

Luke 1:26-38 (Advent 4)

The angel Gabriel was sent from God to a town of Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David, and the virgin's name was Mary. And coming to her, he said, "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." But she was greatly troubled at what was said and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. Then the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God.

"Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus. He will be great and will be called Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." But Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I have no relations with a man?" And the angel said to her in reply, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore the child to be born will be called holy, the Son of God. And behold, Elizabeth, your relative, has also conceived a son in her old age, and this is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing will be impossible for God." Mary said, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

Focus Questions for 12/24/23

Luke 1:26-38

- 1: Recall a time when you were troubled about how you should respond to sudden news.
- 2: Mary responded readily to the angel, saying that she was the handmaiden of the Lord. How difficult or easy has it been for you to respond to God?
- 3: Reread the Gospel as if you are hearing it for the first time. Enter into the wonder and extraordinariness of what is being communicated. What is your reaction to reading it this way?

Family & Children's Question:
Talk about the first Christmas with your family around your nativity scene.



Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

A promising young executive quit his job, and before leaving, stopped to say goodbye to the boss. The boss lamented, "I am sorry to see you go. Actually, you have been like a son to me – sassy, impatient, demanding, and loud." When the executive joined the job, the resume described who he was. When he quit the job, the remark of the boss pictured what the resume failed to report. The identity of a person involves both who he/she is and who he/she is not.

Today's Gospel helps us know and realize who we are. It is the story of priests and Levites asking John (John the Baptist) "Who are you?" John answered them first negatively who he is not. He is not the Messiah, not Elijah, nor any prophet. Then he says to them positively who he is. "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, 'make straight the way of the Lord,'" He continued to explain why he did what he did. He baptized with water calling the people to repent from sinful way of life, so that they are prepared to be baptized with Holy Spirit by the one who comes behind Him.

John explained his identity negatively, what he is not, and positively, who he is. This identity empowered him and caused him to do what he did. John helps us all to realize our self-identity. First, we should admit who we are not, secondly try to find out who we really are. Thirdly, all that we do or say must be empowered and caused by the realized identity. When we don't realize who we are not or pretend to be someone else than who we are, we will be wasting time and energy establishing our untrue identity. When we are true to ourselves to realize who we are, we will focus all our time and energy to live as who we are. All that we do or say will totally and enthusiastically blossom from our true self, the realized identity.

Paul in the second reading encourages not to "quench the Spirit." The more we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit the more entirely will we be preserved in our 'spirit, soul and body.' Our identity is to see that our faculties of spirit, soul and body are not divided and set one against another. When we don't accept who we are not we willfully set our mind and soul against our body. When our faculties are divided, we become weak and can be easily conquered. For example, if our body does not live the truth of the heart (soul), that is the moment when the mind begins to justify or condemn why we behaved the way we did. Justification or condemnation is the sign that the faculties are set one against another in a person.

The third week of Advent brings Christmas very close. Just a week more to the great feast when God comes to us in our own nature to awaken us to how rich we are just by ourselves without any pretension and false pride. God comes to us in Jesus stripping all His power and glory to live with us to inspire how good a human being can live. Let us treat this Advent as the time to strip who we are not and realize who we are; let us claim for ourselves our true identity, the God given identity.

In 7 days, we will celebrate Christmas. Closer to Christmas it is customary to put up a Crèche with all the figurines except the Baby Jesus, whose figurine we will place on the eve of Christmas. When you finish decorating the Creche/manger or on Christmas eve when you place the Baby Jesus, please pray the following prayer as a family around the creche.

God our Father, you loved us so much. You sent us your only son, Jesus, born of the Virgin Mary, to save us and lead us back to you.

We pray that, with your blessing, these images might be a sign of your presence and love in our homes.

Good Father, give your blessing to all who gather with us this Christmas, family and friends,

Open our hearts, that we might receive Jesus in joy, do always what he asks of us and see him in those who need our love.

We ask this in the name of Jesus your beloved Son, who came to give peace to the world. You who live and reign forever and ever. Amen.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

Tantum Ergo, Part II

Today we conclude our look at the hymn known as the *Tantum Ergo*, composed by St. Thomas Aquinas for the Feast of Corpus Christi in the mid 13th century. This hymn is frequently chanted at the conclusion of Adoration, and is a wonderful meditation on the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. This is the concluding verse.

Genetori Genitoque, laus et jubilatio: "Praise and rejoicing to the one who begets (God the Father) and the begotten (God the Son)". Aquinas now takes a step back and recognizes that our worship of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is not

complete until we recognize Jesus' place in the Holy Trinity.

Salus, honor, virtus quoque sit et benedictio: "Let us give acclamation, honor, might and blessing to the one who gives us salvation." Here again, we do not simply look upon Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament without realizing the larger picture of salvation.

Procedenti ab utroque compar sit laudatio: "Let us give equal praise and thanksgiving to the one who proceed s (the Holy Spirit) from them both (Father and Son)." Aquinas also recognizes the Holy Spirit as the Third Person of the Trinity. In doing so, we see that this entire closing verse is what is called a *doxology*, a liturgical prayer or hymn of praise to God. In the Eucharist, since Christ is truly present, then also are the Father and the Holy Spirit present.

The season of Advent is a perfect time for us to rededicate ourselves to Christ and his Real Presence. Perhaps this means more frequent attendance at Mass, to receive him in Holy Communion. Perhaps this means coming to a Holy Hour, either in our parish (every first Tuesday at 7 pm) or elsewhere. Perhaps it even might mean stopping into the

church when it is open, sitting or kneeling in a pew, and reflecting on the tabernacle,

where Christ is present.

"The presence of Christ's true body and blood in this sacrament cannot be detected by sense, nor understanding, but by faith alone, which rests upon Divine authority" - St. Thomas Aquinas, Summa Theologiae, III, 75, 1.
