### John 2:13-25 (Lent 3)

Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the money changers seated there. He made a whip out of cords and drove them all out of the temple area, with the sheep and oxen, and spilled the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables, and to those who sold doves he said, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace." His disciples recalled the words of Scripture, Zeal for your house will consume me. At this the Jews answered and said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered and said to them, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and you will raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking about the temple of his body. Therefore, when he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they came to believe the Scripture and the word Jesus had spoken.

While he was in Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, many began to believe in his name when they saw the signs he was doing. But Jesus would not trust himself to them because he knew them all, and did not need anyone to testify about human nature. He himself understood it well.

1: What gets in the way of your relationship with God?

2: Describe a time when you asked God for a sign.

3: How do you react when you see God's house, God's people, or God's creation treated irreverently

Family & Children's Question: Talk about ways you show reverence when you are in church.



# Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

Customer: I've come back to buy that television I was looking at yesterday.

Salesman: That's good. May I ask what the one compelling reason was that made you want this set? Customer: My wife.

**The readings of the Second Week of Lent ask us the same question**, "What compels us to do anything we do?" In the first reading Abraham was ready to sacrifice his only son Isaac. How could he do that? What made him boldly make that decision to sacrifice his own son? Reading through the whole story of Abraham, we find that his faith in God was his compelling strength to go that far. His faith was that God, who made him father of Isaac miraculously in his 100<sup>th</sup> year, will never disappoint him. Even when he was put by God to the hardest test, sacrificing Isaac his son, his faith in God gave Isaac back to him alive.

**Today's Gospel story couples Jesus' glorious moment of transfiguration** to his ignominious moment of dying on the cross. How could the glorious Jesus accept to live through shameful and painful moments on the cross? What was his compelling strength? His conscious realization that the Father who sent him would never abandon him but would raise him from death as victor over the invincible death.

The second reading invites all of us to have the same unshakable faith in God. Faith is the basic and compelling force of Life. Without faith no one will be able to live for the next moment. It is the faith that we have in each of us, in our family and friends, that makes life alive and manageable. Ultimately it is the faith in God that fills us with the hopeful living force to live through any sufferings. If God is for us, who can be against us? With faith we can walk through death and rise with Jesus. Faith in Jesus means we can win even death.

**During Lent we pray the Stations of the Cross every Friday** at 7:00pm, in the church for a particular intention. This Friday February 23<sup>rd</sup> at 7:00pm we will pray for the Addicted, and those struggling with Temptation and challenges of life.

# His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

### The Mass: Liturgy of the Eucharist - Part VII

Before we review each of the four individual Eucharistic Prayers during the Liturgy of the Eucharist at Mass, let's take at the *Institution Narrative and Consecration*. This is the moment when the bread and wine become the body and blood of Jesus.

We should never fail to appreciate that Jesus himself instituted the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and we find the evidence of this in Sacred Scripture. Note in *Matthew 26:26-28* that, at the Last Supper, Jesus took the bread, blessed it, broke it and directed his disciples to eat it, saying, "This is my body." Jesus further took the cup of wine, blessed it, and directed his disciples to drink it, saying that it is "my blood of the covenant, shed for many." These words are continued to this day in the words said by the priest in the words of consecration during Mass.

If you review *Mark 14:22-24*, you will find the same words, as you will in Luke *22:17-20*. These words are so important that they are found in every Eucharistic Prayer. When they are said, we know that Jesus is now present in the bread and wine.

We find something else crucial in John's Gospel. In *John 6:48* -58, Jesus explains that he is the bread of life, the true man-

na from heaven (harkening back to *Exodus 16:15* and the manna in the desert for the Israelites freed from Egyptian captivity), and we are to eat his flesh and drink his blood. In *John 6:54*, for "eat," John uses the Greek word  $\tau \rho \dot{\omega} \gamma \omega v$ , which means to "gnaw or chew." There is no doubt that we are meant to believe the Eucharist is not a symbol of Jesus, but his Real Presence.

"It is not man that causes the things offered to be the Body and Blood of Christ, but he who was crucified for us, Christ himself. The priest, in the role of Christ, pronounces these words,

but their power and grace are God's. This is my body, he says. This word transforms the things offered."– *St John Chrysostom, prod. Jud. 1:6: PG 49, 380*







# Fasting @ & Abstinence

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MORE +

m on <u>Ash Wednesday</u> and <u>Good Friday</u> are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, <u>Fridays</u> during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. See the guidelines below!

- Fasting is obligatory for ages 18-59 inclusive.
- Fasting constitutes no more than one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are less than a full meal.
- Abstinence is obligatory for all Catholics aged 14 or older.
- Abstinence is to avoid eating meat (chicken, pork, beef, etc). Fish is allowed.
- Please remember to drink lots of water!



If possible, the fast on Good Friday can be continued until the Easter Vigil as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus and to prepare more fully for his Resurrection.






