#### Gospel of John (21:1-14)

At that time, Jesus revealed himself to his disciples at the Sea of Tiberias. He revealed himself in this way. Together were Simon Peter, Thomas called Didymus, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, Zebedee's sons, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, "I am going fishing." They said to him, "We also will come with you." So they went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing. When it was already dawn, Jesus was standing on the shore; but the disciples did not realize that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, "Children, have you caught anything to eat?" They answered him, "No." So he said to them, "Cast the net over the right side of the boat and you will find something." So they cast it, and were not able to pull it in because of the number of fish. So the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord." When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he tucked in his garment, for he was lightly clad, and jumped into the sea. The other disciples came in the boat, for they were not far from shore, only about a hundred yards, dragging the net with the fish. When they climbed out on shore, they saw a charcoal fire with fish on it and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish you just caught." So Simon Peter went over and dragged the net ashore full of one hundred fifty-three large fish. Even though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come, have breakfast." And none of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" because they realized it was the Lord. Jesus came over and took the bread and gave it to them, and in like manner the fish. This was now the third time Jesus was revealed to his disciples after being raised from the dead.

#### From the Pastor

**A man visited a psychiatrist.** He explained, "I've been doing wrong, Doctor, and my conscience is bothering me." The psychiatrist asked, "so you want something that will strengthen your will?" The man replied, "oh, no, I'd rather get something that would weaken my conscience."

Today's Gospel narrates how the **Risen Jesus strengthens his weak disciples**. Fear has locked them up in their room. They had no courage to go out as the disciples of the crucified master. They still had doubt whether Jesus is really risen from death. The risen Jesus appears and affirms that he is alive, back from death. He frees them from fear and doubt.

But **doubting Thomas needed proof to believe that He is alive**. He was not ready to believe unless he touched the wounds of the Crucified Jesus. When Jesus appeared again, He invited Thomas to check as he had wanted. Thomas, instead of checking the wounds, surrenders in faith crying, "MY Lord, MY God." Human persons are not objects to be analyzed and proved. They are living subjects to be loved and embraced; to be acknowledged and accepted; to be cherished and related; to be believed and surrendered and committed to each other. The Resurrection of Our Lord invites all of us to value humans as subjects of our faith and commitment to each other in love. Let us rise to real human and divine values in each of us.

**Sprinkling the Holy Water:** Throughout the Easter Season (from Easter to Pentecost) the priest will sprinkle Holy water at the beginning of the Mass. This is to remind us of our Baptism. In Baptism we died and rose again in Christ. By his Grace we became members of the body of Christ. The sprinkling of Holy water reminds us that we were Baptized in the water. It invites us to realize our identity as God's children filled with the Grace of New Life, risen in Christ.

**First Holy Communion** of our parish children will be celebrated on two Saturdays, May 3<sup>rd</sup> at 11:00 am and on May 10<sup>th</sup> at 10:30 am. Please pray for our children and their families that the presence of the Lord in their children will revive their families in faith and committed love for each other.

May 4<sup>th</sup> is the **Crowning of Mary, the Mother of God and Our Mother.** The month of May is dedicated to the Blessed Mother. It is our Parish Tradition to crown Mary at the 9:30 am Mass on the First Sunday of May. We will be praying the Rosary on weekdays at 8:40 am before the 9:00am Mass, a decade of the Rosary before the Masses on the Weekend. We recommend you try the devotion of praying Rosary in your families during May or individually. Please set some quite time for yourselves to meditatively pray at least a decade of the Rosary. (A decade consists of praying one "Our Father", ten "Hail Marys" and ending with "Glory be.")














# How to pray the Rosary

- 1: Make the Sign of the Cross
- 2: Holding the Crucifix, say The Apostles' Creed
- 3: On the first bead, say an Our Father
- 4: On the next three beads, say one Hail Mary for each
- 5: Say the Glory Be
- 6: For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery, then say an Our Father
- 7: For the next ten beads, say one Hail Mary for each, then finish with a Glory Be.
- 8: After finishing a decade, we say the prayer requested by the Blessed Virgin at Fatima:

Oh my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to Heaven, especially those who have most need of your mercy.

9: After the five decades, say the Hail, Holy Queen:

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile, show unto us the blessed fruit of they womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

10: Make the Sign of the Cross

\*It takes about 15 minutes to pray the whole Rosary. Since we repeat the same prayers (i.e. Hail Mary 53 times), the Church helps us meditate on the Gospel by using Mysteries. Each day has 5 Mysteries, to reflect on one during each decade.

- 1. The Annunciation to Mary
- 2. The Visitation of Mary
- 3. The Birth of our Lord Jesus
- 4. The Presentation of the Child Jesus in the Temple
- 5. The Finding of Our Lord in the Temple

Sorrowful Mysteries (Tues, Fri)

- 1. The Agony of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane
- 2. The Scourging of Jesus at the Pillar
- 3. The Crowning of Jesus with Thorns
- 4. The Carrying of the Cross
- 5. The Crucifixion and Death of Jesus

Glorious Mysteries (Wed, Sun)

- 1. The Resurrection of Jesus
- 2. The Ascension of Jesus
- 3. The Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost
- 4. The Assumption of Mary
- 5. The Coronation of Our Lady in Heaven

Luminous Mysteries (Thurs)

- 1. Jesus' Baptism in the Jordan
- 2. The Wedding at Cana
- 3. The Proclamation of the Kingdom
- 4. The Transfiguration
- 5. The Institution of the Eucharist
