

John 6:1-15 (Ordinary 17)

Jesus went across the Sea of Galilee. A large crowd followed him, because they saw the signs he was performing on the sick. Jesus went up on the mountain, and there he sat down with his disciples. The Jewish feast of Passover was near. When Jesus raised his eyes and saw that a large crowd was coming to him, he said to Philip, "Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?" He said this to test him, because he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Two hundred days' wages worth of food would not be enough for each of them to have a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish; but what good are these for so many?" Jesus said, "Have the people recline." Now there was a great deal of grass in that place. So the men reclined, about five thousand in number. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks, and distributed them to those who were reclining, and also as much of the fish as they wanted. When they had had their fill, he said to his disciples, "Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted." So they collected them, and filled twelve wicker baskets with fragments from the five barley loaves that had been more than they could eat. When the people saw the sign he had done, they said, "This is truly the Prophet, the one who is to come into the world." Since Jesus knew that they were going to come and carry him off to make him king,

Focus Questions for Ordinary 17 John 6:1-15

- 1: Relate a time when you hungered for more than food. How were you fed spiritually?
- 2: The apostles had to grow in their understanding of Jesus and his mission. How is your faith continuing to grow?
- 3: If you only had enough food for you and your family, would you share your food with others?

Fr. Antony's Letter

Dear Friends.

Bent over and obviously in pain, the old man with a cane hobbled laboriously through the sanctuary and into the pastor's office while the choir was practicing.

Ten minutes later he came out, walking upright and moving with grace and speed.

"Good gracious," the choir director exclaimed. "Did the pastor heal you by faith?"

"No," the old man said with a smile. "He just gave me a cane that wasn't six inches too short!" Physicians should rightly diagnose the state of the patient, the nature of his disease and start the treatment in order to heal the sick.

Today's readings show us how God, the physician heals us. The first reading explains how the shepherds whom God appointed over His people, did not care for them. So God began to deal directly with His people, saying, "I myself will gather the remnant of my flock from all the lands to which I have driven them and bring them back to their meadow; there they shall increase and multiply."

The responsorial psalm depicts what happens when the Lord Himself becomes our Shepherd. We will lack nothing. The Shepherd will not only provide us with life by reposing in verdant pastures beside restful waters, but also protect us, "Even though I walk in the dark valley I fear no evil; for you are at my side, with your rod and your staff, that give me courage."

Today's Gospel describes the compassion of Jesus, the Shepherd. "When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd." We see in Jesus how God has begun to act as the true Shepherd. Paul explains in the second reading how Jesus, the Shepherd cures and cares for us humans. Knowing that each of us is suffering from disintegration (enmity) within our individual selves and with each other, Jesus reconciled us with God through the cross, putting that enmity to death by it.

Our Reconciliation with God cures us and makes us whole on two levels. First, each of us is brought back to our original integrated selves. As persons undivided within us, each of us becomes one single expression. No hypocritical style of one way inside and totally the other way outside; no more inimical within our individual selves, our good-self fighting with our evil-self; but one New Person in place of two. Second, Jesus the Shepherd broke down the dividing wall of enmity, through his flesh, establishing peace, and reconciled us with God, in one body, through the cross, putting that enmity to death by it. This effects peace among us because we all become one body, each of us becoming members of the Body of Christ.

In this day and age, we are direly in need of peace. The division among us, the human communities is not incurable. We need the right diagnosis, correct treatment and a compassionate doctor. Jesus, the Good Shepherd presents Himself as the compassionate physician. HE sends us as he sent the disciples as His healers among the strayed and sick sheep. Let us be healed individually and carry His healing mission of peace wherever and among whomever it is needed.

Welcome to Fr. Bala. While I am away Fr. Bala will be here helping us in the parish. He is not new to us. He used to help us until his retirement. Now as retired priest he comes to us from his hometown Dindigul, India to help us during my visit to my mom. We welcome him. We wish him all the best in his ministry among us.



Once a month at 9:30 we have the presentation of babies. If you are interested in Baptism for your child under the age of 7, contact the Rectory!





In general, late afternoons/early evenings during the week, and possibly Saturday mornings and Sunday evenings, are available. To discuss a







HAVE FUN IN THE SUN ... BUT DON'T FORGET THE **SUNSCREEN**

Dermatologists say this is what we should know.



READ THE LABEL. HERE'S **WHAT TO** LOOK FOR.

SPF (sun-protection factor). This number tells how effectively it blocks harmful ultraviolet (UV) rays. Choose an SPF of 30 or higher.

Broad spectrum. Protects against both UVA radiation (associated with skin aging) and UVB radiation (which causes sunburn). Both can cause skin cancer.



LEAST 15 MINUTES BEFORE SUN EXPOSURE.

Use enough to cover your whole body (one ounce for most adults). Don't forget ears, top of scalp, legs and feet. Ask someone to help you with your back. You'll need more every two hours. Reapply after swimming, or if you're sweating.



DOINEED SUNSCREEN IF...

I'm not at the beach? Yes, use whenever you're outside.

It's cloudy out? You can still get sunburn, so use it.



MORE SUN PROTECTION TIPS

Wear a broad-brimmed hat.

Avoid peak sun exposure (between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.).

Protect your eyes with sunglasses.

Stay in the shade.



confessed his faith.



Feast Day: July 15th
Friar, Doctor of the Church
Seraphic Doctor
Patron: Bowel Disorders

A prolific writer who was known to reconcile diverse traditions in theology and philosophy. Staunch defender of the Franciscan tradition.



Feast Day: July 26th
Parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary
Grandparents of Jesus Christ
Patron: Grandparents

Wealthy couple from the Twelve
Tribes of Israel. Unable to conceive,
they prayed for a child, promising to
dedicate them to God's service.



Feast Day: July 11th
Abbot, Exorcist, Mystic
Founder: Benedictine Order
Patron: Europe

Founded a number of communities for monks in Italy. Fr Antony is known as Benedict in India (Asir)



Feast Day: July 22nd
Apostle to the Apostles
Patron: Pharmacists, Converts,
Women

Travelled with the Jesus and the Apostles. First person to witness the Risen Christ, brought news of the resurrection to the Apostles.



Feast Day: July 29th Members of the House of Bethany Friends of Jesus Christ Patron: Siblings

Welcomed Jesus into their home.

Martha was active, preparing. Mary anointed His feet. Lazarus was raised from the dead.





Feast Day: July 14th
Virgin
First Native American Saint
Patron: Environment

Algonquin-Mohawk born in present day NY. At 19 she was Baptized and moved to a Jesuit Mission Village.



Feast Day: July 25th Apostle and Martyr "Son of Thunder" Patron: Spain

Brother of John the Apostle, and taller or older (greater) than the other James. Executed by Herod in Acts, first Apostle to be martyred.



Feast Day: July 31st Priest

Founder: Society of Jesus (Jesuits)
Patron: Jesuits, Basque Region

Convert to Catholicism after an injury. Founded the Jesuit order and through that, many schools. "Go, set the world of fire."
