He said to him, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments."

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

Mark Twain was once asked the difference between a mistake and a blunder. He explained it this way: "If you walk into a restaurant and walk out with someone's silk umbrella and leave your own cotton one, that is a mistake. But if you pick up someone's cotton umbrella and leave your own silk one, that is a blunder."

In today's Gospel story, the Pharisees tried to trap Jesus between a blunder and a mistake by the question "Is it lawful to pay the census tax to Caesar or not?" Jesus was asked to choose between God and Caesar.

They wanted an answer from Jesus but Jesus makes each of them responsible to become their own answer. Life does not have any readymade answers. The answer has to come from one's own heart. The aim of Jesus is not merely to silence them or to act smart by his clever answer. Rather to make each one of us to act from within.

We live in an age of dividing the life's issues into that of state or religion. It is possible to divide the issues; how can we divide the person? The person is one and the same whether in the church or in a town hall meeting. All our answers to any question coming from our divided person will be only a partial answer either coming from religion (God) or coming from the state (Caesar). But today the

answer of Jesus asks us to be an Integrated (undivided) person to answer responsibly-- not to choose one at the cost of the other but to live as an integrated person to influence or strengthen one with the other.

October 31st Halloween - November 1st, Feast of All Saints. The origin of the word *Halloween* is Christian. *Halloween* falls on the evening before the Christian holy days of All Hallows' Day (also known as *All Saints*, *Hallowmas* or *Hallow tide*) on November 1 and All Souls Day on November 2nd, thus giving the holiday on October 31st the full name of *All Hallows' Eve* which in popular use became *Halloween*.

God calls us to be saints and has given us the power to become saints. Thus when we celebrate our inner power and identity of being saints on November 1st, we rightfully ridicule and make fun of evil on the eve of the feast of 'All Saints'. The Halloween costumes are geared towards making fun of evil and to highlight the goodness and saintliness with which we are created.

How about an All Saints Mass with Costumes on November 1st? Against the background of what I explained above I invite all children, teens and adults to attend the All Saints Day mass on Saturday, November 1st at 5:00pm in your Halloween costumes, which will be followed by refreshments. Also some of us can come dressed as a Saint (e.g. St. Francis of Assisi, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, St. Kateri Tekakwitha- the first Native American Saint- etc.). Thus we can celebrate our power to be saints by ridiculing all that is non-saintly and evil.

This year November 2nd, All Souls Day falls on a Sunday. The memorial mass for all those who passed away during the previous year will be celebrated at 12:15 pm in the church. Letters of invitation have been sent to the families. Please join us to pray for them at this mass.

Congratulations to Al and Eileen Weidig who will receive the Saint Agnes Medal during a prayer service of thanksgiving to be held next Sunday, October 26, 2014 at the Cathedral of Saint Agnes at 3:00pm, for their consistent, generous and meaningful contributions in so many ways to the life of the parish. May God inspire more couples through

their examples. May God bless our parish-family with a generous spirit of serving each other.
