### Gospel of Luke (10:1-12,17-20)

At that time the Lord appointed seventy-two others whom he sent ahead of him in pairs to every town and place he intended to visit. He said to them, "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest. Go on your way; behold, I am sending you like lambs among wolves. Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals; and greet no one along the way. Into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this household.' If a peaceful person lives there, your peace will rest on him; but if not, it will return to you. Stay in the same house and eat and drink what is offered to you, for the laborer deserves his payment. Do not move about from one house to another. Whatever town you enter and they welcome you, eat what is set before you, cure the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God is at hand for you.' Whatever town you enter and they do not receive you, go out into the streets and say, 'The dust of your town that clings to our feet, even that we shake off against you.' Yet know this: the kingdom of God is at hand. I tell you, it will be more tolerable for Sodom on that day than for that town."

The seventy-two returned rejoicing, and said, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us because of your name." Jesus said, "I have observed Satan fall like lightning from the sky. Behold, I have given you the power to 'tread upon serpents' and scorpions and upon the full force of the enemy and nothing will harm you. Nevertheless, do not rejoice because the spirits are subject to you, but rejoice because your names are written in heaven."

# From the Pastor

**The little boy was helping his mother put away the groceries.** His mom looked over to him and saw him open the box of animal crackers and carefully examined the animals, one by one. “What in the world are you doing?” She asked him. “It says on the box that you should not eat them if the seal is broken,” the boy explained, “so I am looking for the seal.”

Today is the **Solemn Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul**, two great pillars of the Church. Like the small boy in the story, Peter and Paul were preoccupied with their pet project of looking for the seal, the animal cracker. Today’s readings portray how God chose these two apostolic pillars in His overall redemptive plan to break the seal of separation, and how God worked through them to open the doors of the church to all people.

**Peter denied Jesus to save his own life.** Even though he went with Jesus for three years, he was afraid to be associated with Him at the most crucial time of His passion and death. But the Risen Lord changed everything in Peter’s life when He asked him, “Peter, do you love me?” Then at that moment the denier became a committed lover of the Lord until the end of his life. He offered himself in being faithful to Jesus who called him. He did not deter from following Jesus even when he was crucified upside down. He denied Jesus in order to save his life by disassociating himself from Jesus. But when Jesus commissioned him in God’s redemptive plan of leading the church, Peter became a martyr, unafraid of losing his life.

**Paul was killing those who followed Jesus in order to keep his Judaic faith pure.** But the Risen Lord appeared to him changing the course of his life. Paul, who killed the believers of Jesus and persecuted Jesus’ Church, began to form Christian communities and began to teach them “I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me; insofar as I now live in the flesh, I live by faith in the Son of God who has loved me and given himself up for me.” (Letter to Galatians 2:20). The power of the Risen Lord turned him from his pet project of killing the church of Jesus to participate in God’s redemptive plan of building church communities for Jesus.

**Life would become a pet project as long as we reduce life to just what we want to do.** But life becomes an intrinsic part of God’s redemptive act in which each of us become God’s plan and God’s wonderful act. In each of us, a big wonder like that of St. Peter or St. Paul is waiting to be worked out by God, only if we are ready to convert like Peter and Paul to allow God to plan and act in our life. Let us not look for the unbroken seal, the animal cracker, but go in the name of our Lord Jesus to break open the seal with which the human community becomes divided in the name of color, creed, politics, religion, etc. Let us allow God to work in us and let us become God’s work wherever God leads us.





Deacon Matt





# John Carroll

## AMERICA'S FIRST BISHOP

Born in 1735 in the Province of Maryland, John Carroll was first home-schooled, then sent to a secret Catholic School run by Jesuit Reverend Thomas Poulton (Catholic education was illegal in the Province of Maryland). At 13 he was sent to study in France, joining the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) at the age of 18.

After returning to America in 1773 due to the suppression of the Society of Jesus, he worked as a missionary in Maryland and Virginia (it was still illegal to establish a Catholic Parish in Maryland), eventually building a small chapel on his family's land called St. John the Evangelist.


In the time following the American Revolution, as anti-Catholic sentiment and laws were loosened, Carroll became a prominent figure in establishing an American Catholic Church. In 1784, Pope Pius VI appointed him as "Provisional Superior of the Missions for the United States" with the authority to celebrate the sacrament of Confirmation. During this time he worked to refute anti-Catholic misinformation, and fought proposals to establish a Protestant denomination as a state religion.



In 1789, Pius VI approved a recommendation from the Catholic clergy in Maryland to appoint John Carroll as the first Bishop of Baltimore (the only Diocese in the newly established USA). He served in that role until his death in 1815.

### **FUN FACT**

Bishop Carroll strongly argued that Catholics should be able to read and hear the scriptures in their own language, and insisted that priests perform liturgical readings in the vernacular. He encouraged both clergy and laity to purchase English bibles so they could read and learn from the scriptures. Despite his push, he was unable to get the support from the Vatican.

## Prayer for Our Government by Archbishop John Carrol (1791)

We pray, O almighty and eternal God, who through Jesus Christ has revealed thy glory to all nations, to preserve the works of your mercy, that your Church, being spread through the whole world, may continue with unchanging faith in the confession of your name.

We pray Thee, who alone are good and holy, to endow with heavenly knowledge, sincere zeal and sanctity of life, our chief bishop, the pope, the vicar of Our Lord Jesus Christ, in the government of his Church; our own bishop, all other bishops, prelates and pastors of the Church; and especially those who are appointed to exercise among us the functions of the holy ministry, and conduct your people into the ways of salvation.

We pray O God of might, wisdom and justice, through whom authority is rightly administered, laws are enacted, and judgment decreed, assist with your Holy Spirit of counsel and fortitude the president of these United States, that his administration may be conducted in righteousness and be eminently useful to your people over whom he presides; by encouraging due respect for virtue and religion; by a faithful execution of the laws in justice and mercy; and by restraining vice and immorality.

Let the light of your divine wisdom direct the deliberations of Congress, and shine forth in all the proceedings and laws framed for our rule and government, so that they may tend to the preservation of peace, the promotion of national happiness, the increase of industry, sobriety and useful knowledge; and may perpetuate to us the blessing of equal liberty.

We pray for his excellency, the governor of this state, for the members of the assembly, for all judges, magistrates, and other officers who are appointed to guard our political welfare, that they may be enabled, by your powerful protection, to discharge the duties of their respective stations with honesty and ability.

We recommend likewise, to your unbounded mercy, all our brethren and fellow citizens throughout the United States, that they may be blessed in the knowledge and sanctified in the observance of your most holy law; that they may be preserved in union, and in that peace which the world cannot give; and after enjoying the blessings of this life, be admitted to those which are eternal.

Finally, we pray to you, O Lord of mercy, to remember the souls of your servants departed, who are gone before us with the sign of faith and repose in the sleep of peace; the souls of our parents, relatives and friends; of those who, when living, were members of this congregation, and particularly of such as are lately deceased; of all benefactors who, by their donations or legacies to this Church, witnessed their zeal for the decency of divine worship and proved their claim to our grateful and charitable remembrance. To these, O Lord, and to all that rest in Christ, grant, we beseech you, a place of refreshment, light and everlasting peace, through the same Jesus Christ, Our Lord and Savior.



# WHAT IS Ordinary Time

Christmas Time and Easter Time highlight the central mysteries of the Paschal Mystery, namely, the incarnation, death on the cross, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus Christ, and the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time, on the other hand, take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversion. This is living the life of Christ.

Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ. The goal, toward which all of history is directed, is represented by the final Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.
