





#### Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

A hundred-year-old tombstone bears the following epitaph: "Pause Stranger, when you pass me by. As you are now, so once was I. As I am now, so you will be. So, prepare for death and follow me." An unknown passerby read those words and underneath scratched this reply: "To follow you I am not content, until I know which way you went." Life is not merely a walk on a path that someone paved, but a personal journey that everyone has to travel for themselves at their personal choice.

Today's readings invite us to follow God's voice that each of us can personally hear within ourselves. In the first reading, we read that the boy Samuel was living in the right place (Temple) and with the right person (High Priest) to direct him in the right way. Yet when the Lord called him by his name, he could not identify who was calling him until Eli helped him recognize that it was the Lord calling him. When it comes to God, we may have all the disposition to experience and serve God; but we can easily be misled to take human word for God's voice, or be misdirected to naively take any noise as God's call. We need some direction from a person of God.

In the Gospel, John the Baptist (like Eli) helped his disciples follow Jesus, the Lamb of God. When they followed Him, Jesus asked His new followers a personal question, ""What are you looking for?" They did not answer Jesus's question directly but with their own question, "Rabbi, where are you staying?" By their response in the form of a question they wanted Jesus to assume that they were ready to follow Him, and all they wanted to know from Jesus is where He lives so that they can stay and be with Him. But Jesus did not want their following to be assumed or to be taken for granted. Rather their following should come from their voluntary and personal decisions. Thus, Jesus invites them to "Come and See."

Following Jesus should spring from one's own personal willful decision. Others like Eli or John the Baptist can help a person indicate the direction for the person to follow. Information from others can assist but should not force the person. If following Jesus does not happen from one's own personal choice and decision, it would be a blind and forced one, and would make the follower impersonally involved like a small cog in a large wheel. Then the follower would not find themselves following a person but would feel they are someone or something functionally necessary, but insignificant or unimportant within a larger operation or organization.

Today's Gospel continues the story telling how the personal decision of the disciples to stay with Jesus changed their realization of who Jesus was for them. They were introduced to Jesus as the "Lamb of God" by their former teacher John the Baptist. After staying with Jesus their realization of who Jesus was became a different one, a personally realized one. The Gospel says that Andrew shared his experience of Jesus with his brother Simon, "We have found the Messiah." Following Jesus is not merely decision to go behind a master or adopting a different style of living. Rather it is a new awakening, new realization, new relationship, new power of living that happens in the follower. May all our worship, prayers, and meditations help us realize Jesus and develop a personal relationship with Jesus. Let us follow Jesus from our heart.

#### His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

#### The Mass: Liturgy of the Eucharist - Part II

Last week we began a look at the second section of Mass, the Liturgy of the Eucharist. You'll recall the opening of this section involves the collection and the Offertory. One other thing that takes place while the collection is being taken up and the Offertory Procession is being readied, and that is the Preparation of the Table (altar) for Communion.

In this preparation, the deacon, assisted by altar servers, moves to a special table called the *credence table*. This table usually sits in proximity to the altar in the sanctuary. In our parish, those who sit on the choir side of the church might be able to spot it.

On this table there will be one or more *chalices*, which will hold the Precious Blood. There will also be *purificators*. These are rectangular strips of white cloth with a red cross embroidered on them. They are used to catch any droplets of the precious blood, as well as to cleanse the sacred vessels during the purification (which will be covered in a separate article).

The deacon places a *corporal* (a white square piece of cloth) on the altar, then arranges the chalices and purificators. The corporal will catch any fragments of the Blessed Sacrament. The *Roman Missal*, the book from which the prayers of the Mass are read, is also placed on the altar.

When the Offertory Procession reaches the priest, the priest and deacons will take the *ciboria* (the vessels holding the unconsecrated hosts), the *paten* (the circular golden plate on which the priest's host resides) and the *cruet* of wine from the procession and place these on the altar as well. The table is now prepared for the blessing of the bread and wine, which will ultimately become the Real Presence of our Lord.

"Among the requisites for the celebration of the Mass, the sacred vessels are held in special honor, and among these especially the chalice and the paten, in which the bread and wine are offered and consecrated and from which they are consumed." – *General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 327.*




ALPHA is an opportunity to explore the Christian faith in a friendly, open, and informal environment.
