#### Mark 11:1-10 (Palm Sunday, at the Procession)

When Jesus and his disciples drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village opposite you, and immediately on entering it, you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone should say to you, 'Why are you doing this?' reply, 'The Master has need of it and will send it back here at once." So they went off and found a colt tethered at a gate outside on the street, and they untied it. Some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They answered them just as Jesus had told them to, and they permitted them to do it. So they brought the colt to Jesus and put their cloaks over it. And he sat on it. Many people spread their


it. And he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut from the fields. Those preceding him as well as those following kept crying out: "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is to come! Hosanna in the highest!"

#### Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Devotee: "Lord, where are you? I am searching for you everywhere and you don't seem to be anywhere. Are

you not hearing me? Where are you?" God: "I am here, very near to you." Devotee: "Come on, tell me.... where?" God: "Deep within you. In your Heart."

God, like love, cannot be found unless you feel it for yourself within your heart.

On the Fifth Sunday of Lent, the Prophet Jeremiah, in the first reading explains how God can be experienced within each of us. "I will place my law within them and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer will they have need to teach their friends and relatives how to know the LORD." All that we need to do is, as the Responsorial Psalm instructs, to have a clean heart and steadfast Spirit so that our search for God is not mired in the swamps of various other interests nor is slackened by them.

In the Gospel Jesus realizes that his Hour has come to experience within Himself His divine Glory and express it to the world. This Hour is his moment of facing the passion and death on the Cross. But He calls his suffering and death as the Hour of Glory. It is the Hour when He, like a seed would fall on the ground in order to bear fruit. His Hour is the time when the world will begin to realize who He is and what kind of fruit the world would receive from Him. Jesus was always conscious of this Hour of Glory and He was never hesitant to live it and reveal it to the World.

Jesus calls his hanging on the Cross as "lifted up from the earth." And when He will be lifted upon the Cross, He will draw everyone to Himself, meaning that the moment of his death is the time when God will gather all of us as God's family around God in Jesus. Jesus' death on the Cross is a free invitation from God to become God's family of love. Whoever we may be and however unworthy we may be, we can become God's loving children by believing in Jesus' death and Resurrection. Let us get ourselves prepared to celebrate and participate in this mystery of God's love, the death and Resurrection of Jesus in the Holy Week.

The focus of Lenten spiritual exercises is to be conscious of God who dwells in our heart. Being conscious of such Godly presence within us, we are called to live like Jesus. As Jesus lived what God made Him conscious of, even unto death, so are we called to live what God makes us conscious of. Under the Cross we are gathered as the family of God being conscious of God's fatherly presence in our hearts and thus becoming conscious that we, as children of God are siblings to each other. Our Lenten observances and everyday prayers are nothing but an attempt to live consciously God's presence within us and courage to experience and express that God's presence to each other as brothers and sisters.

**Next Sunday is Palm Sunday.** We begin the Holy Week. Palms will be distributed at the beginning of the masses on Palm Sunday. We will begin the mass blessing the Palms and reading from the Gospel the event of the First Palm Sunday when Jesus entered the city of Jerusalem for his last week on earth as a human being willingly undergoing the passion death on the Cross and the Resurrection on the third day. Next Monday March 25<sup>th</sup>, confessions will be heard from 2:00 pm to 9:00 pm in our church and all the churches of our Diocese.

Friday, March 22<sup>nd</sup> at 6:00 pm is the Soup Supper. If you wish to attend, please bring meatless soup to share with others. The soup supper will be followed by Stations of the Cross. This is the last Stations of the Cross before Good Friday. We will pray it in a special way, laying down all our burdens at the foot of the Cross. All are welcome.

#### His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

#### The Mass: Liturgy of the Eucharist - Part IX

Our next Eucharistic Prayer to examine is the second one of the four. Eucharistic Prayer II is probably the most familiar to us since this is the one used by many priests the majority of the time. It flows well and is not too long.

This prayer was one of three formulated by the Church after considerable debate directly following Vatican II, in the years 1963-1968. The three new Eucharistic Prayers, added along with the one we looked at last week, were promulgated by a decree of the Congregation of Rites on May 23, 1968. This

prayer is actually based on one composed by Hippolytus to be used by bishops at Mass, and comes from the early third century.


The main body of the prayer, after the *Preface* and the *Sanctus*, immediately begins with thanksgiving, recognizing the Father as "the fount of all holiness." An *epiclesis* follows, in which we recall the manna from the desert (*Exodus 16:4-15*) with the words "like the dewfall." The Israelites were fed each morning with the bread from heaven, and now Jesus becomes for

us the Bread of Life at every Mass by the power of the Holy Spirit (see *John 6:27-35*). The *Institution Narrative* and the *Consecration* follows. As usual, we are then asked to join in the *Mystery of Faith*.

In the *anamnesis* we thank God for making us worthy to minister to him. The second *epiclesis* acknowledges our desire to be one with Christ. This is followed by *intercessions* for the pope and the local bishop, as well as for the dead. The prayer concludes with a hope that we may be "coheirs to eternal life" with all the saints, and then we hear the final *doxology*.

"Therefore, as we celebrate the memorial of his Death and Resurrection, we offer you, Lord, the Bread of life and the Chalice of salvation, giving thanks that you have held us worthy to be in your presence and minister to you. Humbly we pray that, partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ, we may be gathered into one by the Holy Spirit." – *Eucharistic Prayer II, no. 105.*


#### Girl Scout Celebration!

#### **Fasting** & Abstinence

<u>Ash Wednesday</u> and <u>Good Friday</u> are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. See the guidelines below!

- Fasting is obligatory for ages 18-59 inclusive.
- Fasting constitutes no more than one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are less than a full meal.
- Abstinence is obligatory for all Catholics aged 14 or older.
- Abstinence is to avoid eating meat (chicken, pork, beef, etc). Fish is

If possible, the fast on Good Friday can be continued until the Easter Vigil as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of our Lord Jesus and to prepare more fully for his Resurrection.
