Sorrowful Mysteries (Tues, Fri)

1. The Agony of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane
2. The Scourging of Jesus at the Pillar
3. The Crowning of Jesus with Thorns
4. The Carrying of the Cross
5. The Crucifixion and Death of Jesus

Glorious Mysteries (Wed, Sun)

1. The Resurrection of Jesus
2. The Ascension of Jesus
