Growing through the Sunday Scriptures

March 24, 2019 Third Sunday of Lent Exodus 3:1-8a, 13-15 Psalm 103: 1-2, 3-4, 6-7, 8, 11 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12 Luke 13: 1-9

Some people told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with the blood of their sacrifices. Jesus said to them in reply,

"Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! Or those eighteen people who were killed when the tower at Siloam fell on them— do you think they were more guilty than everyone else who lived in Jerusalem? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!"

And he told them this parable:

"There once was a person who had a fig tree planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener,

'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?'

He said to him in reply,

'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future. If not you can cut it down.'"

Focus Questions:

- 1. Relate a time when someone you know blamed God for a misfortune. How did you respond?
- 2. Related a time when you doubted God's love when you were suffering.
- 3. Describe a time when you trusted God even though bad things happened to you.

Family and children's question:

Talk about a person who had strong faith in God even though they didn't have an easy life. How does that person inspire you?

FR. ANTONY'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

It's easy to get mixed up with four-year olds in church. This particular four-year-old prayed: "And forgive us our trash baskets as we forgive those who put trash in our baskets." None of us are trash baskets that trash can be thrown into each other's basket. The second week of Lent invites us to realize our spiritual identity as God's chosen children.

The First reading narrates how God uplifts Abraham from his despair. God strengthens his faith and makes a covenantal relationship promising that he would not die childless, but be the father of a nation and a country. The Second reading explains that our identity is not what our lowly and "shameful" body defines us to be. In the light of the Gospel, Paul invites us to see in each of us what happened to Jesus' body. As Jesus showed His glorified body to His disciples on the mount during the transfiguration, we who believe in Jesus and walk in His way and truth will not end our story on earth but journey with Jesus as citizens of heaven.

Our body is not a basket that collects trash throughout life and ends in trash. Likewise no human body is to be treated as trash. God chose us to be His chosen children in Baptism, as God expressed in today's Gospel. Let us treat each other with God-given dignity. Let us try to live our dignity in our human body. Let us pray that this Lent would help us appreciate this God-given dignity in all human persons in all stages of life.

Sunday Evening Mass: In order to help young families attend Mass on Sunday, we are beginning, on a trial basis, to celebrate evening mass once a month on Sunday. This Mass would be on Sunday, March 31st at 5:30 pm. Please spread the news and encourage young families to come and worship with us.

This year's Lenten Project is to support General Needs, a distribution agency that provides basic necessities of life to more than 5,000 homeless veterans on Long Island. This includes items such as t-shirts, underwear, and toiletries that are distributed directly to these men and women who have given their service to us and our country. Q&A by Fr. Antony

(A section answering questions often asked)

Why are certain parts of the Bible called 'The Book of..., Gospel of ...and Letters of ...?'



The word "Bible" comes from the Greek word "BIBLOS" (meaning book or record). The Bible is a one Big book containing many small books, recording/narrating the

deeds and word of God with

various human beings starting from Adam and Eve, Abraham, Moses, the people of Israel, prophets and finally through God's own Son, Jesus Christ. (Hebrew 1:1-2) In this general sense all the parts of the bible are called a book. Certain books are called after the persons through whom God enabled His redemptive history, e.g. Book of Judges, Book of Samuel, Book of Kings, Book of Ruth.. In the case of Prophets, since God directly revealed to them what they should do or say, their writings are called after their individual names e.g. prophecy or book of Isiah, Ezekiel, Jeremiah, Amos....

In the New Testament, the first four books are the Gospels, translating the Greek word ("Euanggelion" meaning Good News). The Gospel of Mark, Matthew, Luke and John, narrate what Jesus did and said, his passion death, Resurrection and Ascension.

The fifth book of the New Testament is called the Acts of the Apostle narrating the spread of the church through the ministries of St. Peter and St. Paul. The last book is called the Book of Revelation figuratively describing the end of the world and the Heavenly Jerusalem.

The rest of the books are letters of the Apostle Paul to his churches, like the church in Corinth, Thessalonica etc., and those of the Apostles Peter, Jude and John to their Church.
