Jesus told his disciples this parable: "The kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five were wise. Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Late one night in the insane asylum one inmate shouted, "I am Napoleon."

Another said, 'How do you know." The first inmate said, "God told me." Just then, a voice from the next room shouted, "I did not."

Names and titles are claims of the individuals who want to distinguish themselves from others. But how distinguishing can we be before God who is the creator of everything and is in everybody?

In today's Gospel Jesus says, "Call no one on earth your father; you have but one Father in heaven." How to understand this? How shall we call our dads? No more father? Does Jesus propose a different name for our fathers? He does not stop with the title "Father". Jesus also says, "As for you, do not be called 'Rabbi.'" "Do not be called 'Master'" What is going on in today's Gospel? Jesus invites us to reflect on all the titles we use to address people who are personally involved in forming and shaping our lives.

The titles we use to address people are not merely conventional titles we give. They are titles charged with meaning and responsibility, honor and duty. Titles not only describe how that person is related to us, but also confirms the reality of such relationship. If a person is 'Father' he is not only the title biologically but in reality, in his responsibility, duty, care, and support.

Jesus does not stop there. He further raises the standard of the title 'Father' by comparing the human father-hood to that of God, the Heavenly Father. By saying, "Call no one on earth your father; you have but one Father in heaven." Jesus means that every human father is just a reflection of the heavenly Father. The man whom we call "Father" has the God-given inner spiritual strength to reflect God who cares for us as our creator and supporter.

St Paul explains in a subtle verse, "I kneel before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named, that he may grant you in accord with the riches of his glory to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in the inner self." Every Family, in its members (father, mother, brother, sister, etc.) receives their meaning and responsibility, honor and duty from God.

We owe every aspect of our life to God. All that we claim as of ours has come from God. Any claim that does not have God as its basis is an empty claim. That is the reason Jesus radically eliminates even the basic human titles (claims) like 'Father' or 'Teacher'. The title 'Father' or 'Mother' can be a true and effective title as long as it reflects the 'Fatherhood' or 'Motherhood' of God in service and love. Likewise, the title 'Teacher' can be valid and worthy only when it reflects the 'Teaching ministry' of Christ in service and truth. The titles are not given to show one's greatness but one's ability to serve, as the Gospel says, 'the greatest among you must be your servant.' Service to others is the fundamental proof of one's claim over any title that he/she has or proudly owns.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

Padre Pio

It's time to reflect on another saint that is closely associated with the Eucharist. Today, we turn our attention to the beloved Padre Pio.

St. Pius of Pietrelcina, his formal name, was born Francesco Forgione in Pietrelcina, Italy on May 25, 1887, to a poor family. He decided to dedicate his life to God at the age of only 5. He became a novitiate in the Capuchin Order of Friars Minor at age 15, taking the name "Pio," in honor of Pope Pius I. He was ordained a priest at the age of 23.

Although he suffered from poor health for most of his life, he truly loved his vocation. He would typically spend 19 hours a day in prayer, saying Mass, and, most famously, hearing confessions. Padre Pio's life most certainly centered around Jesus, and his unquenchable love for the Lord and his Real Presence in the Eucharist.

Padre Pio spent a great deal of time most days in Eucharistic Adoration. In fact, he was so happy during Adoration that he wrote: "When I am close to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, I feel as if my heart is bursting out of my chest." When he was first ordained, he would spend an extremely long amount of time during the Consecration portion of Mass, in ecstasy,

which caused complaints by parishioners.

"A Mass said by Padre Pio is as effective as a missionary journey," said Pope Paul VI, because of Padre's great love for Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament. Padre Pio passed away on September 23, 1968 at the age of eighty-one. Pope St. John Paul II canonized him on June 16, 2002, and we celebrate his feast day on September 23.

Padre Pio, pray for us, that we might have that same desire

to spend quality time with Jesus in Adoration as you did, and that our zeal for participating in Mass and receiving the Eucharist may never be dampened.



Archbasilica of St John Lateran




More formally known as "The Archbasilica Cathedral of the Most Holy Savior and of Saints John the Baptist and John the Evangelist in the Lateran, Mother and Head of All Churches in Rome and in the World", the Lateran is the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome, and the seat of the Bishop of Rome (the Pope). About 4km from Vatican City, the archbasilica is the oldest public church in Rome, dedicated in 324 by Pope Sylvester I.

From its dedication until the 14th century, the archbasilica served as the residence of the Holy Father (a full millennia!). Even when St. Peter's was built in the 16th century, St. John Lateran remained the "Cathedral of Rome". For perspective, the Vatican has hosted two ecumenical councils compared to five hosted at the Lateran. The global Church celebrates the dedication of the Lateran on Nov 9th.

The Lateran has six extant papal tombs, and claims to have the skulls of St Peter and St Paul. In addition, the interior is dominated by a set of colossal statues of the 12 apostles (with St Paul replacing Judas Iscariot), each over 15 feet tall!

Summation:

Once again it is time to share the financial posture of our Parish. The statement for Fiscal Year 2022-23 is once again shown in our bulletin. The bottom line is while we show significant improvement over last year, this improvement was due to the one time infusion of an \$80,000 credit from the IRS for the ERC Credit. As result of this credit our financial position was a positive \$58,600. Conversely, without the credit we would once again show a negative position of over \$20,000!

However, several positive elements show when comparing this year to last year Specifically, collections increased about 8% to pre-COVID levels and various fund raisers slightly increased over last year. On the expense side, there was a significant reduction of the cost of upkeep to all Parish facilities. Basically we have returned to pre-COVID finances but with the help of the \$80,000 credit.

So where does this leave us? All of us have seen the erosion of income and purchasing power due to gas prices, grocery bills, utilities and almost all other economic sectors. Our Parish is no different, but we the Parish staff pledge to continue our vigilance in limiting expenses while using prudent management of our limited resources.

We realize that each of you and your families are experiencing the same squeeze of the dollar but we would request that you thoroughly look over your finances and if possible, increase your donations to our Parish. Even a modest 3-5% increase will help us keep up with inflation. Also please consider using the FAITH DIRECT option of donating. For information please call the Rectory.

\$ 65,770

- Includes religious education non-employee expenses, social ministry non-employee expenses, youth ministry non-employee expenses, adult education (like Bible Study & Alpha), consolation ministry, RCIA, stewardship, parish retreat

Regional School

\$ 68,884

- Churches without their own parochial school contribute 15% of regular collections to the Diocesan Education fund since our regional school closed.

Printing & Office

\$ 68,857

- Includes postage, printing supplies, phone, payroll fees, computer fees, equipment

Auxiliary Expenditures

\$ 72,493

- Includes liturgical expenses, choir expenses, diocesan assessment, staff gifts

Rectory Household

\$ 3,977

- Includes rectory food, household cleaning supplies, newspapers, items needed to maintain a household

Collection for Others

\$ 16,689

- All monies collected on behalf of others are forwarded entirely to their respective entities (i.e. Missions, Rice Bowl, Peter's Pence)
