

#### Luke 2:22-40 (Holy Family)

When the days were completed for their purification according to the law of Moses, they took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord, just as it is written in the law of the Lord, Every male that opens the womb shall be consecrated to the Lord, and to offer the sacrifice of a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons, in accordance with the dictate in the law of the Lord. Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon. This man was righteous and devout, awaiting the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord. He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, He took him into his arms and blessed God, saying: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted —and you yourself a sword will pierce— so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth.

# Fr. Antony's Letter

#### Dear Friends,

A young mother had been too busy to visit her elderly next-door neighbor, who was ill. She said to her five-year-old son, "Johnny, run over and see how "old Mrs. Smith is." Within a few minutes, the boy was back. "Mom, she says it's none of your business how old she is." Mother's accent was on 'how'. When the son communicated it to Mrs. Smith, she understood the accent to be on 'old'. When the accent was misplaced, the meaning was mistakenly understood from mother's concern for Mrs. Smith's wellbeing to inquisitiveness of knowing of her age.

Christmas is the celebration of where God wants His Accent to fall. The readings of the fourth Sunday of Advent make the accent fall on the right way of celebrating Christmas so that the celebration makes our lives meaningful in its fullness. In the first reading David spoke to the Prophet Nathan his desire to build a palace (temple) for God in his capital city. But through Nathan God replied to him "I (God) will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me. Your house and your kingdom shall endure forever before me; your throne shall stand firm forever."

God preferred to live wih David more in a personal relationship of a father to his son, than to live in a temple. God's desire was to live in a reciprocal loving relationship and not in a material building, however well it could be built.

In the Gospel we see God is volunteering to come and dwell among us as human, as the son of Mary. God the Father requests Mary to conceive God to be her Son through the power of the Holy Spirit. Trinitarian God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit request a human Mary to cooperate with Him to come and dwell among us as a human being, Jesus of Nazareth. Mary gave her consent and Jesus was born as a human child. Thus, the event of the birth of God among us, as one of us, is the celebration of Christmas. God has self-invited Himself to be born among us to relate with us in human terms. God's only interest and purpose is an interpersonal relationship with us, humans.

God does not want us to build the most expensive palace as David desired, that God can live among us. God wants us to open our hearts to live in God-human relationship. God wants to live with us in a parent-child relationship as revealed to David, "I (God) will be a father to him, and he shall be a son to me." God does not expect us to achieve or accomplish great works. God wants our consent as Mary was asked, so that we may bear HIM in our hearts and make HIM available to others through us. Christmas is a great celebration of what great things we can do for God; and what great things God can do through us for others. It is Christmas whenever we can make ourselves available for God to come to us and live among us.

Special thanks to all those volunteers who helped decorate in and outside the church to make the Church look celebrative. They took a special interest in decorating with lights and wreaths, setting up the Christmas trees, the manger in front of the altar, and at the niche in the Narthex. Choir members, Eucharistic Ministers, Lectors, altar linen cleaners, Children's Liturgy crew, Ushers, Knights, Columbiettes and other volunteers actively put their spirit into make our Christmas liturgically celebrative and meaningful. Volunteers of the Pantry and Outreach helped the needy with food and gifts from the generosity of our parish. I wish and pray: May this Christmas make your home His manger. May your heart welcome Jesus the Emmanuel. May you be touched by the Newborn King and be illuminated. May you glow with joy and peace.

I wish each one of you and your families a MERRY CHRISTMAS. May the God who shares God's wonderful self with us in JESUS, the EMMANUEL, open your hearts to give and receive each other in love and joy.

# His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

#### Christmas & The Eucharist

Is there some kind of a connection between Christmas and the Eucharist? As we continue to look at many aspects of the Eucharist during this parish year of the three-year National Eucharistic Revival, let's examine the connection between the season we are about to enter, and the Real Presence of the Lord.

Right off the bat, we can sense there is a connection because of the word "Christmas" itself. It means "Christ's

Mass." Perhaps there is something about the celebration of the Mass, and specifically the Eucharist, that is tied to Christmas.

Note that both Christmas and the Eucharist are facts. Jesus was born in human history, an actual person documented to be born in an actual place. The Word did indeed become Flesh (cf. John 1:14). Eucharist is a fact as well. The Eucharist is Christmas repeated over and over again at every Mass. Wherever there is a Catholic Church and a Mass and a tabernacle. Christ is present. It's our Bethlehem. And in a connection to the bread of the Eucharist, the word "Bethlehem" means "house of bread."

Yet both Christmas and the Eucharist reveal a mystery. God became man at Christmas. He did this out of love to redeem us from sin and death. So he sent his only Son. It is a mystery to be pondered in that in Jesus, he is truly God and also truly man (what theologians call the hypostatic union). The Eucharist is another sign of how much God loves us. Jesus' presence continues among us. How Jesus could be completely contained in the Eucharist is a mystery to be pondered. Though we cannot fully explain it in mere human terms, we can enter into the mystery knowing that the Eucharist, like Christmas, is given to us as a gift and a sign of

God's love for us.

It should come as no surprise, then, that the Church sees every Communion as a Christmas — the advent of the Savior and every Christmas as a Eucharistic feast. Merry Christmas!






# St Vincent de Paul



Deliver us from evil by the blessing which Christ brings,


and teach us to be merry with clear hearts.

# Saints of December



St Ambrose
Feast Day: December 7th
Bishop of Milan
Patron: Beekeepers

Governor and theologian, strong promoter of Roman Christianity against Arianism & paganism. Swarm of bees landed on his face as an infant, leaving him unharmed. Helped convert St Augustine to Christianity. Authored four hymns known as the Ambrosian hymns.



Our Lady of Guadalupe
Feast Day: December 12th
Empress of the Americas, Patroness
of Latin America, Queen of Mexico

Title for the Blessed Mother Mary, associated with five apparitions to Juan Diego and Juan Bernardino, Mexican peasants in 1531. The Basilica of OLG is the most visited Catholic shrine in the world.

St Lucy
Feast Day: December 13th
Virgin & Martyr
Patron: The Blind

From a wealthy Roman family, received a vision of St Agatha promising her mother would be healed of illness. Used opportunity to distribute riches to the poor. Her betrothed disagreed and had her sentenced to a brothel. She was martyred in their attempt to take her to her punishment.



St John of the Cross
Feast Day: December 14th
Priest, Mystic, Doctor of the Church
Patron: Spanish Poets

Carmelite friar, very involved in the Counter-Reformation in Spain. Studied under and was mentored by Teresa of Avila (St Teresa of Jesus). Prolific writer known for his poetry and writings on the development of the soul. Considered one of the greatest authors of Spanish literature.



St Stephen
Feast Day: 12/26
The First Martyr
"The Promartyr"
Patron: Altar Servers


Mentioned in Acts of the Apostles (Acts 6), he was a deacon in the early Church in Jerusalem. Angered members of various synagogues with his teachings. Accused of blasphemy and was stoned to death.



St John the Apostle
Feast Day: December 27th
Apostle
Patron: Love, loyalty

Generally regarded as the youngest apostle, brother of James, son of Zebedee. Believed to be the only apostle to die of natural causes. Traditionally held to be the author of the Gospel of John, Johannine epistles, and the Book of Revelation. Potentially the "disciple whom Jesus loved".
