Matthew 25:31-46 (Christ the King)

Jesus said to his disciples: "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, he will sit upon his glorious throne, and all the nations will be assembled before him. And he will separate them one from another, as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He will place the sheep on his right and the goats on his left.

Then the king will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? When did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?' And the king will say to them in reply, 'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of the least brothers of mine, you did for me.' Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you accursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, a stranger and you gave me no welcome, naked and you gave me no clothing, ill and in prison, and you did not care for me.' Then they will answer and say, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or ill or in prison, and not minister to your needs?' He will answer them, 'Amen, I say to you, what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me.' And these will go off to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life."

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

One Sunday as a farmer was getting in his hay crop, his minister stopped by. The pastor asked the farmer if he had been to church. "To tell the truth, I would rather sit on the hay load and think about the church than sit in the church and think about the hay." When the mind is in the right place even the hay load can be a worshiping place. If the mind is wavering even the church will be turned into a hay load. What matters is not where we are or what we have; rather it is about how totally we involve and engage ourselves in anything we do or have.

Today's Gospel is the story of how each servant used the talent given by the master. The story invites us to focus on how much we are ready to totally engage ourselves in life. Those who had the five and two talents did not waste any time comparing with each other as to who has more. They readily invested the talents and doubled them; whereas the person who had one talent, did not invest for the fear of losing it. Those who refuse or are afraid to grow get frozen and eventually become dead.

All what we do is what a seed does. A seed, when it is sown (buried) in the ground, sends roots below, pushes itself up through the hard soil above, opens the buds, blossoms and eventually bears fruit. If it just lies on the ground, soon a yard hen will find it and eat it promptly. Jesus says, "If the grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies... it produces much fruit." (John 12:23) Jesus says to us that He came so that we might have life and have it more abundantly. (John 10:10). Let us take life in its every moment to grow. Let us not waste time comparing our potential with each other. Jesus invites us to engage in life more enthusiastically with all that we have and who we are.

This Thursday is the Great Feast of Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is the moment when we freeze our life from all our routine so that we look at life to be much more than a mechanical production or a business contract. We celebrate this feast at the end of the harvest. We witnessed in nature how each single seed has brought forth multiple fruits. We laid out a very small amount and nature creatively paid us back in abundance. Just the realization of this abundance inspires in us a feeling called THANKSGIVING. Likewise, our relationships in life offer us much more than we put in them. At the realization of this mystery of abundant reward from Nature

and Life's relationship, let us stop for a moment reflectively and raise our hearts in appreciations of the gifts that made us who we are and offered to us all that we have. Happy Thanksgiving to all of you who are the primary reasons for my being who I am and of having all that I have. HAPPY THANKSGIVING.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

Happy Eucharist!

This coming Thursday, many of us will gather with family and friends around the dinner table in the celebration of the great feast of Thanksgiving. Is it possible that there is some connection to this holiday and Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist?

Indeed there is. In fact, it's the very word Eucharist. It comes from the Greek word eucharistia ($\varepsilon\dot{\nu}\chi\alpha\rho\iota\sigma\tau(\alpha)$) which means "thanksgiving." If we look at the institution of the Eucharist in, for example, Luke's Gospel, we find that Jesus took a cup and gave thanks, and also when he took the bread, he said the blessing before breaking it. These words of thanks and blessing are known in Hebrew as the $berekah\ prayers$. The

Jewish blessings over a meal, most importantly during a seder (as was the Last Supper), begin with these familiar words to us Catholics: "Blessed are you, Lord God ...," as we hear them said by the priest during the consecration of the bread and wine at Mass.






