

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, He inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet: And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; since from you shall come a ruler, who is to shepherd my people Israel." Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out. And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was. They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends,

A young boy, away at boarding school, wrote after his first visit to the school's chapel: "It has lovely stained-glass windows with pictures of people who were famous in God's time." God's time is ever present. Every minute is God's time. We all live in God's time. New year 2024 is a New Cycle beginning in God's time. Happy NEW YEAR.

We end one set of time consisting of 12 months, called 2023 and step into same set of time repeating 12 months, called 2024. It takes approximately 365.25 days for Earth to orbit the Sun which we call a solar year. We usually round the days in a calendar year to 365. To make up for the missing partial day, we add one day to our calendar approximately every four years. That is a leap year. We add the partial day of 2021, 2022 and 2023 to that of 2024 and make 2024 consisting of 366 days. 2024 is a leap year. Thus, once in 4 years we make the month of February have 29 days. Wish you a Happy NEW LEAP YEAR.

Whenever we count anything with numbers, we name the counted years or days as old (past) and the month or days yet to be counted as future. Between the past and future lies the present. Present is the time which remains lively and vibrant living between the past, (the lived time) and the future, (yet to be lived time). This lively, vibrant present time is God's time.

PRESENT is God's time; how? God does not have past or future, because everything is alive and available for God always. Nothing is away from His presence that God has that God has lost them forever. Also, Nothing is yet to happen that God is waiting for them to appear. Everything and all things are alive, vibrant and present without their past or future. If we desire to understand or experience PRESENT of God we have to free ourselves from the humanly created concept of time. The moment we liberate from the burdens of the past memories and strip ourselves from the future dreams, we will have nothing of the past or the future to compare or evaluate the PRESENT we currently live. In this current living moment, we become alive and vibrant. At this present moment, we will be totally and entirely available to ourselves. This is moment we experience wholly the NEW, which has nothing to compare with our past self or to emerge to a future self.

When we wish each other NEW year, let us be born to God's time - God's PRESENT time. Let us not compare ourselves or any person or any situation with the past. Let us not reserve or postpone ourselves or any person or any situation for the future benefit. Let us live God's time. Let us live the PRESENT and allow the PRESENT of any person to be alive and vibrant. PRESENT is the NEW. The NOW time is the PRESENT time. When we live the NOW we will be ever NEW. The newness that begins at that passing minute, at the countdown 11:59 of 2023 to 00.00 of 2024, continue NEW in living the PRESENT, THE NOW of God's time.

Today we celebrate our families while celebrating God's Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. By letting God into their relationship, their poor and regular family became Holy Family of Mary, Joseph and Jesus. Today's celebration reminds that we can let God be born in our family and make it a holy family as happened to the Holy Family did. When God comes into our time and situation then all human times and situations become those of God. NEW, ALIVE and VIBRANT.

His Presence Is Real - Reflections on the Eucharist by Deacon Matt

The New Covenant

We are about to enter into the year 2024. Last week in this column, we looked at the connection between Christmas and the Eucharist. This week, let's look at the concept of "new" and apply it to something secular, the new year, and compare and contrast with the New Covenant.

First, what is a "covenant"? It is a term we might be familiar with from law. This is a formal, solemn and binding agreement. Legally, it is a type of promise that often forms the core of a contract. But in spiritual matters, a covenant is much greater. A covenant involves mutual commitments between parties. Rather than going beyond a mere service, which is typically what a contract arrang-

es, a covenant binds two parties in a trust that, at least in the spiritual world, is meant never to be broken. Each side has an interest in working for the good of the other.

After the Fall of Adam and Eve, God established a covenant first with his chosen people, the Israelites. God would protect and bless his people, and the people would obey God

and stay faithful to him. God kept up his end of the covenant, but the people found it difficult to do the same. The human race needed a savior to redeem them from sin and death. And so God sent his only Son, and the blood that Jesus shed on the Cross is the blood of "the new and everlasting covenant," as we hear at Mass.

Just like the new year about to dawn upon us, this covenant was new to God's people. Unlike the new year, this New Covenant will not pass away. 2024 will run its course, and in a little over 12 months, it will simply be a memory. But the New Covenant is eternal. Jesus Christ is the mediator of that covenant, in which we are graced by God's love and forgiveness. And we are drawn ever closer to him each time we experience him in the Eucharist.

> "The renewal in the Eucharist of the covenant between the Lord and man draws the faithful into the compelling love of Christ and sets them on fire." - Sacrosanctum Concilium, 10.






Today is the feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. During our New Year, may our families "grow in wisdom and have the favor of God upon them."


ALPHA is an opportunity to explore the Christian faith in a friendly, open, and informal environment.
