Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

An old Jewish mother complains to her friend, "My son Joey converted to Christianity." Her friend says, "My God, my Eddie also converted! What can we do about it?" The first woman responds, "The only thing we can do is pray." So, the two of them head to the synagogue, where they sit down with prayer books and pour out their hearts to the Almighty. After a few minutes, they hear a booming voice coming out of nowhere. "How am I supposed to help?" God says, irritated. "My son converted to Christianity too!"

We often understand Conversion to mean a change of faith from one religion to another, or from being an atheist to a theist. Today's readings call the listeners to a radical conversion that has to happen inwardly in their heart, not so much outwardly from a certain system of belief to a different set of belief. The first reading narrates how the people of Nineveh turned from their evil ways, and thus God changed his plan of destroying the city. Conversion means that turning from their evil ways to God's ways saved them from the evil which they would have inflicted on themselves because of their non-conversion.

In today's Gospel Jesus encourages us not only to convert but also to believe. "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." Through conversion (repent) Jesus invites us to turn away from our former life. By believing, Jesus introduces us to embrace/live new life which He lays out before us. Conversion means a spiritual 'moving' from present stage to a more promising stage. While conversion invites a person to move from the present style of life it does not specify "where" to move or what style of life to embrace.

That is why Jesus adds "believe in the gospel" as the goal of conversion. Conversion is the first step from our side. It is what we have to do. It is our move towards God. "Believing in the Gospel" is God's move towards us. Believing is the point where we meet God. Believing is the moment when God embraces us with the Good News (Gospel). We near God in conversion. God nears us with Gospel. We meet each other in believing. In believing, the believers offer themselves to move from their own style of life to embrace Gospel-style of life that God presents to them. Every act or deed that expresses belief is the occasion when God empowers and fulfills His Good News in the believers.

Jesus reminds us that 'conversion' and 'believing in Gospel' have to happen NOW, RIGHT at this moment; No time to waste; No moment to wait. His words are, "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent and Believe." We have no time to delay and waste. Nothing should hinder. The Good News is at our door. The Kingdom of God (which is the Gospel in reality) is at our hand. No excuse can be made. Jesus expects us to rise and act as the first disciples reacted immediately to His call. "He called them. So they left their father Zebedee in the boat along with the hired men and followed him." It is our time to respond to the Good News. It is our time to convert and believe in the Gospel.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The Mass: Liturgy of the Eucharist - Part III

In our look at the Liturgy of the Eucharist last week, recall the gifts of bread and wine were presented to the priest. The next action that takes place is a prayer of blessing over the gifts.

This is one of the places in the Mass where we have commonality with the seder meal of our Jewish brothers and sisters. The Last Supper, of course, was a seder meal. At a seder, the leader recites the following over the unleavened bread: "Baruch Atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech haolam, hamotzi lechem min ha-aretz." This means "We praise God, Spirit of everything who brings bread from

the land." This is very similar in word and structure to what the priest says, in the prayer over the bread: "Blessed are you, God of all creation, for through your goodness we have this bread to offer...". A similar prayer of blessing over the wine, recalling the seder prayer, is then prayed.

In this part of the Mass, we recognize that the bread and wine come from human labor, but originate as God's gifts of wheat and grapes to us. In preparing this simple bread and wine, we offer it back to God, so that they may be changed into Jesus' Body and Blood, his Real Presence.

You will notice before the wine is offered that the deacon takes the cruet of water and places a drop of it into the wine. In doing so, the deacon prays the following softly: "By the mystery of this water and wine, may we come to share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity." This action recalls the days when wine was very thick, and needed thinning. Now, however, we remember that both the wine and the bread, once they have truly become Jesus, will allow us to share in his very self as God.

"For as the bread, which is produced from the earth, (...) is no longer common bread, but the Eucharist, consisting of two realities, earthly and heavenly; so also our bodies, when they receive the Eucharist, are no longer corruptible, having the hope of the resurrection to eternity." – Irenaeus, *Against Heresies, IV:8, 5.*


